Local homeless students find help, graduation successes with YouthHarbors

When Daiehenny Vaz and 11 other students cross the graduation stage on June 12 for Everett High School, it will be a journey completed like few others.

It will be the celebration of getting through school without a home for most of their student careers.

Vaz is one of 12 Everett High seniors who sought help from the YouthHarbors program due to an uncertain housing situation. She and 34 students from around Greater Boston were honored for their perseverance at a ceremony on the banks of the Malden River May 15.

"I had family problems and my parents no longer wanted me in the house," said Vaz. "Since I was 14, I've been going house to house to house. I moved from two different states and then stayed with my grandmother for a while and then came back here. I lived with my mom in Africa for a little and then lived in Providence. I've been living here for 12 years and I've gone to school here very since, but it hasn't been easy. I was living with a friend in 2017 and wanted to see if I could find help from them. I

Encore Boston Harbor plan to mitigate traffic, gets help from calendar

There's no painting it any other way – there's going to be major traffic on the June 23 opening day of the Encore Boston Harbor resort casino and even in the days after – but choosing a slow time of year for the opening and other precautions, the company said, would help lighten the load.

"I am telling you there's going to be traffic and we know that," said Jim Folk of Encore. "It's the opening of one of the largest resorts on the East

Unique Haitian art the focus of library show

Everett has one of the largest populations of Haitian residents on the East Coast, and though many of them work day-in and day-out in jobs like everyone else, before coming to Everett many were talented artists and artisans.

Though some have given up their talent within the rich tradition of painting in Haiti when they moved to the United States, their talent is once again being discovered in a statewide movement to find and celebrate these displaced artists.

That was once again on display this month at the Parlin Library as Guerline Alcay, of Everett, sponsored her 4th annual Haitian Heritage Month art show – a show that displays some amazing and colorful paintings in the Haitian tradition. The show premiered on Friday, May 17, and highlighted several artists, including Mimi Desir – who rediscovered her talent for painting after going back to Haiti several years ago.

Clear Path Ahead

Wynn Resorts pays \$35 million fine, CEO Maddox's \$500K fine

Wynn Resorts announced Tuesday it would not appeal its fine, and CEO Matt Maddox said he would not appeal his personal fine either – with both fines being delivered to the Massachusetts Gaming Commission (MGC) in the afternoon.

MGC Spokesperson Elaine Driscoll confirmed that both fine payments had been received by 3:15 p.m. Tuesday.

That fine, however, did not come without a verbal protest from the Board of Directors.

"The Board of Directors disagrees with a number of the Commission's comments and conclusions regarding Matt, and believes they are not supported by the evidence," read a statement sent out Tuesday. "Therefore, we would support his decision to exercise

his rights and appeal the fine imposed upon him, and believe he would rightly prevail in his appeal. However, that appeal would delay the final conclusion of this matter, and therefore we appreciate Matt's decision to forego an appeal in order to allow closure for the Company. The Company will pay the fine imposed on him and has today delivered payment of that, and the Company's fine, to the Commission."

The Board did say it would not appeal any of the findings in Massachusetts, and it added that Maddox has created a new paradigm in the company. It defended him by saying that, unlike the MGC report, the Nevada Gaming Control Board praised the actions taken by Maddox since he took over.

Administration moves to eliminate Office of Organizational Assessment

The City Administration has moved to eliminate the two-year-old Office of Organizational Assessment in its current City Budget request – a department created by Mayor Carlo DeMaria and headed up by former School Department employee Omar Easy.

The City Budget proposal was submitted this month to the Council, and Review Committee Chair Anthony DiPierro has led one meeting to review it so far, an all-day meeting on May 18. Another meeting was to take place tonight, May 29, regarding the School Department and the DPW.

The biggest news so far, however, has been the elimination of Easy's department in a budget that looks to show a fair amount of reorganization.

The Mayor's Office confirmed that they have "zeroed out" the department because it no longer needs to be a full-time job.

As part of a re-structuring

of municipal government in this year's budget, that department is being folded into Human Resources – where director Lara Wehbe will take on Easy's work.

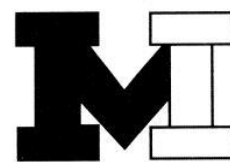
Easy has not yet been before DiPierro's Committee to discuss the change, but is expected in short order.

DiPierro said he wasn't surprised to see the mission of the Office folded into Human Resources.

"I don't think it was intended to be a long-term position," he said. "I think it was more of a short-term mission. I think what has happened is the bulk of the work is done and it's a little more of a transition. It ran its course and did what it was supposed to do."

The Office of Organizational Assessment was intended to solidify the job descriptions, the effectiveness of City positions and the qualifications of those in every job. Full reports on each department were expected, with recommendations.

Lattanzi announces run for Ward 6 City Council

Alfred Lattanzi official-ly announced his candidacy for Ward 6 City Council this week, and launched a Face-book page that seeks feed-back from Everett Residents.

“I’m encouraged by the early support I have received for this run and I’m looking forward to knocking on every voter’s door to hear their ideas and to ask for their vote,” said Lattanzi.

Al Lattanzi has been an integral part of the Everett community his entire life, through serving on various local boards and commis-sions. He has served on the Traffic Commission and the Board of Directors of the Everett Credit Union, first as Director then Treasurer. In 2009, he was elected to the Everett Charter Commission, which produced our current City Charter that was then rat-ified by the voters in 2011. He is currently a member of the newly established Everett Re-development Authority and the owner of Everett Supply & True Value Hardware store on Main Street.

Lattanzi learned the val-ue of hard work at a young age while growing up in a

“The Nevada Gaming Control Board, under whose jurisdiction the alleged activ-ities of our founder occurred, conducted its own year-long investigation and recently reaffirmed Matt Maddox’s good standing in Nevada, and praised him for creating a ‘paradigm shift’ and for taking ‘corrective actions that [have] been impressive,’” read the statement. “We believe Matt’s leadership has been, and will continue to be, essential in our transformation from a found-er-led company to an innova-tive global corporation.”

The statement concluded by indicating Wynn Resorts looks forward to working with the MGC, and is on track to open on June 23.

The MGC, for its part, re-cently put out a Request for Response (RFR) to procure an independent monitor to

oversee the Wynn Resorts actions at Encore Boston Har-bor. That was called for in the MGC’s investigation and de-cision on April 30.

The primary focus of the independent monitor’s re-view and evaluation will be the Massachusetts licensee. The scope of the review will include the policies and or-ganizational changes adopted by the Company as described during the recent adjudicatory hearing process in April. The MGC is attempting to gain an understanding as to whether the approaches put in place by the Company are consistent with recognized best practices and are in fact effective.

A meeting of the MGC is expected today, May 29, to discuss numerous matters re-lated to the Encore Boston Harbor opening.

MGC approves extended 4 a.m. liquor license for Encore

The Massachusetts Gam-ing Commission (MGC) ap-proved an extended 4 a.m. liquor license for Encore Bos-ton Harbor by a vote of 4-1 on Wednesday, May 22.

The MGC had discussed the matter at its May 6 meet-ing in-depth, as well as the other numerous regular 2 a.m. closing licenses that the casi-no requested.

A comment period was initiated with Mayor Martin Walsh and Councilor Lydia Edwards voicing displeasure with the idea of granting the extension, which is only for those involved in active gam-ing. The last call is 3:30 a.m.

They can re-open at 8 a.m.

tions on how to streamline operations and make things more efficient.

Easy made headlines last year with the Wellness Cen-ter incident when he appeared before the City Council in a meeting that became quite confrontational. In particular, he and Councilor Michael McLaughlin did not see eye to eye on the matter. Within that conversation, Easy indicated that he had not yet finished any assessments of any de-partments.

In last year’s budget, sev-eral councilors were critical of his office, and quizzed him on what he was actually do-ing. His budget faced more scrutiny than others, and some wanted to eliminate it. How-ever, it did pass and he was able to continue his work at

City Hall.

•SCHOOL DEPART-
MENT ASKS FOR \$6.5M

The School Department will once again be asking the City for a large sum of mon-ey over and above their min-imum funding requirements – that coming mostly due to budget constraints from the state again.

This year the School De-partment will be asking the City for \$6.5 million above net school spending.

While similar numbers were quite controversial in the last two years, this time it seems like the City is ready to absorb the shortfall while the state leaders continue to ar-gue over the best fix for urban school funding.

“That is the number we are being presented with this

week,” said DiPierro about the \$6.5 million. “Being on the School Finance Review Committee, I’ve been look-ing at those numbers regularly with the School Department and the rest of the Committee. I’m okay with it.

The School Department is also looking to add more At-tendance Officers to supple-ment the three existing now. Apparently they are having trouble covering every school with just those officers.

•BUDGET IS FAR BE-
LOW LEVY LIMIT

The City Budget proposal is very unique this year in that it has made some major cuts and is \$40 million below the tax levy limit.

As for the City operations, spending is down nearly \$80,000, DiPierro said.

Coast. We know many peo-ple will want to come see it. What we can do is mitigate it with our plan. If we see traf-fic hot spots, we can adjust accordingly, and we’ve been working closely with our part-ners to plan for that...We are not doing this in a bubble. We have a competent transporta-tion plan...We are going to be

monitoring the roads careful-ly.”

Since February, Folk and Encore have been meeting regularly with Everett, Bos-ton, Chelsea, Medford and state officials on the plan and its contingencies.

Officers from Everett, Bos-ton, Medford, Chelsea and the State Police working on forced overtime will be sta-tioned at locations in a radius all around the resort. But be-yond that, Folk said they have chosen the date wisely.

They didn’t pick July 4th, or a Saturday in May for a reason.

He said June 23, historically, is a slow time of the year for traditional traffic in Great-er Boston, and having it start on Sunday would give them a full week to work out the kinks before a full weekend.

“The last thing that we wanted to do was impact people’s commute going to work,” said Folk. “That’s why we chose that date. We believe traffic will be much lighter on a Sunday and it’s during a time when school is out. That is also a week when a lot of people take a vacation and leave Boston. There’s not usually a lot going on then.”

One major mitigation piece they are planning comes in response to the overwhelm-ing popularity of RideShare companies like Uber and Lyft. Encore believes many patrons will be using such services during the opening days – scared away by the \$42 fee for self-parking in the underground garage, or \$49 for valet parking. The last thing, Folk said, they want is a bunch of RideShare drivers clogging up Lower Broadway and Everett neighborhoods waiting for a call to pick up or drop off at the casino.

To combat that, Folk said they worked with the compa-nies to create a “Geo Fence” for the property. They also have created a RideShare lot across the street for about 100 cars. Using the “Geo Fence” technology, calls coming from the casino for a ride will only be able to be received by driv-ers in the RideShare lot. It’s a

technology that was used at Logan Airport with some suc-cess, and Folk believes it will keep unnecessary traffic off of Lower Broadway – which is the prime mission during the first opening days.

“We’re trying to keep as many vehicles off Broadway as possible,” he said. “We’re telling people to use Malden Station and use Wellington Station – where we will have luxury shuttles.”

Another piece of that plan with the shuttles for employ-ees and for those coming on the Orange Line is to let them out on Mystic View Road on the Gateway Mall property. Those arriving will be let out at the new HarborWalk, where they will walk under the rail-road bridge and onto the new landscaped courtyard.

“We will be bringing peo-ple into Gateway Mall in Everett and they will be let out there from the shuttles to walk to the resort,” he said. “They are not going to line up on Broadway or line up into Sullivan Square. We will use Mystic View Road for the drop-offs and pick-ups during the first days.”

When it comes to law en-forcement, they will have of-ficers from all over the area – including Everett, Chelsea, Boston and Medford.

Folk said they have 63 State Troopers from Troop A committed to them, and 12 Everett Police officers.

“We are going to reimburse overtime,” he said. “These officers will be there. It’s not details where they might not show up. We will have these law enforcement officers in place.”

Other measures that will be used:

•There will be 21 message boards pointing drivers in the right directions.

•There will be 1,300 park-ing spaces at Station Landing that Encore will use. That will be for employees mostly, and there will also be the River-Green parking lot for over-flow – which will be connect-ed to the resort with the new Neighborhood Shuttle.

"I've done this show about four years now," said Alcy. "It's a breath of fresh air. I love art and I love to promote art. I also love my culture and want to show others in Everett the great tradition of Haitian painting and the artists we have in Everett and Massachusetts. Many times with our art, we are taking something that is not so good and making it into something amazing."

Desir was trained professionally as a painter in Haiti before coming to Massachusetts as a teen-ager. Once here, she put down her paintbrush and didn't pursue her art very much.

"I remember by the age of five I was constantly looking at art," she said. "My father would take me to the hotels and the resorts in Haiti where there was beautiful art on the walls and wonderful things everywhere. My home did not have pretty walls and I wondered what I could do to make my walls beautiful. At one point, my father brought me to the school and said I was an artist and I trained there. I was 9 and never questioned the paradox of that decision."

Haiti's art tradition is heavily influenced by the French artists due to it being a colony of France until the early 1800s. However, the French tradition carried on beyond colonialism and mixed with a colorful new tradition influence by African

and Native art.

Many Haitian artists had developed their own unique style by World War II, and that was "discovered" by the rest of the world due to DeWitt Peters – an American who had been stationed on the island during the war. Afterward, he set up a school and began formally training the self-taught artists.

The same occurred with art dealer Georges Nader Sr., who collected and promoted Haitian art to the rest of the world.

However, Haitian art is also known for the heart behind it – as it often depicts tough circumstances like hunger, poverty and discrimination.

"It's our torment that caused us to have so many artists like we do," said Desir. "I see it as a gift of martyrdom – being victimized over and over again. It is the environment you are in. It's the gift of our world – to try to erase a scar that develops very early in life. Because someone like me is given the artist's gift, I can see that scar and depict it in an artistic way."

Many of these artists and their descendants, however, have now left their Island home and moved to places like Everett – where they put away their artistic talents to work and raise families in a new place. Numerous artists in Everett have been un-

earthed by Alcy and others over the years, artists who were trained professionally in Haiti, but haven't painted in years.

Desir said that is exactly what happened to her.

She went back to Haiti as an adult, and the urge to paint hit her for the first time in decades.

"I started painting again soon after getting back," she said. "We are so into the world around us, and similarly, I found myself back into that world."

Sadly, Desir lost almost everything in 2010 during the devastating Haitian earthquake, and returned to Massachusetts.

However, this time she brought her paintbrush with her and has published a book with other Haitian artists called 'Migrating Colors.' The book is designed to recognize "lost" Haitian painters in Massachusetts and catalog them.

Now, she said she is continuing her painting as a way of showing how she and others can survive 2010 – the same martyrdom tradition that inspired hundreds before her.

"It's the madness that came from the earthquake," she said. "I shall survive it...I do not play around with that. It's subjective, but there is beauty in it, and after a long time, some of us can see it."

met YouthHarbors first in December 2017, and was able to enter the program in February 2018."

Since that time, Vaz has lived steady at a home in the area, and enlisted in the U.S. Army last year. After completing her Boot Camp last summer, she will be off for special training following the Everett High graduation.

She will train to be a Human Resource Specialist at an Army Hospital, which will be like nurse training, she said.

"I've always wanted to go to the Army and I finally decided to do it," she said. "I want to attend college and eventually become a pediatric surgeon."

Yet, before landing on her feet with YouthHarbors, goals like that were hard to focus on, and it's not something uncommon in urban cities like Everett.

vide students with support in the areas of housing, education, employment, health, and independent living skill development.

They have helped more than 475 students graduate in the past decade. The program is funded by private donations and receives no public funding. In fact, by placing students on the path to higher education and employment, it reduces dependence on the government, organizers said.

"This year's graduation marks the tremendous accomplishments of 35 incredible students," said Dave

Dorvilier, Program Director of YouthHarbors. "The courage and dedication it takes to overcome such adversity is immense. We are very proud of their hard work and look forward to seeing what they will do next."

For Vaz, it has given her the stability she needed to focus on her future, and not on where she might stay during a certain week or month.

"It's given me a stable path to stay on," she said. "I didn't have to worry about where I would go or about not coming to school because I was out looking for a place to stay."

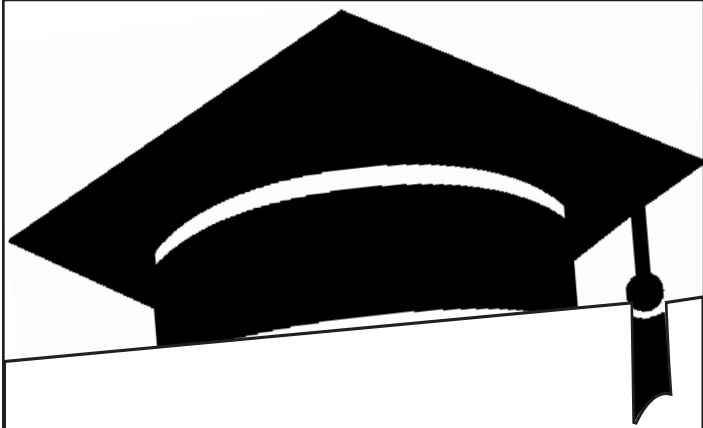

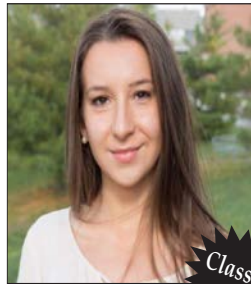

FINALLY, SOME GOOD NEWS ON THE ENVIRONMENTAL FRONT

Every few weeks -- or even more often, it seems -- we learn of some new, looming catastrophe for our planet because of the combined effects of climate change and the degradation of our environment by human activity.

Everyone agrees that the climate is changing, and that it will have far-reaching consequences that we only can imagine. So too, the activity by the seven billion persons with whom we share the earth is destroying the natural world at an unprecedented and ever-accelerating pace.

So it was with some degree of relief that we read the annual report by the organization Save the Harbor/Save the Bay, which informed us that our major metropolitan beaches never have been cleaner (in terms of water pollution) and safer for recreational swimming and other activity.

As lifelong residents of this area, we always are amazed that the beaches with the cleanest water every year are the M Street Beach and the City Point Beach in South Boston -- go figure -- but we're sure there is a logical and scientific-based reason for why these two beaches have achieved ratings of 100-percent for the past six years.

However, almost all of our metropolitan beaches, from Nantasket Beach on the South Shore to Revere and Winthrop beaches on the north, improved their ratings in 2018 compared to their six-year running-average. Winthrop Beach, for example, attained a 100-percent rating in 2018 compared to a 97-percent rate for the previous five years.

There are many factors that contribute to a beach's water quality. There are natural effects, most notably the amount of rainfall over the course of a season or over a short time period. The diligence of government agencies at the state and local levels in assuring that sewer connections are working as intended are a vital part of the equation.

We as individuals also play a key role in assuring that our water stays clean by making sure we don't dispose of our trash and hazardous waste into our waterways, by using the pump-out services for our boats, and by picking-up after our dogs.

The clean and healthy beaches that we enjoy today are the product of three decades of hard work, effort, and great expense by officials and the residents of the Boston Metro area. However, we cannot rest on our laurels. We must commit ourselves to doing whatever it takes in the years ahead to ensure that our region's greatest resource -- our beautiful coastline -- remains clean and useable both for ourselves and for generations to come.

So we wish to thank Save the Harbor/Save the Bay for issuing their annual report card on the state of our beaches -- and for giving us some good news, for a change, about our environment.

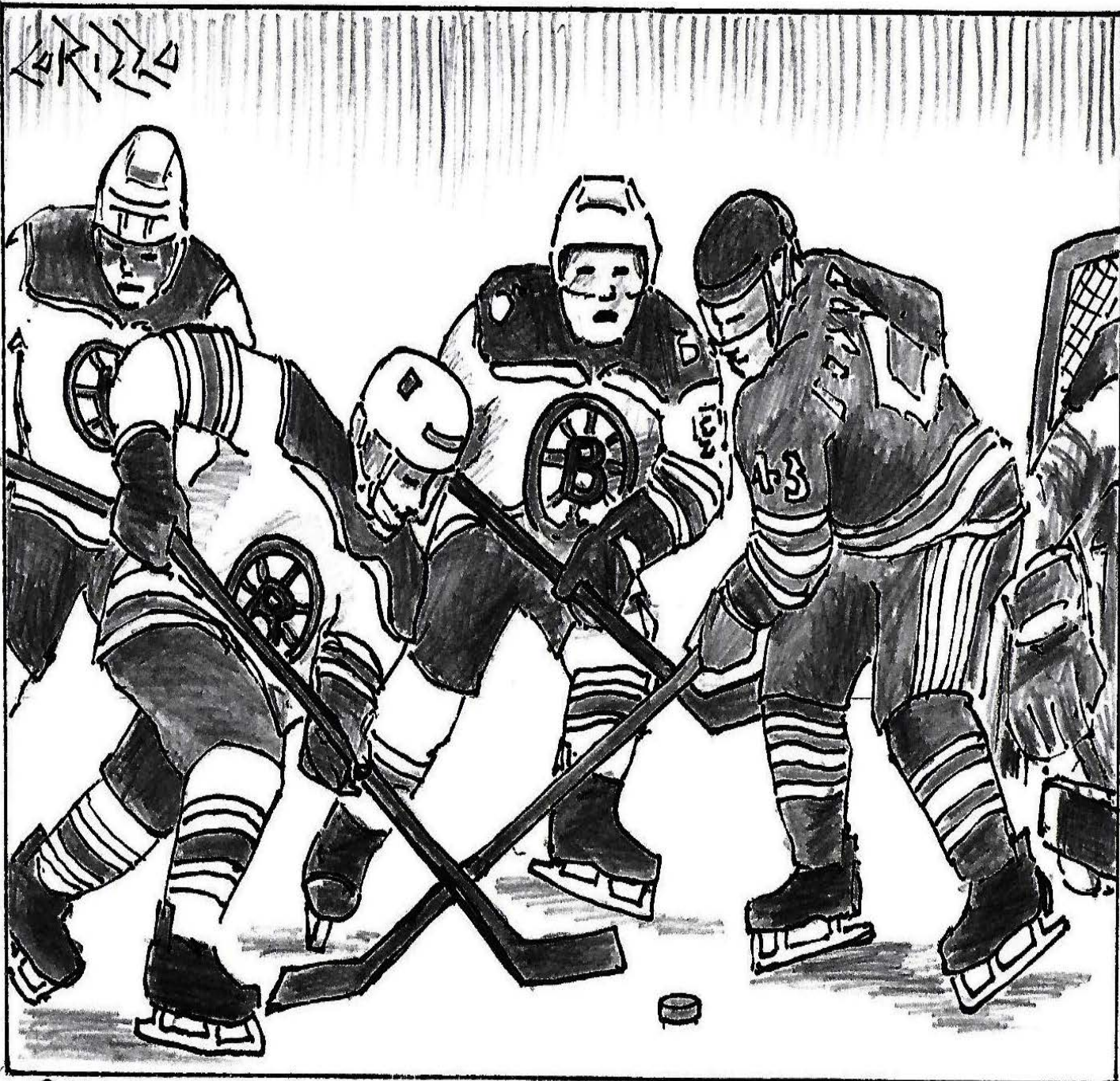

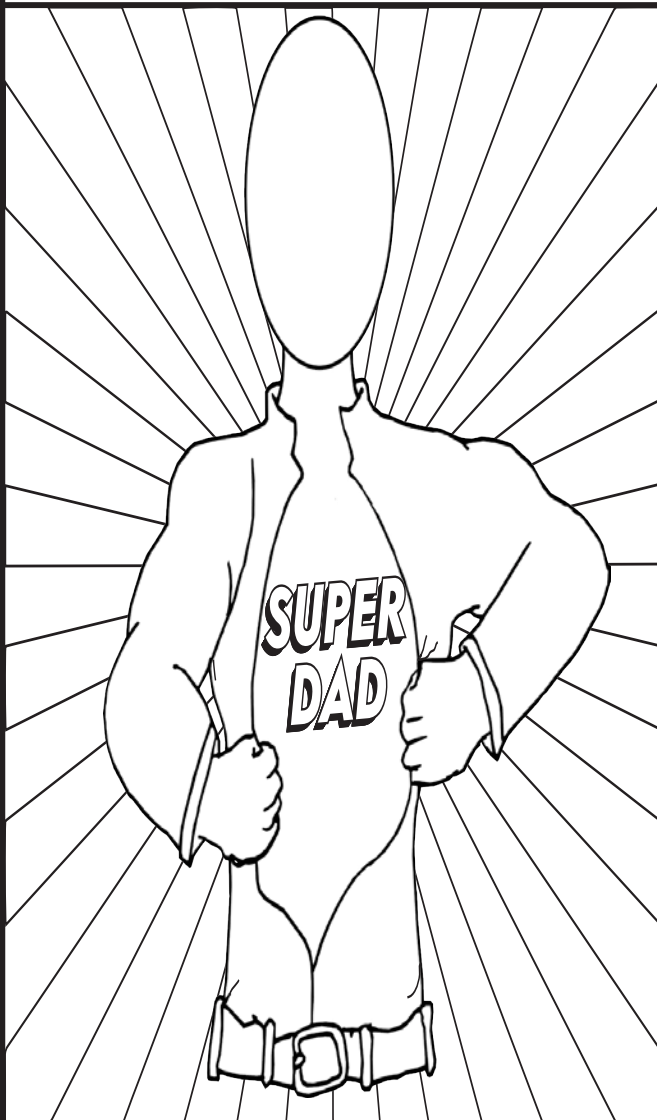

EHS softball team wins three straight to vault into tourney

The Everett High softball team won three games in four days last week to punch their ticket for a Journey to the Tourney.

The playoff-clinching victory came Friday evening with a 14-0 victory over Waltham that was an appropriate celebration of Senior Night festivities at Glendale Park.

Ariana Garay tossed all five innings (the contest ended early because of the mercy rule) for the Lady Crimson, allowing only three hits to post her second shutout of the season.

The Everett bats went right to work in the opening inning, scoring four runs. Base hits by Maddy Duraes and Veronica Bento set the table for an RBI base hit by Maddy Smith, a two-run triple by Kaylee Nearen, and an RBI single by Garay.

The Lady Crimson Tide then ended the contest for all intents and purposes with a 10-run outburst in the second inning. An RBI-triple by Duraes, a two-run homer by Bento, a double by Nearen, an RBI single by Yalixa Colon, and a two-run double by Bento accounted for the damage.

The Everett defense also shone throughout the contest in support of Garay.

"This was a great game, and even better that we got to honor our seniors; four-year starting catcher Kaylee Nearen and our seniors new this year, Yalixa Colon, Sidney Hennessey, and Rachel Zullo," said EHS head coach Stacy Poste-Schiavo.

The following day on Saturday, the Lady Crimson Tide traveled to Salem and returned home with a 9-6 victory.

Celeste Fuccillo assumed the pitching chores and tossed all seven innings in which Celeste struck out nine enemy batters.

Duraes manufactured a run in the top of the first when she reached on an error, advanced to second and third on passed balls, and eventually scored on an infield error.

Salem threatened in the bottom of the inning when the first two Lady Witches singled, but the Everett defense held firm, with Bento making a nice play at second to tag out an advancing runner, Duraes making a catch of an infield drive at shortstop, and Maddy D. accounting for the final out on a ground ball with the throw to Garay at first.

"We stopped them from scoring early, which was a big plus," said Poste-Schiavo.

Duraes made it 2-0 in the second with an RBI base hit that plated Haley Oteri, who had reached base on a bunt single. Fuccillo fanned the Salem side in the bottom of the inning.

The Lady Crimson Tide expanded their lead to 6-0 in the third, with Fuccillo once again striking out the side in the bottom of the inning. The Witches struck for three markers in the fourth, but that kept matters interesting only until the top of the sixth, when Everett responded with three markers to make it a 9-3 ballgame.

Salem once again threatened in the bottom of the sixth, but a nice play at third by Smith, who faked a throw and tagged out the runner, another "K" by Fuccillo, and a ground-out back to Celeste limited the damage to one run.

Salem rallied some more in the seventh, but the Everett defense and a strikeout by Fuccillo ended the contest at 9-6.

"This was our fourth game in a row this week because of all of our rainouts," noted Poste-Schiavo. "We are taking each game one at a time at this point and focusing on improving our record for the tournament."

Earlier in the week, Everett defeated Malden but fell to a Medford team that is ranked in the top 20 in Eastern Mass.

In the win over the Lady Golden Tornadoes, Garay tossed all seven frames, fanning seven opponents and allowing just two earned runs on five hits.

Everett moved out fast, with back-to-back doubles by Nearen and Garay accounting

Everett added a solo tally in the fourth and back-to-back, two-run doubles by Smith and Nearen upped the count to 10-3. Colon then put the icing on the Everett victory cake with a two-run double in the seventh for the 12-3 finale.

"Ariana did a great job pitching," said Poste-Schiavo. "She was on her game and her defense backed her up when Malden did put the ball in play. After coming off of the loss against Medford, the girls wanted and needed this win."

Although the Medford contest ended in a final score of 14-7 in favor of the Lady Mustangs, Everett held a 6-2 lead after two innings and led 7-5 going into the top of the seventh.

However, the Lady Mustangs erupted for nine runs in the final inning to pull away for the win.

Smith (3-for-4) had a big day at the plate with an RBI double and a solo home run. Bento went 2-for-4 with a double and a triple and Sidney Hennessey was 2-for-3 with a single and a double.

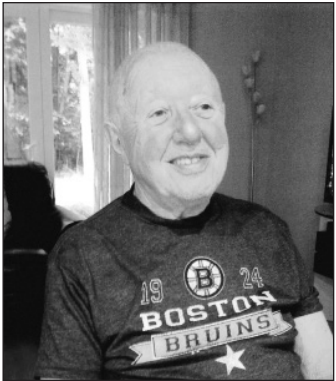
Orlando D. Cucchiara

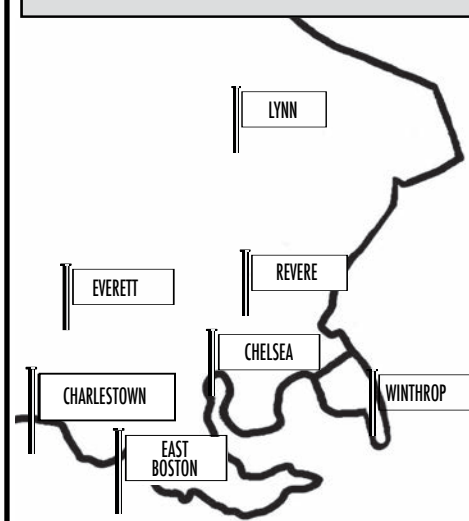
