of the hospital three days earlier – on Monday – and they were telling me Brandon Conde Day was on Thursday.

“I thought the whole thing was extraordinary to say the least,” he continued. “Usually when we see the community come together it’s with a homecoming that is planned for an entire year. To see this come together in a week or two was extraordinary. It’s unfortunate everyone came together due to what happened to me, but it’s extraordinary that so many were there to support me.”

Conde, now in his 20s, is an Everett High Graduate from the Class of 2012, and was on the 2010 Super Bowl Champion football team. An accomplished football player in high school, many remembered him on the field, and many teachers remembered him from the classroom.

But all shuddered when they learned what happened to him.

Conde said it was July 4 and very hot outside. His friends had been planning on going to a BBQ, but he was about ready to start a job at Logan Airport the next day. So, he said, he decided to just stay home and go to bed.

His friends went on to the party.

Sleeping next to the window, it is believed that he rolled over the screen or sash busted out under his weight, and he fell from the second floor to the pavement below.

Conde remembers none of it. He only remembers being awakened by his friends while lying there – and not being able to move.

“I went to bed, and then I woke up in what seemed like one moment, and I was on the pavement,” he said. “The interesting thing about the fall is my friends were coming back from the cookout, and accidentally found me there. They were coming home, and supposed to go left, but accidentally went right. It was a total accident, but it made them have to come by my house and that’s when they saw me.”

The heartwarming welcome home, however, has roots in his friends Widmac Laterion and Jess Trejo coming to City Hall to ask Mayor Carlo DeMaria to help Conde. His recovery

was expensive, and programs to help him try to walk again are also expensive. The tale of Conde’s tragic accident, and his fight to walk again really hit a chord with DeMaria. After talking it over with his staff, they decided to have Brandon Conde Day on Oct. 24. A GoFundMe Page had been established with a goal of \$50,000, but at the time only had \$16,000. The City and the School Department decided to have everyone wear red, and donations would be accepted all day. The result was the entire city pretty much dressed itself in red.

That night, a Brandon Conde Gala was held at the Schiavo Club, and on Monday Mayor DeMaria announced that the effort had helped the family hit their goal.

“On the morning of October 24, Brandon’s GoFundMe had reached \$22,000,” wrote the mayor. “However, the City of Everett, its employees, its students, and its residents knew how vitally important their role was in helping to achieve the goal of \$50,000. During the day, over \$10,000 was donated directly to the GoFundMe account. The School Department matched this, donating an additional \$10,000. Following the City-sponsored Brandon Conde event at the Schiavo Club on the night of October 24, I am proud to announce that we managed to surpass the \$50,000 goal. As a community, we raised close to \$30,000 in one day, and words truly cannot express how proud I am of everyone who helped make this goal a reality.”

And that’s exactly how the Conde family feels.

“Words really don’t ex-

press how much I appreciate and feel for my community,” said Conde. “I just cannot believe so many people rallied to support me.”

His mother, Rosie Sanon, said they have lived in Everett 19 years, and have had kids in the schools and been active in the community. In the midst of their tragedy, they never dreamed so many would rush to their aid.

She said teachers from the Parlin and Everett High remembered them, and elected officials offered so much help.

“The whole family – we are so encouraged,” she said. “We have lived in Everett the last 19 years. I didn’t expect any of this. It’s a small community. It brought the whole community together in an amazing way. We felt very special. We happy and blessed to live in Everett.”

Conde said his next step is applying to the Journey Forward program, which helps those injured to get back on path of walking.

“It’s been 100 days and now it’s time to move forward,” he said. “We have the application, so we should be hearing from the shortly and if we don’t, we’ll certainly be reminding them.”

Said Mayor DeMaria, “I want to reiterate how proud I am of Everett. It is clear that Everett is so much more than just a city; Everett is a community. And, when a member of our community is in need, we band together and show our true colors.”

residence in Everett.

“I couldn’t be more proud of him,” said Mrs. Sainristil about Mikey, the 2018 Mass. Gatorade Player of the Year. “We all know what Mikey can do. God is watching over him and helped make this all possible.”

Sainristil was the Wolverines’ leading receiver in the game with three catches for 73 yards.

Michigan Coach Jim Harbaugh said Sainristil is making great strides as a steady contributor in the team’s offensive attack.

“Mike really made the most of his opportunities, no question,” said Harbaugh. “He had a big third-down catch early in the game, and that was great to

see. It was tough to catch the ball at that point in the game when it was really raining.

“His touchdown was terrific,” added Harbaugh. He got wide open and our quarterback found him for a big gain. Mike’s three catches made a big impact and I thought he also blocked well. We’ve seen a lot of growth from Mikey lately, especially the last four weeks in practice. He’s gained a lot of confidence. He has always been good route-running, but he went through a spell where he wasn’t catching the ball real great and now his confidence is back, and it’s surging.”

Michigan improved to 6-2 and is now ranked 14th

in the Associated Press national poll.

Sainristil and the Wolverines will try to keep the momentum going against Maryland this Saturday.

“I’ll be watching,” said Mrs. Sainristil. “I’m looking forward to seeing Mikey in person when they play Michigan State (Nov. 16).”

“There should be some excitement,” he said. “The numbers could go higher on voter turnout depending on what the candidates have done. My assumptions are based on past elections, but things can always change.”

Those on the ballot include a very hotly contested Council at-Large race, where 10 candidates are vying for five seats. There are five incumbents and

five challengers. They include (in order of Preliminary Election finish):

Councilor Wayne Matewsky, Councilor John Hanlon, Council President Rich Dell Isola, Councilor Michael Marchese, Candidate Gerly Adrien, Councilor Peter Napolitano, Candidate Catherine Tomassi Hicks, Candidate Steve Simonelli, Candidate Renee Solano, and Candi-

date Joseph Mathew LaMonica.

In the Wards, there are contested races in Ward 2, Ward 5, and Ward 6. In Ward 2 – an open seat – Candidate Jason Marcus faces Candidate Stephanie Martins. In Ward 5, Councilor Rosa DiFlorio will contest against Candidate Vivian Nguyen. In Ward 6, Councilor Michael McLaughlin will face Candidate Al Lattanzi.

Unopposed are Ward 1 Councilor Fred Capone, Ward 3 Councilor Anthony DiPierro, and Ward 4 Candidate Tri Le.

On the School Committee, there are several interesting races, including the at-large race where there are two vacancies out of three seats. Competing for those seats will be School Committeewoman Millie Cardello, Candidate David Lindsey, Candidate Richard Liston, Candidate Cynthia Sarnie, Candidate Samantha Lambert, Candidate Dan Skerritt and Candidate Angelmarie DiNunzio.

In the Wards, there are races in Ward 1, Ward 3, Ward 4 and Ward 6.

There are 12 polling places in 10 buildings, and they are open on Nov. 5 from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

“It should be a good election and we’ve done a lot of work to make sure things are done right,” Cornelio said. “We actually have new signs we’ve purchased to clearly mark the polling places so that everyone can see them.”

Domestic Violence Awareness  
Month, spotlight on Portal to Hope

October is National Domestic Violence Awareness Month. All month long, cities across the country have celebrated initiatives to raise awareness of domestic violence and to educate the public about prevention and intervention strategies. But as the month comes to a close, the fight against intimate partner violence continues. One local agency is leading that fight.

Portal to Hope (PTH) is a nonprofit organization founded in 1996 that serves survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking in Everett and surrounding towns. It was founded by Deborah Fallon, herself a survivor of intimate partner abuse. According to its website, its mission is to “promote equality, respect for individuality and to help ensure that survivors live happy, healthy lives, safe from abuse.” Every year it provides services to almost a thousand individuals whose lives have been impacted by partner violence.

PTH works directly with individuals and families fleeing family violence by providing emergency shelter at secure locations. It collects donations on behalf of survivors through its Benevolence Project. Food,

clothes, vehicles and cell phones are regularly gathered to distribute to those fleeing violent partners.

Beyond meeting the day-to-day needs of survivors and their families, PTH also offers confidential support groups and referrals to mental health professionals. It works with survivors to secure long-term housing, employment and legal aid to ensure their ongoing safety.

The youth programs at PTH are meant to inform young people about the dangers of dating violence and how to recognize potentially abusive behavior. In connection with the Everett Police, PTH offers a summer internship program for teens who want to become leaders in the fight against violence. Erin’s Project is another youth-focused program that works with teen girls who have experienced family or partner violence. The initiative works with girls to raise their self-esteem, teach them self-reliance and empower them to be leaders in their communities.

PTH also offers individualized advocacy for families of active and retired military personnel in connection with Hanscom Air Force Base.

PTH conducts community outreach and domestic

violence education through its Speakers Bureau where survivors are encouraged to share their stories in public forums in order to increase public awareness about intimate partner violence. It also hosts a quarterly Domestic Violence Task Force.

In 1998, PTH partnered with the City of Everett and the Everett Police Department to form EVAPorate Violence, a pioneering law enforcement response team that has garnered national acclaim and has served over 5,000 individuals since its inception, with half of those being children. EVAPorate Violence trains law enforcement officials to swiftly and efficiently deal with issues of domestic violence and stalking. It offers legal aid and extended shelter stays to those fleeing family violence, and hosts violence prevention activities.

PTH is always seeking volunteers, guest speakers and partners in its Domestic Violence Task Force. To get involved, call 781-338-7678 or go to portaltohope.org.

Le also said she is not the kind of person who would normally raise a complaint.

“I’m a very quiet person and I never bother anybody,” she said. “I just wanted people to know what [Councilor McLaughlin] did.”

Councilor Anthony DiPierro, who manages Lattanzi’s election campaign, presented an item asking that the Committee on Legislative Affairs and Elections convene an executive session to look into the complaint. Both Councilors DiPierro and McLaughlin are members on that committee.

Council approved the request, while Councilor McLaughlin recused himself from the vote.

“Everyone has the right

to be heard,” said Councilor DiPierro. “If we don’t police ourselves, who will? I just want the process to play out.”

The session would include Le, any other witnesses to the alleged incident, Councilor McLaughlin and the City Solicitor. Committee members would have the chance to investigate the veracity and consistency of the plaintiff’s claims, as well as her personal credibility.

Both Councilor McLaughlin and Le told the Independent that they would be happy to participate in the executive session in order to bring the truth to light.

The councilor said he was grateful that his colleague had presented the

item.

“It gives me the opportunity to clear my name and to protect my reputation in Everett, which is strong,” he said. “I’m pleased that we can talk about it.”

The executive session will likely take place after next week’s elections, which will allow the process to play out independently of any political motivations. Councilor McLaughlin will remove himself as a committee member for that session in order to avoid any conflict of interests.

“If the case is true, apologize and move on,” Councilor DiPierro told the Independent. “Maybe it didn’t happen. Let’s figure it out and find out who’s telling the truth.”

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BE SURE TO VOTE TUESDAY

This Tuesday, Nov. 5, is election day in cities and some towns across the state for local offices, including mayoral and council contests.

Not too long ago, local elections in Massachusetts routinely drew voter turnouts of 80-90 percent, almost equivalent to, if not exceeding, presidential elections. However, in recent decades, voter turnout typically has been no more than 30 percent for municipal elections.

We find it ironic that local elections attract the attention of only a fraction of the voters who turn out for the state and national elections. Local government, and those whom we elect to serve in those posts, have much more of an impact on our daily lives than do our state and federal governments.

Local government is in charge of our public safety departments, our schools, our trash collection, the condition of our streets, and almost everything else in between.

The quality of life in our hometown communities affects our families and ourselves -- and our property values -- far more directly than what transpires at the state and national levels.

So we urge all of our readers to get out and vote on Tuesday. The aphorism about the weather -- that we all complain about it, but can't do anything about it -- does not apply to our local government.

We do indeed have the ability to affect what happens at our local government level -- but only if we take the time to vote.

This week's King Tide highlights the work  
Everett needs to do on climate preparedness

Everett residents and business owners are increasingly experiencing flooding from both heavier rainstorms and coastal storms. Many residents have experienced increased flooding in certain neighborhoods and small businesses along the Island End River report that they have come to expect to be flooded with saltwater at least once a year during big storms.

Even as Everett is undergoing an enormous economic resurgence, we have to learn to manage chronic flooding related to climate change. This past Tuesday, just after noon, we got a preview of the new reality of higher high tides. We experienced a "King Tide," the astronomical high tide that occurs when the sun and the moon are aligned and the moon is closest to the earth in its orbit. Approximately two feet above normal high tides, King Tides give us a sneak peek of what our twice-daily high tide will look like with two feet of sea level rise, expected sometime after mid-century. Add a few feet more from a good Nor'easter, and the city will flood regularly without intervention.

As we are all increasingly aware, we are a community surrounded by water. The Mystic River, the Malden River, Island End River, North and South Creek and Town Line Brook are all in and around Everett. After decades of public investment

and volunteer efforts, these rivers are now tremendous amenities, attracting new residents and businesses, including Encore Boston Harbor.

Flooding can occur when runoff from major rain events overwhelms our storm drainage system, or when we see abnormally high tides that result in coastal flooding. When these occur at the same time our rivers can swell with floodwaters and jump their banks or back up our stormwater drains. This can cause people's basements to fill with sewage and other toxic pollution. Major flooding can ruin homes, businesses and infrastructure, and can pollute the river and harbor we've spent billions to clean up.

Because Everett is so densely populated, most of our surface area is either built out or paved. During major storms water cannot infiltrate into the ground and flows quickly over the surface and into our storm drains. As our climate warms we are experiencing dramatic rainfall events which can overwhelm our storm drainage system. That is why we have continued to increase our city investment in repairing and maintaining that system. We have removed tons of debris from our catch basins, increased our street sweeping to remove sediment before it enters the storm drain system and inspected our drains lines to ensure they are not blocked with debris.

In addition, we have updated storm water reg-

ulations, reduced parking requirements, passed a driveway ordinance, and built new "rain gardens" and "bioswales"; all in an effort to reduce impervious surface cover and allow water drain into the ground rather than overwhelming our stormwater system. We are also working with our neighbors to ensure water that enters the storm drain system in Everett flows smoothly to our rivers, streams and ocean, even as it flows through other communities.

Last year, we experienced two "hundred-year" storms in two months, each of which equaled the Blizzard of '78. The storm surge from the ocean broke through the parking lot of the New England Produce Center, and came within 18 inches of over-topping and damaging the Amelia Earhart Dam. Many of our longtime businesses and transportation infrastructure, including a major MBTA commuter rail line, are located along our waterfront in areas increasingly vulnerable to coastal storms and sea level rise.

These are some of the reasons why we are working hard to identify and decrease our risks of damage when these storms do occur. We are committed to sustainably moving our economy forward while building climate resiliency into major new projects and retrofits.

For example: We are repairing tide gates and installing new ones on our stormwater drains to reduce inland flooding during abnormally

high tides. We are partnering with the City of Chelsea on a flood control project that will create a living shoreline, add a walking path, and dramatically reduce the risk to vulnerable populations, infrastructure, and businesses at the northern end of the Island End River. Everett is also a founding member of the Resilient Mystic Collaborative, a highly-effective, voluntary partnership among 16 municipalities and the Mystic River Watershed Association.

Finally, we are working with public and private partners to daylight as much of the Island End River as possible. A century ago, our ancestors buried the Island End River to form the area between Beacham Street and Route 16. With heavier storms, this underground culvert is failing, causing dangerous sinkholes in the parking lot. By actively restoring or "daylighting" the river, we will reduce polluted runoff, address flash flooding concerns, and improve the livability of this area of the city that has long been forgotten.

As your mayor, my goal is for our community to sustainably provide the amenities and services that residents expect, while working to protect our city from the dramatic effects of climate change. On September 26, Widmac Laterion and Jess Trejo came to my office to share the story of their friend, Brandon Conde, who had suffered a life-altering spinal cord injury which rendered him a tetraplegic. While telling me the moving story of Brandon, I could feel the love they had for Brandon and it compelled me to help them out in any way that I could. At the time, the GoFundMe they set up for Brandon had achieved a donation total of \$16,500, well-short of their \$50,000 goal.

Brandon's story stuck

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# Planning Board weighs parking concerns, future of Everett in Broadway project

Once again, the Planning Board comes down to a philosophical dilemma.

While the city and the region are at a generational crossroads when it comes to parking and traffic – and just how people get around a place like Everett – frequently those hard discussions happen at the Everett Planning Board.

That was the case on Monday night when Volney Capital introduced its 85-unit, 33 parking space, mixed use apartment building to the public and the Board.

There was a great deal of support from those who believe Everett has to build more such properties and people need to depend less on their cars, and more on public transit and ride-shares.

There was also a great deal of dissent from residents, many of whom were abutters, who felt that without enough parking, the project would tank and its troubles would leach onto them.

“It’s a beautiful building,” said Member Leo Pizzano. “There’s no argument

about that. But does it belong there? Questionable.”

That set the tone for the discussion, which is a major policy decision that will make or break a city like Everett in the coming years.

John Tocco, formerly the community relations liaison for Encore, introduced the project with his fellow team members, including Ricky Beliveau of Volney. Beliveau has done several smaller projects in South Boston, East Boston and Chelsea, but this would be his first in Everett – and it is a project he is very excited about.

“We really want to build something special for the residents and for the community,” said Tocco. “We have every intention on staying here a long time... We want to build something everyone enjoys. We want to do more in Everett. We aren’t going to slop it up and then go off to DC or Washington state. We’re here to stay.”

The team explained the project at 596-602 Broadway would be targeted to a modest luxury price range to attract young people working at their first jobs – perhaps many employees of Encore – and older adults

looking to downsize but stay in Everett. It is a product that is complimented by a restaurant concept on the ground floor by Everett’s Chris Moreira – owner of the Square Deli.

Moreira said he plans to move his popular deli into the new building, where he would offer quick sandwiches and continue his catering business. However, in the back he would open a full-service restaurant that would cater to the neighborhood and the new residents in the building.

The six-story building does have too many stories, but in actuality is only three feet above the allowed limit in the area – which is a pioneering area of the City between Everett Square and Glendale.

The issue came down to parking and traffic. There are 33 spaces, but the zoning in that area would require more than 200 parking spaces for a project of that size.

The development team said they are catering to a clientele that doesn’t want a car and doesn’t need a parking spot. They are people who want to use public transportation, bicycles, and ride-shares – and live

minimally as 75 percent of the units are studios or one-bedrooms.

“We are not even marketing this to someone who feels they need a car and a parking spot,” said Tocco. “If you’re someone like me that drives a big truck and has two kids, then you’re not even going to look at this place.”

Some agreed, saying that the momentum of the casino is taking the City to a housing product like this one, which is dubbed ‘The 600.’

“I’ve seen where Everett’s been and where I’d like to see it go,” said Rich Eliseo, who had served closely with Tocco in visioning for the City on Everett United. “I understand the parking. It’s tough, but where do we start? We want to better Everett. I think parking is a problem. We know that. To bring Everett back, we can’t bring it back to where it was. We have to bring it forward. We have to start somewhere. We don’t have the land like other communities to build a big parking facility...Where are we going? We have to start somewhere. Let’s start here.”

But others said it was a mistake to think along the

lines that building more parking brings more cars. That’s because the cars are already here, they said, and the traffic jams already exist.

“I agree Everett needs to move forward, but 33 spaces is going to be a terrible idea,” said Shawn McCulloch of Hosmer Street. “I already have a problem with people parking in my driveway to go to McKinnon’s. The fire hydrant has been struck seven times by people parking in front of it. If you’re saying parking isn’t going to be an issue, you couldn’t be more wrong.”

Member James Tarr – who is new to the Planning Board – said a lack of parking isn’t going to affect his view on the project.

“This is the way things are going,” he said. “My wife and I wanted to live in Everett because of access. I can get on the T and go to Boston when I want. I try to shed my car as much as I can. A lack of parking and 33 spaces wouldn’t stop me from being in support of this project.”

However, another new member, Shayane Rangel, said she feels like there should be more parking.

“Parking to me is very

important,” she said. “It’s very critical and you’re adding more to what is there. You’re probably going to need a little more parking.”

But it comes down to the philosophy of it all, which was evidenced by a conversation between him and Moreira about new ways of living versus old ways of living.

“I’m not concerned about a lack of parking as a restaurant operator,” said Moreira. “If the food is good and they like the place, people will get there. I hardly ever drive to a restaurant I like. I just pop into an Uber. Most people take an Uber.”

But not people of the philosophy of Pizzano.

“The first thing I look for is a parking spot,” said Pizzano. “I won’t go to a restaurant if there’s not parking. That’s the difference in the philosophy between you and I...I’ve never taken an Uber and I don’t use the MBTA. It’s a difference in thoughts, that’s all.”

The matter was continued to the Nov. 12 meeting by a unanimous vote.

## Everett football hosts Acton-Boxboro in playoffs

The Everett High School football team will host Acton-Boxborough in a Division 1 North quarterfinal round playoff game Friday at 7 p.m. at Everett Veterans Memorial Stadium.

Everett (6-1) is the No. 4 seed in the eight-team sectional. Acton-Boxborough (5-2) is the No. 5 seed.

AB is a regional high school that competes in the tough Dual County League and draws students from the towns of Acton, Boxborough, and Stow. AB was a Division 2 superpower in the early 2000s, compiling a 50-game winning streak and capturing four Super

Bowl titles under Coach Bill Maver. Long-time Everett Pop Warner fans will remember the AB youth football teams as being perennial contenders for state and New England championships.

Everett, led by head coach Theluxon Pierre, carries a six-game winning streak in to the playoffs. After a misstep in the season opener versus Springfield Central, the Tide have been on a roll, with junior quarterback Duke Doherty piloting a balanced attack and the defense excelling during the six-game winning streak.

While Pierre is not looking past a talented AB Colonials contingent, some

Everett fans are ardently pointing toward a possible rematch against top-seeded Central Catholic in the semifinals. Central ousted Everett from the playoffs a year ago, with Nick Mazzie, the son of Everett Police Chief Steven Mazzie, kicking the winning field in the final minute of a 23-20 upset of the Tide. Should Everett and Central Catholic prevail this week, the two teams would meet in the semifinals.

Central (6-1) hosts No. 8 Lexington (2-5) in the quarterfinals. No. 2 St. John’s Prep (6-1) hosts No. 7 Lowell (3-4) while No. 3 Andover (5-2) hosts No. 6 Methuen (4-3) in the other quarterfinal round games.

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# Who called whom? Ward 3 School Committee comes down to he said-he said

The Ward 3 School Committee race has taken a few more wild turns this week as the two candidates and an outgoing member feud over who did what and when.

Outgoing School Committeeman Bernie D’Onofrio said this week that he in no way ever called Ward 3 School Committee candidate Robert Santocroce to tell him to run against Ward 3 Incumbent Frank Parker.

That was in dispute of what Santocroce told the Independent last week when interviewed about

some questionable advertisements that, in part, were allegedly lifted from advertisements published during a 1981 campaign – in some cases word for word. During the interview, Santocroce said – despite the rumors – he was not being backed by former Supt. Fred Foresteire. Instead, he said D’Onofrio had allegedly asked him to run – saying that he shouldn’t let Parker run unopposed.

This week D’Onofrio told the paper that is in no way true.

“I don’t even have his phone number,” he said. “I’m telling you straight up I have no idea where this

came from. Frank Parker and I get along. I think a lot of Frank and would never ask this kid to run. I don’t get involved in that...I did not do that and would never. I’ve never come out and supported anyone. I’m not in the business of calling people.”

D’Onofrio has served on the School Committee in an at-large seat for some time, but was disqualified from the ballot earlier this summer. He said he’s retiring from politics and has moved on from that part of his life.

Santocroce disputed that, saying that it was true D’Onofrio called him.

He offered to get records of the calls, which he said were in June, from Verizon to show the Independent. However, those records never arrived in time for the deadline on Tuesday.

“That is definitely true and I can prove it,” he said. “He did call me and he knows me. I worked for the School Department for a year. I have seen him around event in Everett many times, and I went to college with his daughter. I’ve known him for 15 years at least...He told me not to let Parker run unopposed. I was actually going to run for at-large (School Committee).”

Meanwhile, Santocroce is also disputing the account Frank Parker told about finding the advertisements – which he said came from his memories of working on a local political campaign in 1981 while in school. Using those memories, he was able to locate the ads in old newspapers at the library. The ads were astonishingly similar to Santocroce’s modern ads.

Santocroce said that Parker couldn’t have found them while in high school because he graduated in 1978.

Parker said he, indeed, wasn’t in high school, but rather in college.

“I’m pretty sure I said I was in school, and maybe that was interpreted as ‘high school,’ but I was in college at the time,” he said. “If that’s the best he can come up with, then best to him. It’s a week to go and I’m not going to be dragged into the negative.”

He said D’Onofrio has told him that he did not call Santocroce, and he said he believes him.

“Bernie and I have had our differences, but it comes down to who you believe,” said Parker. “I served with Bernie eight years, and I know where his heart is. Why would I doubt him?”

the zoning put in place in 2018. We had Stantec design it, and we know you are very familiar with them. It was a very unique opportunity to put these design guidelines to use in developing our project.”

Those design guidelines are the 2018 Commercial Triangle Economic Development Area, a guideline put in to encourage large residential or office developments over the traditional industrial uses that have been lining the Parkway for decades. Since 2018, no one has come in under the guidelines with a new project, but now Capital Hall has proposed the first large project for the area, calling themselves the “beta test” for the area.

What they came up with is something that the City Planners and Planning Board were quite impressed with to this point.

The project includes 591 units (about 88 units would be affordable housing units) of housing in two buildings, with 766 parking spaces on three levels and 7,300 sq. ft. of ground floor

retail. The design includes a sweeping front courtyard and entrance/exits/loading zones in the back off of Garvey Street. There is a dog park, three levels of parking that are very hidden from view, and a pedestrian walk through that empties into public courtyards.

It all sits on a massive 4.6 acre site that would need to be environmentally cleaned up.

The astounding thing about it all is that it all conforms to zoning guidelines. There are no special permits, variances or Planning Board approvals needed – only a Site Plan Review

Tamara Roy of Stantec said they designed the buildings to be broken up into two sites that have bump outs and angles to complement the flow of Second Street.

“The rhythm of the street is contouring as you walk down the street as opposed to being one single wall along the sidewalk,” she said. “There are setbacks and back massing.”

The project also raises the ground floor to 11’ to

make sure it is out of the flood plain for future climate change issues.

Member Leo Pizzano said he liked the building a great deal, but his number one concern will be parking and traffic.

“We’re going to key on traffic,” she said. “When the traffic plan comes before us, it will be scrutinized and we’ll probably be asking for a peer review because we don’t want one fix-all. We will key on how you plan to get the traffic in and out of there.”

The Traffic Engineer for the project said they plan on using the Garvey Street area as a way of avoiding cars entering Second Street.

One of the team members from Capital Hall indicated they have been trying to buy the All Checks Cashied store in front of their property – abutting the Parkway – but nothing has been negotiated yet.

Planner Tony Sousa said Capital Hall is expected to file their project very soon, and that he expects them to be before the Planning Board on Dec. 9.





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
