In the speech, as a very short announcement that was much bigger news than the space it took up, the mayor said the City is working towards a new Police Station.

"We are in the process of designing a new Police Station," he said with a smile,

Councilor Rosa DiFlorio elected president in 10-0 vote

The crowds were enormous on Monday night, Jan. 6, as residents packed the Council Chambers at City Hall to usher in the new, most diverse Council ever in City history.

It was standing room only for the ceremony that

welcomed three new councilors and a host of returning incumbents, who will be led in 2020 by new Council President Rosa DiFlorio who is also the dean of the Council.

As the Everett High String Orchestra played several medleys, crowds began to gather in the

Chambers more than 30 minutes ahead of the 6 p.m. ceremony. Many in the audience were there to see the swearing in of new Councilors Gerly Adrien, Stephanie Martins and Jimmy Tri Le. They represented a major influx of new, and diverse, leadership on the body - joining a Council

that had already begun to forge its own path in City Hall during the latter part of

The new councilors were joined by returning councilors Fred Capone, Anthony DiPierro, DiFlorio, Michael McLaughlin, John Hanlon,

Local tax collections show strength for Encore hotel in last quarter of 2019 had its operations running state releases the numbers

tel operators in Everett, that being Encore and the EnVision Hotel. EnVision has been up and running for about 18 months now,

about \$100,000 per quarter

in hotel excise before En-

core opened in June 2019.

That would roughly figure out to Encore accounting for \$1.2 million of the latest quarter in excise tax signaling that the hotel has been much busier than it was in the opening period for the resort.

In the fiscal year 2017, Everett had zero dollars collected the entire year for hotel excise – meaning that if the Encore casino con-

Abruzzese returns as chair of School Committee

When School Committeeman Tom Abruzzese walked into the annual organizational meeting last year during the first meeting of the year, he had no idea he would emerge as the chair.

In fact, in one of the most pressure-packed and contentious years on the School Committee for decades, Abruzzese lent his leadership to the body, and this Monday, his returning colleagues and new members gave him another year as chair.

In a unanimous vote, Abruzzese was elected chair of the School Committee for a second term Monday night.

"Last year I wasn't prepared to say anything because it was a complete surprise," he said after being elected. "This year, I wanted to be prepared with a few comments. Unfortunately, when I started to write things down, my pen started writing positive things, but turned into negative things. Maybe I'm growing sensitive in my old age. Even tonight there was a negative spin on something we did. I want to move past the negative this year. It's a great School Committee. It's exciting to see different faces faces that have already given me good advice.

"Unlike last year, when I didn't know what to expect, this year I'll have a better handle on things," he con-

Mayor details vast vision for City of Everett in Midterm Address

In a speech that will likely set the tone for the new decade, Mayor Carlo DeMaria delivered a vast vision in a 70-minute Midterm Address to the City Council in a jam-packed Council Chambers on Monday night, Jan. 6, titling it 'Pride, Progress and Possibilities' – a motto often seen on signage around Everett.

"To some, this motto may mean nothing more

than a string of four words," he said. "To me, however, this motto serves as an homage to who we are, a reflection on what we've accomplished, and a call to action for innovation and implementation. Everett is driven by its residents, and is fast becoming a home to new faces, new businesses, and new ideas. We serve as pioneers throughout the State and nation. Our color

Superintendent contracts with consultant for education funding

A new consultant has been contracted by the Everett Public Schools to advise the district on the increased funding and implementation of the Student Opportunity Act – the wide-ranging education reform bill signed into law last November.

Interim Supt. Janice Gauthier told the School Committee on Monday in their first meeting of the year that she had executed a contract with Ribas Associates to come up with a three-year plan for the Stu-

dent Opportunity Act. The Act looks to bring a lot of new funding into the district incrementally over the next seven years, starting in this year's State Budget. Districts all over the state particularly Gateway City districts like Everett, Chelsea and Revere - have begun planning for the best uses of the money as it begins to come in.

Gauthier said it would likely be similar to a District Improvement Plan, and that former Lexington Supt. Paul Ash would be working on the Everett plan.

"This is a reality that is coming along soon," said Gauthier. "It will be very interesting work and it's all about the kids and raising them up the best way possible."

 Executive Session Soon Chair Tom Abruzzese said the Committee and its new members would need to have an Executive Session briefing as soon as possible and before the next meeting on Jan. 21.

He said he thought that meeting would take place sometime next week.

"There are some things you have to be made aware of that are going on in the Everett Public Schools," he

2020 residential parking stickers now available

Mayor Carlo DeMaria and the Office of the Parking Clerk would like to notify residents to obtain their residential parking stickers.

Vehicle owners must visit the website https:// everettparking.cityhallsystems.com/ and submit an online application in order to receive their stickers. Please make sure any prior parking violations and excise tax must be fully paid prior to submitting an application. Once the online application is complete, stickers will then be mailed directly to the resident. A link to the parking sticker website will also be available on the City's official website, cityofeverett.com as well as the City's Facebook Page.

As a courtesy, stickers may still be obtained for FREE until February 28th. Then, beginning March 1st, the \$10, per sticker, fee will once again be reinstated.

Residents may apply for up to 4 stickers per online application. Information required to complete the application include name, address (include floor number and apartment number, if applies), license plate number, the name that appears on the registration, email and phone number. Please make sure any prior parking violations and excise tax must be fully paid prior to submitting an application. Once a resident has successfully submitted an application, they will receive an email notification of the order. Upon verification of their information, the resident will then receive an additional email as confirmation that the order has been successfully processed. The parking sticker will then be mailed to the

To assist residents with the process, the Mayor's Office of Constituent Services will be available to help navigate the online application.

The process for obtaining visitor placards will remain the same. Anyone wishing to request a visitor placard must do so in person at the Parking Clerk's Office at City Hall. Visitor placards are required for any visitors of Everett residents who wish to park overnight on the streets of Everett. Visitor placards cost \$5 for a one-night

pass, \$10 for a 7-day pass, \$15 for a 14-day pass, \$20 for a 21-day pass and \$25 for a 30-day pass.

In order to obtain a visitor placard a resident must show proof of residency. Residency can be established with a MA driver's license, utility bill or lease. The license plate number of the visitor's vehicle must be provided at time of request. The visitor placard shall be displayed on the driver's side of the dashboard, clearly visible through the windshield.

All Residents MUST fill out the 2020 City Census form prior to renewing their residential sticker application.

is crimson, but our standard

In a speech that covered everything from the flu shot clinics to community charitable efforts to transportation revolutions to healthy school lunches - the mayor called for Everett in the new decade to be the "happiest and healthiest community in the Commonwealth."

It builds on his previous work in the last five years that has stressed healthy living, healthy food choices and frequent exercise - those coming in policy initiatives like his Food Council and the City-operated Health & Wellness Center in the old Everett High School on Broadway.

Standing at the podium, and keeping the mood light, the mayor detailed numerous agenda items he hopes to bring to the residents and propose to the new Council.

Chief among those items - and in keeping with his policy on health and wellness – he detailed a plan to sell the Everett Veterans Memorial Stadium on the Parkway for development. That sale, he said, would be able to completely pay off the bonds used to construct a new Stadium and Wellness Center in the new RiverGreen Park on the banks of the Malden River.

on relocating Everett Veteran's Memorial Stadium, shifting away from the congested residential parcel off of Revere Beach Parkway to the new RiverGreen Park area," he said. "In doing so, we hope to join together a brand new, state-of-the-art stadium with our health and wellness center, community spaces, training facilities, and a new locker room facility, finally granting to our storied Everett athletic department the amenities that they have earned over the years. The stadium's offerings will be open for use by all of our residents, regardless of the sport they play, their gender, or their age."

That was not breaking news, as the mayor announced those intentions at his Inaugural Address two years ago. However, what was new were more detailed plans and the decision to sell the current Stadium for development. Two years ago, that was not yet decided, as school officials at the time supported the move, but wanted the Stadium land to potentially build another new elementary school to handle the grow-

ing school-age population. That seems to be no longer in the cards, as the mayor detailed a plan to pay for the new Stadium and fitness area with the proceeds from the sale of the Stadium.

"The same can be said with the proposed new stadium development: taxes generated from the development of the old stadium site will assist in funding the construction of the new stadium," he said.

The mayor said doubling the size of the Wellness Center, installing collegiate-level facilities and building a brand-new Stadium would cost the City about \$50 million. He said they would bond the project for \$30 years, which in today's dollars would amount "We have the intention to about \$2 million a year in payments. He said by selling the eight acres of land at the Stadium for development - which currently generates no tax dollars the City could pay the Stadium bond just by the new taxes from development on the Stadium property at the Parkway.

"The site that the Stadium currently sits upon is around 8 acres of land; land that generates no taxes for the City," he said. "In the current market, best-use development of a parcel of land off of the heavily trafficked Route 16 would generate approximately

\$500,000 in taxes per year per acre. What this means is that when half of the Route 16 stadium site is developed, the taxes generated would cover the expense of the new stadium."

Within that plan, the mayor said any Request for Proposals would emphasize the importance of retaining open space on the site, and adding public parking facilities for the Connolly Center and businesses on Chelsea Street and the Parkway.

"Although we are a City, we handle our financial matters like a business," he said. "Our investments are sound and we spend our money wisely. By doing so, it enables us to progress as a City without burdening the taxpayer."

For the new Stadium, he said they have already begun working on a new shared parking agreement that would leverage existing parking in the area. He said by using underutilized parking lots like the BNY Mellon lot, the RiverGreen lot, the Boston Coach Fidelity lot, and the Best Buy lot, they could handle parking for large events like graduation and homecom-

ing football games. "We will be able to accommodate for the increases in vehicular traffic during events with the over 2,000 spaces already in existence in the area without the need to construct any additional

parking facilities," he said. He also added it would help prevent visitors from being towed in lots near the existing Stadium at events like graduation - which happened in June 2019. That, he said, would help those visiting the Stadium and those who live adjacent

to the old Stadium. The proposed new Stadium would not have any immediate residential abutters as the existing one does now on Cabot Street and others.

be a new revenue stream of many millions of dollars coming into the City beyond the Host Community Agreement mitigation pay-

For comparison, the City of Chelsea collects on average around \$600,000 per quarter in hotel excise, and it has five high-quality hotels now operating in that

For the meals taxes, the story didn't seem to be so spectacular.

Like hotel excise, meals taxes can be used as a barometer for the health of restaurants in the city - particularly those at Encore.

In the last quarter of SECOND 2019, the meals taxes for Everett (which includes taxes collected from all restaurants in the city – not just Encore restaurants) was \$345,441. That was up from the first quarter of Encore operations, when collections came in at \$255,474. Prior to Encore opening, the City averaged meals tax collections of around \$150,000 per quar-

ter. was expected that meals tax collections would be much higher quarterly than they have come in so

In other news, Wynn Resorts made its second quarterly mitigation payment under the Host Community Agreement to the City on Dec. 31.

Everett Chief Financial Officer Eric Demas confirmed that Wynn Resorts issued the City payments of \$5 million and \$1.25 million, which are the quarterly amounts prescribed under the Agreement.

The next payment would come at the end of March.


The payments would total just under \$30 million for the year.

City Hall to open new Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

The City will begin a new effort to make sure all residents have their voice heard, and Mayor Carlo DeMaria said that will start with the opening of an Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion to make sure all programs and services are available to everyone in Everett - no matter what language or background they bring to the Hall.

The mayor made the announcement in his Midterm Address as part of an overarching initiative to make City Hall and City government more accessible to every resident of the city.

"In the interests of serving the needs of all of our residents, to give a voice to those not always so easily heard, my Administration is in the process of implementing the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion," he said. "This office will work with all City Departments to ensure that all people can access the City's programs, services, and buildings. They will also work toward addressing any racial and/ or gender inequities in the City's workforce, with the goal educating and encouraging our diverse populations to utilize the many opportunities for growth and advancement that exist in our City."

The office will also oversee what the mayor said would be a new Immigrant Community and Learning Center. That new Center will be housed in the old Everett High School on Broadway - which the mayor announced alongside news of a community boxing gym there and space for the Everett Girl Scouts to meet.

The move was a nod to a much more diverse electorate that is checking in now at the ballot box, as well as new, active residents moving to Everett from Cambridge and Somerville. Those new faces, which the mayor spoke of several times in his speech, will be looking for services and

greater inclusion in a City Hall - like many others that has been "insider" territory for generations.

That, the mayor said, would all change - and not just in the sense of diversity and inclusion.

Along with the new office, the mayor said he wants to make City Hall into a dynamic and vibrant "heart" of the community.

"It is imperative that City Hall becomes a more dynamic, more accessible place," he said. "This revitalized physical City Hall will focus on modernization and interior gathering spaces, offering free Wi-Fi and community spaces for our residents, with the goal of becoming the true home and heart of our communi-

DeMaria said that will come with a new design for the layout of offices at City Hall. Instead of walledoff departments, he hopes to have more open-space layouts that will streamline many of the "constituent-facing processes." That, he said, would lead to better operating efficiency.

A reinvigorated City Hall will also mean not going to City Hall, he said.

He said the administration would be coming to the residents through an Ambassadorship Program, or Mobile City Hall.

"Select members of my Administration will be coming to you, the residents of Everett, to meet you, to hear your concerns, and to offer their assistance in any way that they can," he said.

But it won't stop there. He said they have expanded 3-1-1 to be accessible via phone seven days a week, noting that they logged approximately 50,000 issues with phone calls and in-person visits at 3-1-1 in 2019. That expansion will allow people to call in concerns every day of the week, and not operate on City Hall time, but on their own time.

That idea will also be used for paying bills or submitting applications using a forthcoming new website. The upgrade will also allow residents not to have to come to City Hall for parking or code enforcement hearings - an announcement that drew applause from the crowd in the Chambers.

"Additionally, we will soon allow parking-ticket and code-enforcement hearings to be conducted via FaceTime and Skype, relieving the need for a person to physically come to City Hall to address their issue," he said resolutely.

•The mayor said they are working with Mt. Vernon Group Architects to address the long-term needs of the school population. That group has determined that the best solution for the City and School Department is to utilize classroom space at the old Everett High.

Working with the School Department, the City will use the old Everett High as a space to expand the vocational program, he said.

"We intend to further expand the vocational programming for our high school, extending handson education for the trades, by utilizing existing vocational space in the old high school," he said. "This expansion will serve as an additional measure to attain my goal of ensuring that every graduate from Everett High School has a clear future path for eventual employment upon gradua-

•Scratch Kitchens? Mayor DeMaria said he is happy with the work of Whitson's as the new school food contractor, but he wants them to take it further. He said he has spoken to the company about the idea of implementing scratch kitchens in the schools. That would serve as an educational opportunity, as well as a source of even fresher, healthier food, he said.

•The City has received designs for the long-

planned updates to the Connolly Center. Mayor De-Maria said they plan to start construction later this year, with renovations including a bowling alley, exercise room, art room and other features in the basement of the Center.

•The mayor announced that the Mass Gaming Commission (MGC) has allocated \$1 million to complete designs to make the Orange Line Station at Assembly Row accessible from the Northern Strand

Path. That will unlock the promise of Encore to build the pedestrian and cycle path over the Mystic River.

•On the Malden River front, DeMaria said designs have been completed for a public canoe and kayak launch at RiverGreen Park. He said they expect to start construction on the launch this spring.

"Imagine an Everett where you can ride your bike along a dedicated bicycle path, head toward the waterfront, and hop on a ferry to the Harbor Islands or take a quick trip over to the aquarium by boat," he said. "Imagine an Everett where crew teams gather in our backyard and skull down the Malden and Mystic Rivers. Imagine an Everett where parents spend the day with their children fishing off a public pier. This is not some far-fetched dream or disillusioned goal. This is a reality and this is our future. Our residents deserve nothing less."

before quickly moving on to other initiatives.

However, the weight of the announcement was not lost on the public and the police, who have had frequent troubles with the existing Police Station on Elm Street. Last summer, the air conditioning went out for some time at the Station in the middle of a very hot stretch, making regional news as officers sweated it

Now, it looks like Mayor DeMaria has decided to move forward with the preliminary steps of getting a new station on the books.

"This is the very first Step 1," said Planner Tony Sousa. "Prior to going before Council to look for funding for design or construction, we are starting with Step 1. This is studying the feasibility for a new facility and they will look at siting and needs and de-

Economic Development

director Tess Kohanski said the City put out a bid for an Owner's Project Manager (OPM) for the project in late December. Those bids are due on February 3, and will be opened at that time. The City will chose a bidder on the project, and that company would likely put together a Feasibility Study by the fall of 2020.

"It's bigger than just the air conditioning now," said Kohanski. "It's getting to the point where the air conditioning is a problem, the entire building is an issue and it's outdated and falling down around them as we

Right now, there is nothing firm as to what kind of Station would be construct-

It could be a major renovation of the existing Station; it could be a demolition of the existing Station and re-build on the same site; or it could be a relocation of a new Station to another site.

The OPM would likely begin by speaking with Chief Steve Mazzie about the needs for a new Station, and what he and the officers want for a new Station. They would then conduct the Feasibility Study and

"That will look at whether it is replacing the building where it is now, renovating what is there or building a new building on a totally different site," said Kohanski. "We will get an idea of where it should be sited and also we'll have a scope of the size and the needs of the Station. That will give us budget numbers and we can go to Council for funding and then go for full design."

Sousa said he expected that the project would come to the Council as part of a future Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) after the study is completed.

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

THE EARTH IS ON FIRE

As this is being written, reports indicate that the worst is yet to come for the people of Australia, whose land literally is burning up all around them.

The apocalyptic images of families being driven from their homes, wearing face masks and eye goggles because of the acrid smoke that is darkening the daytime sky, and then being evacuated by boat from the beaches, are something out of a science fiction film.

But now, in 2020, reality has caught up with science fiction.

The Australian bush fires are the apex of what has been a sad, sad year for our planet. The Australian fires already have destroyed about 15 million acres — an area almost as large as West Virginia, more than triple the area destroyed by the 2018 fires in California, and six times the size of the fires last summer in the Amazon.

The fires not only have rendered large areas of the continent uninhabitable for humans, but they also have killed incredible numbers of wildlife -- some reports estimate half a billion creatures have perished -- threatening some species with extinction.

The bush fires have killed 24 persons and are causing health issues for every person in their path, especially those with existing lung diseases. The air quality in Canberra, the capital city, on New Year's Day was the worst in the world thanks to the smoke cloud that is as wide as Europe and now envelops much of the Australian continent.

The problems attendant to the bush fires are not confined to Australia. New Zealand, which is more than 1200 miles across the ocean, is enduring toxic air pollution levels. In addition, the carbon that is being released by the burning of the bushland will increase even further the carbon dioxide levels in the atmosphere that are the principal cause of global warming and climate change.

The influence of a changing climate is now evident in each day's global weather pattern, according to a study published last week in Nature Climate Change.

The study employed a new technique to analyze daily patterns of temperature and moisture across the globe. It found that the locations of above and below average temperature and moisture have been distinct from natural variations on every single day for almost a decade.

The bottom line is simply this: The world is getting hotter day-by-day and therefore bringing a dramatic change to our climate and environment. Some things, such as the massive fires in Australia, are dramatic and noticeable. Others, such as the gradual melting of the glaciers, are subtle, but their effects on the degradation of the planet are just as devastating.

It should be apparent to every thinking person that we are getting very close to a point of no return in terms of climate change. However, with governments across the globe in the hip pockets of the special interests who are opposed to the drastic measures that are needed to prevent further degradation of the environment, it is difficult to be optimistic about the future of our planet.


In this fallen world, sometimes we need to seek justice before we give mercy. And perpetrators deserve prosecution. Consequences are a reality when one chooses to harm anoth-

Alas, we cannot erase situations, happenings, or events in 2019. We cannot erase tragedy or trauma. We cannot erase mistakes.


But we can reflect on 2019 and become more aware, focus on change, give and accept forgiveness, renew hope, and make 2020 a better year.



COUNCIL APPROVES TIF AGREEMENT

CHELSEA - It was an early Christmas present for the residents of the Innes Apartments and Corcoran Development at the City Council's Dec. 23 meeting.

The Council voted 9-0 to approve a Tax Incremental Financing (TIF) agreement allowing Corcoran Development and the Chelsea Housing Authority (CHA) to redevelop the Innes Apartments into a mixed-income community with new public housing units and new market-rate units - along with parking and some retail portions.

Councillors Giovanni Recupero and Enio Lopez were not present for the meeting, and so did not vote on the matter.

The 15-year TIF will give the developer a tax savings of about \$6.5 million over 15 years, while still bringing more than \$4.6 million into the City coffers over that time.

While there was some discussion at a Council subcommittee meeting earlier in December about the 100-page document being dropped on the councillors desks without time to scour the agreement, the Dec. 23 public hearing on the TIF was more of a pro forma

One representative from the Corcoran Company spoke in favor of the TIF, alongside Chelsea Housing Authority Board member Juan Vega and City Manager Thomas Ambrosino.

"It's been a very long process, and I appreciate your diligence," Vega told the Council. "In order to carry this out for the residents of Central Avenue, there are a lot of preparations that have to happen for the families."

Ambrosino said the City has worked hard to make the project a reality, providing new, quality homes for the residents currently living in the 96 Innes Development apartments.

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"This is the last milestone to make this project a reality," Ambrosino said.

The terms of the 15-year TIF include an 80 percent reduction in new value the first five years, 60 percent the second five years, and 50 percent for the final five

In addition to the 96 CHA affordable housing units on the site, there will be 40 income-restricted units and 196 market-rate units in the 300,000 square-foot mixeduse, mixed-income development.

Groundbreaking for the Innes Development should take place in the fall of 2020, with completion in January or February of 2022, Jen Corcoran of the Corcoran Company said at a Zoning Board meeting in November.

•In other business during the last Council meeting of the year, the Council also approved several zoning amendments. One allows for the storage of taxi cabs in industrial districts, the second cleans up some language in the Community Improvement Trust Fund, and the third allows for small, 5-G wireless transmitters on existing utility poles by right.

Councillor-At-Large Leo Robinson gave the City Manager some homework over the holiday break, requesting updates on the Forbes, Midas Muffler, Sixth Street, and Everett Avenue properties.

•It was not only the last Council meeting of the year, but the last meeting for three councillors, Luis Tejada, Robert Bishop, and Joe Perlatonda.

Each was given a plaque by a fellow council member and thanked for their time and service to the city.

On the boys' side, Brandon Ho was Everett's top performer, coming in 60th out 91 sprinters in the dash and also running a PR of


