DiDomenico delivers for Everett and his district

Over the past several months, Sen. Sal DiDomenico has secured several legislative achievements and over \$65 million in funding for local organizations, municipalities, and projects in his District and throughout Massachusetts, including more than \$5.5 million for Everett. New security head named for schools

While it may be summer, the local schools have many programs going on for Everett students. At the School Committee meeting held on July 18, Superintendent Priya Tahiliani outlined some of the many programs taking place. Tahiliani noted that the enrichment program is running at full capacity with 860 local students in grades K-8 taking advantage of the courses. The program runs from 8 AM to 12 PM every weekday and includes lunch.

Alpha Best is also running classes for students in grades K-8 and the program runs until August 19. Parents can choose a full day of classes or a half-day.

Students are also reminded that there are summer reading book lists available on the school web page.

Tahiliani also noted that Pre-K registration will take place on August

23-24 for prospective students, and the Back to School Bash event will be held on August 29.

IN OTHER NEWS.....

-- During the Public Comment part of the meeting, several members from the Custodial Union spoke about the ongoing contract negotiations. It was brought out that the custodians have been without a contract for more than a year and that the high inflation rate is affecting their ability to pay their bills. While they received a pay increase of one percent in 2020, the inflation in 2022 is running about seven percent - effectively putting them at a pay decrease.

-- In a separate matter, several speakers took to the floor to show their support for the request to extend Supt. Tahiliani's contract. The committee had turned down the request at its June meeting.

-- Tahiliani announced

Virtual forum hosts Democratic candidates

candidates for State Representative for the newly formed 11th Suffolk District, representing Chelsea and part of Everett, laid out the cases for their election at a virtual forum hosted by Our Revolution Massachu-

City Councilors Judith Garcia and Leo Robinson and School Committee member Roberto Jimenez Rivera are on the Sept. 6 primary ballot. The winner will face off against another Chelsea City Councilor, Republican Todd Taylor, in

the Nov. 8 general election. "I have dedicated my entire life to service and the community and I believe that this unique opportunity will allow me to give back to the place I love to call home," said Robinson. "Our next state representative needs to know the unique challenges facing the district and have the experience and relationships necessary to deliver the results we so desperately need."

Robinson pointed to writing the city's inclusionary zoning ordinance helping create affordable housing in the city and his role in the Central Avenue Project with the Chelsea Housing Authority as some of his biggest recent achievements as a councilor.

"I'm the proud daugh-

ter of a single mother, the proud daughter of a first generation immigrant, and the proud daughter of an essential worker, similar to many of the constituents I serve," said Garcia. "This community gave me a home and gave me a sense of belonging, and in 2015, when I saw that lack of representation in our council of representatives that looked like us and that really understood the needs of the community, I decided to run for office in partnership with this community. We were able to pass progressive legislation, and I am proud of the work I've done, from a wage theft ordinance to over \$5 million we invested in the down-See FORUM Page 3

McGonagle, legislature pass major clean energy legislation

Rep. Joe McGonagle, along with his colleagues in the Massachusetts Legislature, passed a sweeping clean energy bill, An Act driving clean energy and offshore wind. The legislation bolsters green transportation, green buildings, and clean power production, including offshore wind, solar, storage and networked geothermal, while creating thousands of new jobs and economic benefits in the process. This bill builds upon the Next Generation Climate Roadmap bill, which was passed earlier this legislative session and overhauled the state's climate laws by putting Massachusetts on a path to reach net-zero limit on greenhouse gas emissions

by 2050. "Clean energy legislation has long been a goal of the Massachusetts Legislature and after seeing the extreme weather globally this summer, we see how essential this legislation is," said McGonagle. "It focuses on several broad areas that we have identified as being critical and attainable. Not only are many of these projects built to combat climate change, but they will also create plenty of job opportunities in the Commonwealth. Here in Everett, we've taken many steps to rebuild the waterfront, making it a safe and accessible spot for our community while protecting the natural habitats there. Projects like these will continue to be very important to me."

"At the beginning of this legislative session, we codified into law the goal of reaching net zero carbon emissions in Massachusetts by 2050. Today, and as the end of the session nears, the Legislature has again passed historic climate legislation that brings the Commonwealth closer to achieving that ever-important goal," said House Speaker Ronald J. Mariano (D-Quincy). "This legislation will make Massachusetts a national leader in energy generated from offshore wind, while creating thousands of new jobs in the process. I want to thank Chairman Jeff Roy and each member of the conference committee, my colleagues in the House, as well as Senate President Karen Spilka and our partners in the Senate for prioritizing the well-being of our climate, and for working diligently to get this done."

Offshore wind

To incentivize the development of the offshore wind industry in Massachusetts, this legislation establishes a Massachusetts Offshore Wind Industry Investment Program, administered by the Massachusetts Clean Energy Center (MassCEC), consisting of annual tax incentives, grants, loans, and other investments through the fund, and assistance from MassCEC in accessing other state or federal economic investment programs. It also creates the Massachusetts Offshore Wind Industry Investment Trust Fund, which can be used to promote the manufacture, fabrication, and assembly of domestic supply chain components of the offshore wind industry; stimulate increased

manufacturing facilities; advance clean energy research, technology, and innovation, and; prepare individuals for offshore wind careers by supporting workforce training at a range of educational institutions and through regional employment boards.

With the goal of making the Massachusetts offshore wind bidding process more competitive, the legislation modifies the price cap to set clear criteria to allow for offshore wind project proposals that are cost-effective and promote economic development in the Commonwealth. Under this legislation, the price cap will be removed if three or more offshore wind developers submit bids, and if less than three companies bid a modified price cap would remain in place. Preference will be given to bids that invest in local manufacturing, provide employment opportunities for underrepresented populations, and mitigate environmental impacts. Ultimately, a contract would only be approved if deemed cost-effective and

beneficial to ratepayers. The legislation also establishes a commercial fisheries commission to provide input on best practices for avoiding, minimizing, and mitigating impacts to wildlife related to offshore energy generation and transmission.

Solar energy

To support the advancement of solar power, the permits agricultural and horticultural land to be used to site solar panels as long as they do not impede the continued use of the land for agricultural or horticultural use, eliminates the so-called 'donut hole' for on-site solar energy net metering to promote residential solar, and loosens the so-called single parcel rule to help expand solar on sites where it already exists.

In addition to wind and solar power, the bill addresses other innovative sources of clean energy such as fusion energy and geothermal power. Acknowledging the harmful health and environmental impacts of utility-scale biomass power plant facilities, this legislation removes biomass from the list of energy-generating sources that are allowed to receive certain state incentives for generating clean electricity. To ensure that the Commonwealth has adequate storage systems to accommodate increasing amounts of clean energy that Massachusetts will be adding to its energy portfolio, this bill directs a study of how to optimize the deployment of longterm energy storage sys-

Grid readiness

The legislation also modernizes Massachusetts' electrical grid and energy storage infrastructure. It requires utility companies to proactively upgrade the transmission and distribution grid to improve reliability and resilience and accommodate the anticipated significant shift to renewable forms of energy.

Green transportation

As the transportation sector is the largest source of fuel emissions in Massachusetts, the bill takes steps to encourage the use of electric vehicles, including expanding and codifying the state's MOR-EV electric vehicle incentive program into statute, which provides rebates to individuals who purchase electric vehicles. Under the bill, the re-

bate amount will increase by \$1,000, to \$3,500 for passenger cars and light-duty trucks. Moreover, electric vehicle purchasers who trade in their emission-producing vehicles will be eligible for an additional incentive of \$1,000. The program may include a point-of-sale rebate model for individual purchases that offers consumers savings at the point of purchase or lease. The bill also makes used vehicles eligible for rebates. Further, the bill directs the Department of Energy Resources (DOER) to conduct an outreach campaign to promote awareness about the MOR-EV program among consumers and businesses in underserved and low-income communities, as well as in communities with high proportions of high-emis-

sion vehicles. To expand access to electric vehicle charging stations, this bill convenes an interagency coordinating council to develop and implement a charging infrastructure deployment plan in an equitable and comprehensive manner.

The Department of Public Utilities (DPU) would be required to set vehicle electrification and greenhouse gas emission requirements for electric vehicles for transportation network companies. In addition, to ensure that zero-emission vehicle charging remains affordable for consumers, the bill requires all electricity companies to submit proposals to DPU for how they will offer reduced electricity rates for consumers who charge their zero-emission vehicles at off-peak times.

Finally, the bill takes historic steps to address emissions that come from MBTA bus fleets. Starting in 2030, this bill requires every passenger bus that is purchased or leased by the MBTA to be a zero-emission vehicle. By the end

of 2040, the MBTA will be required to operate exclusively zero-emission vehicles. Underserved and low-income communities would be prioritized for the equitable deployment of these zero-emission buses.

Building decarbonization

To tackle the difficult issue of emissions from the building sector, the bill creates a 10-municipality demonstration project allowing all-electric building construction by local option. Participating municipalities must receive local approval before applying into the demonstration project. The measure has two important provisos: first, each community must first meet certain affordable housing or multifamily development thresholds; and second, each must exempt life sciences labs and health care facilities from the all-electric requirement.

The bill makes targeted enhancements to the Mass Save program, which provides rebates and incentives for owners and renters related to efficient appliances and other home improvements. energy Under the bill, priority for Mass Save projects will be given to those that maximize net climate, environmental, and equity impacts. Beginning in 2025, Mass Save funds will also be limited in most instances from going to any fossil

fuel equipment. This bill requires DPU to conduct an adjudicatory proceeding prior to approving any company-specific plan under the DPU's future of heat proceedings. In addition, the bill requires DPU to convene a stakeholder working group to develop regulatory and legislative recommendations for how Massachusetts can best align the Commonwealth's gas system enhancement program with the state's 2050 net-zero goal. The working group must submit its final recommendations to the Leg-

islature by July 31, 2023. Having been passed by the House and Senate, An Act driving clean energy and offshore wind now goes to Governor Baker for his signature.

town to improve our infrastructure."

Jimenez Rivera works as a union organizer as well as serving on the Chelsea School Committee.

"Above all, I'm the dad of a two-year-old boy who keeps me motivated to build a better future for all of us," said Jimenez Rivera. "My wife and I chose Chelsea because we wanted a community where our kids could hear Spanish on the streets and live out the values that are important to us. What was ridiculous was that to have that, we would have to give up on having schools with enough resources, green spaces for our baby to run through and clean air to breathe.

"I don't think anybody should have to make these kinds of sacrifices, and it was that thought that brought me to politics."

The candidates were asked a number of questions, including their top policy priorities for addressing housing affordability.

"Housing affordability has reached a breaking point for our renters, and it's no secret that over 70 percent of our community here in Chelsea are renters," said Garcia. "What I think is a priority as we face this regional and country-wide crisis is we need to focus a lot on rent stabilization as a priority, but also on stronger tenant protections."

Jimenez Rivera said he sees housing as a two-part problem of supply and

more buildings, but they tend to be luxury condos that are not actually affordable for people in our community, so we continue to bring more people into our community while having a housing crisis with the people who are here," he said. "We need to make sure we are building more middle

income and working class family housing and also making sure that communities that are not Chelsea are doing their fair share for affordable housing development. Right now, we are doing far more than our fair share as far as affordable housing, and that ends up having a cost, we end up having lower property tax values and that type of thing."

Robinson said the district needs to be able to advocate at the state level for rental assistance and to help renters move up to become first-time homebuyers.

"I think it is important that we as a community come together and advocate for housing as a priority, in the region as we are over the limit to how much affordable housing we do have in Chelsea compared to the 10 percent in other communities," said Rob-

DiDomenico's CROWN Act heads to Governor's desk

On Monday, July 18, the Massachusetts State Senate passed the CROWN Act, a bill sponsored by Senator Sal DiDomenico and Senator Adam Gomez of Springfield which prohibits discrimination based on a person's hair texture or style in Massachusetts. Having been enacted in both the Senate and the House, the bill now goes to Governor Baker for his signature.

The CROWN Act prohibits denial of employment and educational opportunities in places of work, schools, and school-related organizations on account of hair texture or protective hairstyles, such as braids, locks, and twists, used by people by color. Hairbased discrimination has excluded people of color from classrooms and workplaces, with serious academic and economic consequences.

"As a long-time supporter and one of the Senate lead sponsors of this legislation, I am thrilled to see the CROWN Act going to the Governor to be signed into law," said Senator DiDomenico (D-Everett), Assistant Majority Leader of the Massachusetts Senate. "The CROWN Act will protect people of color from experiencing hair discrimination and ensure we can celebrate all hairstyles. We are sending a message that discrimination in any form will not be tolerated and we will now have a law in place to back this up. We could not have accomplished this without the tenacious work from advocates from the CROWN Coalition and bravery from students who have shared their personal experiences with hair discrimination. I would also like to thank Senate President Spilka and Chair Rodrigues for making this a priority this session and my legislative partners, Senator Gomez, Representative Ultrino, and Representative Tyler, for their dedication and tireless work getting this bill across the finish line."

"Having the right to be and present as our authentic selves, without fear of discrimination, matters to each one of us," stated Senate President Karen E. Spilka (D-Ashland). "For too many Black and Brown residents of Massachusetts this right has not always been honored. By enacting the CROWN Act, the Senate is once again affirming that hair discrimination has no place in professional or school settings in the Commonwealth. I am grateful to Mya and Deanna Cook, who stood up and fought hard to right this wrong

for Black women and girls across the state. Thank you to Senators Gomez, DiDomenico, Rodrigues, Lewis and Edwards, as well as their staff members, for their work on this issue, and to the advocates for their collaboration."

This legislation was inspired in part by two Black teenagers from Malden, Mya and Deanna Cook, who were punished by their school and barred from extracurricular activities for wearing their hair in braids. After gaining national attention and organizing public protests, the school eventually reversed their policy. The CROWN Act will protect Massachusetts children from experiencing this kind of discrimination.

The CROWN (Creating a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair) Coalition has played a crucial role in supporting the passage of this legislation in Massachusetts and in states across the country. Massachusetts will soon join 17 other states that have passed some version of the CROWN Act, which has also been proposed at the federal level.

Having passed both branches of the legislature, the bill now goes to the Governor for his re-

MASS SHOOTINGS GET ALL THE ATTENTION, **BUT THIS IS WORSE**

Americans have been saddened by the recent mass shootings that have occurred in recent weeks across the country in Buffalo, Uvalde, and Highland Park.

But as much as these tragic events have seared our national consciousness and brought demands for action by our elected officials for appropriate gun legislation, there is a far worse aspect of the epidemic of gun violence that occurs day-in and day-out throughout the We are referring to the shooting of women by their

domestic partners. Each and every year, 600 women are murdered with a gun by their partners. We'll do the math for you -- that works out to a woman who is shot and killed every 14 hours by her present or former sig-The statisticians also tell us that the possession of

likely that a woman will be killed than if the domestic partner did not have a gun. In short, the more guns there are, the more women who are murdered by their partners.

a gun by a domestic partner makes it five times more

Yes, the shootings in schools and malls and supermarkets horrify us and make us feel not safe anywhere, even at a Fourth of July parade.

But the reality is that an American woman in a household with a handgun is far more at risk for being shot and killed than any of us by some random angry person with an AR-15.

PROGRESSIVES ARE THE REAL HYPOCRITES

No doubt most of our readers who care about the environment and the issue of climate change were disappointed when Senator Joe Manchin put the proverbial final nail in the coffin of the Build Back Better Bill (BBB) that, by some estimates, would have reduced U.S. emissions to 45 percent to 51 percent of 2005 levels by 2030.

However, as we have written previously in this space, we believe the real blame for the failure of the bill lies with the progressives of the Democratic Party, who should have coalesced last summer to pass the basics of the bill, rather than "playing politics" last year when they held up the separate infrastructure bill and then loaded up the Build Back Better bill with items that were extraneous to climate change.

They overplayed their hand and as a result, they got nothing -- zero -- nada -- and did more than Republicans to sink Joe Biden's presidency.

Senate sends the CROWN Act to the Governor

Massachusetts State Senate enacted the **CROWN** Act, which prohibits discrimination based on a person's hair texture or style in Massachusetts. Having been enacted in both the Senate and the House, the bill now goes to Governor Baker for his signature.

The CROWN Act prohibits denial of employment and educational opportunities in places of work, schools, and school-related organizations on account of hair texture or protective hairstyles, such as braids, locks, and twists, used by people by color. Hairbased discrimination has excluded people of color from classrooms and workplaces, with serious academic and economic consequences.

"Having the right to be and present as our authentic selves, without fear of discrimination, matters to each one of us," stated Senate President Karen E. Spilka (D-Ashland). "For too many Black and Brown residents of Massachusetts this right has not always been honored. By enacting the CROWN Act, the Senate is once again affirming that hair discrimination has place in professional or school settings in the Commonwealth. I am grateful to Mya and Deanna Cook, who stood up and fought hard to right this wrong for Black women and girls across the state. Thank you to Senators Gomez, DiDomenico, Rodrigues, Lewis and Edwards, as well as their staff members, for their work on this issue, and to the advocates

Out of the kitchen

One of our house rules for dogs is that they are not allowed in our tiny kitchen unless specifically invited to be there. "Out of the kitchen" is one direction our Poppy understands. She will push her way in one step at a time, but as soon as we tell her to leave, she retreats.

The National Accident Helpline has reported, "... research shows that the kitchen still holds the greatest threat of injury in the home, with over half of respondents (60%) stating that they have previously injured themselves during a culinary task." The accidents that can cause harm to people in the kitchen can also injure pets. What's more, the animals themselves may cause accidents in the kitchen.

Dangers!

The most common kitchen injuries to humans are cuts, falls, and burns. If you cook, think about some of the close calls you've had in a kitchen that didn't harm you. Have you ever dropped a knife, broken a glass, or splashed a hot liquid?

Often a cook is concentrating on what they're doing. Sometimes they move fast in response to a timer, aroma, or change in the sound of something cooking. Having pets underfoot at moments like this is a clear danger to everyone. They add distraction and tripping to the list of

Pet Proofing

We sometimes use a physical barrier to keep Poppy out of the kitchen. Freestanding, hinged barriers come in all shapes and sizes. If your dog is strong enough to move one of these, you can opt for a child or pet safety gate attached to the door opening.

Those who live in an open-plan home may have to resort to a kitchen crate to keep their animal near while staying out from underfoot. You also need to secure your kitchen trash and might have to install child-proof locks on your lower cabinets to keep clever animals from gaining access.

Massachusetts will soon join 17 other states that have passed some version of the CROWN Act, which has also been proposed at the federal level.

Having passed both branches of the legislature, the bill now goes to the Governor for his review.





Massachusetts House passes bill supporting veterans' services, military families

Massachusetts House of Representatives passed comprehensive legislation addressing the Commonwealth's most immediate needs in the veteran community and making necessary dates to service member quality-of-life issues and acknowledgements of our military branches and individual service, including supporting military families who relocate to the Commonwealth with expedited licensure and school enrollment, creating education awareness programs and establishing the Massachusetts Medal

of Fidelity. "Our veterans represent the best and bravest among us, and are deserving of unwavering support from those in public office," said House Speaker Ronald J. Mariano (D-Quincy). "While we can never truly repay those who have served this country, the legislation passed today is another example of the House's commitment to ensuring that veterans in Massachusetts, and their families, have access to the services and educational opportunities that they deserve. I want to thank Chairman Paul McMurtry, as well as all my colleagues in the House, for their hard work, and for prioritizing the well being and success of the Commonwealth's

Highlights of the legislation include:

Military spouse licensure portability: requires the Division of Occupational Licensure, the Department of Public Health, and Massachusetts Boards of Registration to accept a military spouse's application for licensure or notify them of what criteria they were not able to meet plication.

Expedited military spouse teacher licenses: establishes a military spouse certificate to be issued by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education Commissioner to military spouse teachers that meet certain requirements.

School enrollment for military children: allows military families to register and enroll in a school district when a service member first receives their relocation order, waiving the proof of residency requirement at the time of registration. This provision also allows military children who are transferring mid-semester to enroll in and attend one of the Commonwealth's virtual schools. Purple Star campus des-

ignation: establishes the Purple Star Campus Program, to be administered by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, to designate schools that demonstrate a commitment to students and families of service members.

In-state tuition continuity for military-connected college students: ensures that a member of the military stationed in the Commonwealth, their spouse, their children deemed an in-state resident after their acceptance at one of the state's higher education institutions.

Civilian licensure and certification information: directs the Commission-

chusetts owe them the best within 30 days of the ap- er of Veterans' Services to make information on civilian licensure and certification opportunities available to service members and veterans, and provide information on military education and skills to relevant agencies. Open Burn Pit Registry:

Directs the Commissioner of the Department Veterans' Services, in consultation with the Commissioner of DPH and the Adjutant General, to contact all members of the Armed Forces, National Guard and veterans to register for the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs' Airborne Hazards and Open Burn Pit Regis-

Requires the Adjutant General to request that the periodic health assessment for National Guard members determine whether the member is eligible to participate in the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs' Airborne Hazards and Open Burn Pit Registry and if eligible, the member register for the Registry.

Massachusetts National Guard family education program: establishes a Massachusetts National Guard Family Education Program to allow National Guard members to transfer their unused education benefits under the National Guard Education Assistance Program to their dependents.

Slot machines at veterans' organizations: allows the Gaming Commission to issue limited slot machine licenses to veterans' organizations. Founding anniversaries

of U.S. Armed Forces: requires the Governor to set aside the founding date anniversaries of the U.S. Army, Air Force, Coast Guard, and Massachusetts National Guard. Medal of Fidelity: establishes the Massachu-

setts Medal of Fidelity to be presented to the next of kin of a service member or veteran who died as a result of service-connected post-traumatic stress disorder, a service-connected condition resulting from a traumatic brain injury, or a service-connected disease, condition or injury related to exposure to harmful toxin, herbicides, agents

sideration. Earlier this year, the House passed legislation establishing additional protections for veterans and mandating increased accountability for management of veterans homes. "An Act relative to the governance, structure and care of veterans at the Commonwealth veterans homes" is currently in conference committee negotiations. In May 2021, the House approved a \$600 million bond authorization — with \$400 million for the construction of an updated Holyoke Veterans' Home facility and \$200 million to increase geographic equity and accessibility for veterans not primarily served by the veterans' Homes in Chelsea or Holyoke.
