McGonagle gets \$1 million for Everett through housing bond bill

Rep. We want to keep people in Everett who want to stay in Everett. I'm grateful to my colleagues in the City for their collaboration on this issue. I'm also grateful to Speaker Mariano and Chair Michlewitz for

Strong confirmed as new Everett **Chief of Police**

Officer Paul Strong was officially confirmed as the next chief of the Everett Police Department by the Everett City Council during the Monday, June 10, City Council meeting. Strong will assume the duties of chief officially as of July 1, 2024.

Strong took the oath of office from City Clerk Sergio Cornelio in front of a capacity crowd in the Council Chambers that included Mayor Carlo DeMaria, Sen. Sal DiDomenico, Rep. Joseph Mc-Gonagle, members of the City Council who unanimously confirmed his appointment as chief, and

fellow professional officers in the Everett Police Department.

At the request of Strong, Bishop Robert G. Brown offered the opening prayer. Brown began by extending the community's farewell to retiring Chief Steven Mazzie, "a great leader, one who has led this community for over 20 years as chief of the Everett Police Department. We're grateful, we've been blessed, and we prospered."

Brown formally congratulated Strong, stating, "The mantle is changing. And we pray for the safe and well-being, the guid-

Concluding his 32-year career in the Everett Police Department, the last 20 years as chief, Steven Mazzie can look back proudly at his many accomplishments

As he prepares for his final day in office on June 30, Mazzie has been receiving much praise from city officials, including Mayor Carlo DeMaria and Police Capt. Paul Strong, who will succeed Mazzie in the top leadership position in the department.

Mazzie, 56, is also completing his family's amazing legacy of 98 years of continuous service in the Everett Police Department, a run of excellence that began with his grandfather, Adolph R. Mazzie Sr., who served 39 years in the department. His father, Adolph Mazzie Jr., served 29 years. His oldest brother, Paul Mazzie, served 32 years, followed by his brother, John Mazzie (34

DiDomenico hosts first Poverty Commission hearing

Senator Sal DiDomenico, as Co-Chair of the Massachusetts Poverty Commission, hosted the first public hearing in Springfield with Co-Chair and State Representative Marjorie Decker, along with several commissioners. Organizations and individuals who work on addressing poverty in the area attended the hearing to testify and share their experiences and best practices for lifting people out of poverty.

"It is a privilege to hear directly from people who are working on the front lines each day to combat poverty and support families in need," said Senator Sal DiDomenico. "Our commission's goal is to study how we can best address inequality, reduce poverty, and promote opportunity in the Com-

monwealth over the next

decade and these hearings

are foundational to our work. I look forward to meeting with community members across our state to hear their perspectives and reflect on how state government can be doing more to help our residents in need."

The Massachusetts Poverty Commission was created through the state budget and the law establishes this special commission to study poverty in the Commonwealth.

Senator DiDomenico was appointed Senate Chair of this commission by Senate President Karen Spilka.

Specifically, the commission is tasked with studying ways to tackle poverty and address inequality in the Commonwealth and make recommendations that, if implemented, would significantly reduce poverty in our state over the next 10 years. The study will include, but not be limited

1 . A historical analysis of poverty rates in the Commonwealth;

2. An analysis of demographic disparities in poverty rates including, but not limited to, any racial or ethnic disparities;

3. An assessment of the

underlying causes of poverty, including any specific issues that contribute to the disparities identified;

4. An analysis of regional disparities in poverty rates in the Commonwealth; and

5. A survey of existing public programs and services that most effectively reduce poverty both in the Commonwealth and in other states.

This was the first of three public hearings in geographically diverse areas of the Commonwealth. Findings and recommendations will be submitted to the Legislature by December 31, 2024.

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JUNE IS A MONTH OF FREEDOM

June marks the first month of the summer season, the period on the calendar when we take vacations from school and work to travel and enjoy the company of our friends and family members. It's our personal time, that sweet spot each year when we take a break from the humdrum of our daily schedules and we have the freedom to do whatever we want,

But June also uniquely celebrates a number of events that brought true freedom to Americans who had been unable to experience the promise of America -- "all men are created equal" -- that we take for granted today.

June 12 is known as Loving Day. It was on that day in 1967 that the U.S. Supreme Court struck down a Virginia law that forbade interracial marriage and made it a criminal offense to do so. The Lovings, an interracial couple, were convicted under that Virginia law and, to avoid jail, they agreed to leave the state. Similar laws existed throughout all of the Southern states until the Supreme Court's ruling.

June is observed as Pride Month by the LGBTQIA+ community to mark the date of June 28, 1969, when gays protested arrests at the Stonewall Inn (a gay bar in New York City's Greenwich Village) at a time when police routinely arrested of gay men on phony morals charges. The riots lasted for a number of days and are widely-recognized as the beginning of the modern gay rights movement that culminated more than 50 years later with the Supreme Court decision of Obergefell v. Hodges in 2015 that struck down state laws forbidding same-sex marriage.

June 14 is Flag Day, marking the adoption of the flag of the United States on June 14, 1777, by resolution of the Second Continental Congress, which read as follows: "Resolved, That the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation." In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation that officially established June 14 as Flag Day and in 1949, National Flag Day was established by an Act of Congress. Ever since its inception in 1777, the American flag has been universally recognized as a symbol of freedom around the world.

Finally, Juneteenth, which is now a national holiday, marks the day when the Union army entered the city of Galveston, Texas on June 19, 1865, and freed the slaves in Texas pursuant to President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, which had gone into effect more than two years earlier on January 1, 1863. Texas had been the last state to be occupied by Union forces and where slavery still existed.

NEAR THE WATER? WATCH YOUR CHILDREN!

We recently were shocked to learn of two statistics that were noted at a recent meeting of the Revere Board of Health.

The first is that about 4500 Americans die from drowning each year. To put that into perspective, that figure is about 50 percent greater than the total number of victims who died on 9/11.

The second number, which was even more surprising -- and even sadder -- is that drowning is the leading cause of unintentional injury-related death among chil-

What is stunning to us about that statistic is that we cannot imagine that whenever a parent is with a small child near the water -- whether it be the bathtub in their home or at the beach -- the parent is not watching over their child like a hawk without even a second's worth of distraction, including texting on a cell phone.

Young children are especially susceptible to drowning because of their small lung capacity, which means that once they slip under, their tiny lungs can fill with water almost instantly.

Even if a child is saved from death by drowning, the lack of oxygen to the brain can result in a serious brain injury that will have lifelong implications.

The bottom line is that a young child never should be left unattended for even a moment when near the water. And it goes without saying that every parent should be 100% sober whenever they are near water with their child, whether on a boat, at the beach, at a pool, or in their home.

A Proud Son of Everett The son of long-time Everett residents, retired Everett Police officer Adolph R. Mazzie Jr. and Joanne Mazzie, Steven Mazzie grew up on Bell Rock Street in West Everett and to this day loves being known as "an Everett guy."

"I have great parents, totally supportive," said Mazzie. "I'm very fortunate to still have them in my life."

He attended the Lew-Elementary School and Parlin Junior High, while also participating in youth sports organizations such as Everett Little League, Everett Eagles Pop Warner, and Everett Recreation Basketball. He graduated from Pope John XXIII High School in 1985, excelling in football, baseball, and track.

Mazzie attended UMass/Amherst where he majored in Political Science and Criminal Justice. As he waited for his appointment as a police officer, Mazzie earned his Master's degree from Anna Maria College.

After completing his training at the Massachusetts Police Academy in Needham, he was appointed to the Everett Police Department in 1992, rising quickly through the ranks and becoming chief on January 29, 2003. He

currently oversees a department of 123 officers.

A Student of The **Business**

Mazzie said he always tried to combine the best of "old school policing with the advancement of technology" in his position as chief.

"But at the end of the day, it's a people business and getting to help people, you have to get to know people," said Mazzie. "So I'm a big fan of face-to-face contacts. I like officers being able to get out of the car and get some face time - we call it "walk and talks" - with people, popping into and out of small markets, and into the neighborhoods and playgrounds. That's how you get to know people and find out if there are any problems or concerns."

Serving As Chief

Mazzie was originally appointed as chief by former Mayor David Ragucci. He was reappointed by former Mayor John Hanlon and then reappointed multiple times to threeyear terms by current Mayor Carlo DeMaria Jr.

"Mayor DeMaria has been very supportive of policing," said Mazzie. "We have a lot in common in terms of the type of things he expects from the police department. He wants us to be professional and responsive to people's needs. I appreciate that he's entrusted me with running the department. I return every phone call that comes into my office, and if I'm not returning it, one of my top staff members is returning it. Whether the problem is big or small, we'll try to address

Mazzie said the department has put an emphasis on crime prevention during his tenure.

"We try to create conditions where we're preventing crime as opposed to waiting for things to happen," said Mazzie. "For years, I spent a lot of my personal time going around the city and looking to get streetlights fixed around parks, trees trimmed, graffiti removed, broken windows repaired - the faster you fix it, the fewer repeat problems you'll have."

No one has more contact with people than a local police officer. If you grow up in the community like I did, you know the community, you know people. You can make an impact on residents. That why I'm really proud of our officers. We're big on community engagement and a lot of it is positive engagement. We're not waiting around for negative situations to happen. We have a great Junior Police Academy that gets filled up immediately. We're starting to see the fruits of our labor. Some of the young officers we're hiring went to the Junior Police Acade-

my. They're joining our

ranks, and it's great."

A Positive Impact

Steven Mazzie's last official day as chief will be

June 30. He said that he and his wife, Stacey, will be going on an extended vacation for the first time and "I'll be doing some golfing."

"I've been working with Paul Strong on his transition to chief," said Mazzie. "I've known Paul for a long time and he's a good man. I'm confident in his leadership of the department. I think he's the right guy at the right time and he will lead the department forward. Paul will do a great job. I've also been working with the mayor to ensure that the city doesn't really miss a beat with this department."

His day-to-day presence in the Everett Police Department may be ending but Steven Mazzie's positive impact on the lives of Everett residents will live on forever.

ans Avenue," said Storng.



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DiDomenico celebrates new summer child nutrition program

Healey-Driscoll administration announced recently that Massachusetts has received federal approval for its summer child nutrition program. Following the ending of Summer Pandemic EBT (P-EBT), this new child nutrition program will help feed an estimated 600,000 students while schools are closed for the summer. Low-income Massachusetts families with schoolaged children will be eligible to receive financial assistance to buy groceries, bringing more than \$70 million in federal funds to the state's economy. Senator Sal DiDomenico, as an anti-hunger champion and Co-Chair of the Food System Caucus, has advocated for programs like this and is thrilled to see its implementation by Governor

Senator Sal DiDomenico celebrated the announcement of this pro-

Healey's administration.

gram, "I am thrilled to see the Healey-Driscoll Administration support Summer EBT. This program builds on the successes of past food programs I have fought for, like Universal School Meals, and will help reduce child hunger during summer break. I look forward to seeing the immense benefits this program will bring to countless children and families across Massachusetts." "In Massachusetts, we

are not leaving federal dollars on the table that could support children and families' food security. In partnership with our State Legislature, we made universal free school meals permanent. And with this new program, we are working to ensure children and families have access to healthy food all year long," said Governor Maura Healey. "I want to thank the Biden-Harris Administration and Congress

for permanently establishing this child nutrition program. Massachusetts is proud to be utilizing all tools available so kids can focus on learning and play, not where their next meal is coming from." The program, known

as Summer EBT, will be administered by the Department of Transitional Assistance (DTA) in collaboration with the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) and local school districts. This new program will complement the Summer Eats program, which provides free meals to all kids and teens, ages 18 and under, at locations across Massachusetts during the summer months. Some students' families will also continue receiving regular SNAP (federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) benefits. These programs build on the Healey-Driscoll administration and Massachusetts' food security initiatives for children, including Universal Free School Meals, Food Security Infrastructure Grants, and the MA **FRESH** (Massachusetts Farming Reinforces Education and Student Health) grant program. Eligible families will re-

ceive one payment of \$120 per child between July and September, corresponding to \$40 per month. Families already enrolled in SNAP, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF; known in Massachusetts as Transitional Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or TAFDC), or some MassHealth plans will be automatically enrolled in the summer child nutrition program and do not need to take any action. Families who are not automatically enrolled can apply for the program directly on DTA Connect between June 15 and September 7, 2024.



ties convert commercial properties into multi-unit residential or mixed-use properties. After project completion, project sponsors would be eligible for a tax credit of up to 10 percent of the development costs. The bill also includes a new tax credit to incentivize production of homeownership units targeting households with incomes of up to 120 percent of the area median income (AMI). Additionally, the bill makes permanent the Community Investment Tax Credit (CITC), while expanding the statewide cap on donations from \$12 million to \$15 million, and extends the sunset of the Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credit through December 31, 2030, while increasing the total available amount from \$55 million to \$110 million.

Among the many policy initiatives included in the bill to create more housing, the bill permits accessory dwelling unit (ADUs) equal to or less than 900 square feet to be built by-right on a property in single-family zoning districts in all Massachusetts communities. The bill also authorizes a court appointed receiver of a vacant residential property, in actions to enforce the sanitary code, to sell the property at fair market value to a nonprofit which will rehabilitate the property, correct sanitary code violations, and sell the property to a firsttime homebuyer with an income not more than 120 percent of AMI.

The bill also establishes a local option to require property owners to notify the municipality and tenants of its intention to sell a property and to allow a tenant association with the required minimum tenant participation to select a successor entity to act on its behalf to purchase the property. The bill also allows a municipality that has adopted inclusionary zoning, incentive zoning, or a density bonus ordinance or by-law to enter into an agreement with a housing developer to provide a preference for affordable housing to lowor moderate-income veterans for up to 10 percent of the affordable units in a development.

Bond authorizations include:

Public housing

- \$2 billion to support the repair, rehabilitation, and modernization over 43,000 public housing units across Massachusetts, with 25 percent of the funds dedicated to preserve housing for those with incomes below 30 percent AMI. \$150 million to decarbonize the public housing stock and \$15 million for accessibility upgrades
- \$200 million to support Local Housing Authorities (LHAs) who partner with developers to add mixed-income developments on LHA land, leveraging funds to maintain and preserve public housing while increasing the overall housing supply

Housing vulnerable populations

- \$200 million to support innovative and alternative forms of rental housing including single person occupancy (SPO) units, transitional and permanent housing for people experiencing homelessness, housing for seniors and veterans, and transitional units for persons recovering from substance use disorder. 25 percent of funds must be used to fund projects which preserve housing for those with incomes below 30 percent AMI
- \$70 million to support the development of appropriate community-based housing for Department of Mental Health (DMH)

and Department of Developmental Services (DDS) clients

- \$60 million to modify homes of individuals or families with disabilities or seniors so that they may maintain residency or return home from institutional settings
- \$55 million to support appropriate housing for people with disabilities who are not DMH or DDS clients
- \$20 million to establish a veterans supportive housing program to develop and preserve supportive housing for veterans and their families experiencing homelessness, including wraparound ser-

- Affordable Housing Trust Fund which provides resources to create or preserve affordable housing for households earning less than 100 precent of
- \$250 million to accelerate the development of mixed-income multifamily housing
