## 'A seat at the table'

### CNC meets to discuss new soccer stadium proposal in Everett

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council held a special neighborhood meeting Sept. 26 to form a soccer stadium committee, and the results were productive.

With CNC Chair Tom Cunha presiding, the Council met with a group of residents and determined that a main committee and four sub-committees will be established once the change in language is made by legisla-

tors that would allow for the site in Everett to be used for a new soccer stadium.

And with increasing speculation that the proposal could advance by as early as the end of October, the CNC has indicated publicly that it wants "have a seat at the table" when the public process and negotiations begin for the project.

Sen. Sal DiDomenico, who represents Charles-

## Summer Tunnel ends overnight weekend closure for repairs

The Summer Tunnel marked its final full weekend closure as part of the restoration project. The project is now considered substantially complete. The schedule allowed for an additional five weekend closures that would have continued into mid-November but no more will be required. Remaining work will be finished under normal off-peak operations.

In addition to weekend closures over the past two years, the project also included two extended summertime closures. The total rehabilitation effort included work on the tunnel ceiling, roadway, walls, wiring, drainage and additional improvements which will increase safety and climate resiliency. The project is a major investment in the

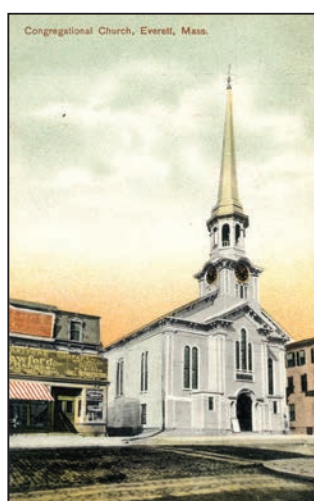

the First Congregational Church, which was built in 1852 and is the oldest church in Everett. The building has served as a place of worship for the community since its inception and many of Everett's founding fathers and their families attended services here. The building is also the location where the residents of South Malden voted to separate from Malden to become the Town of Everett in 1870 and where residents voted again in 1892 to become the City of Everett.

This location served as the City's first City Hall until the first official building was constructed in 1893 at the same location where the current City Hall now stands.

The second dedication ceremony will recognize the historical significance of the Immaculate Conception Church, which was originally named St. Mary's Church when it was first built in 1877 as Everett's first Catholic church. Designed by architect Patrick W. Ford, the cornerstone to this

Gothic Revival structure was laid in 1896 and was completed in 1908 and has served Everett's ever-changing community for more than a century.

These two historical buildings will also become part of the Historical Commission's self-guided walking tour. The tour seeks to highlight the importance of Everett's history and provides the opportunity for participants to learn about historical sites through informational signs placed at each location throughout the City. The ongoing project will eventually have nearly 100 locations dedicated

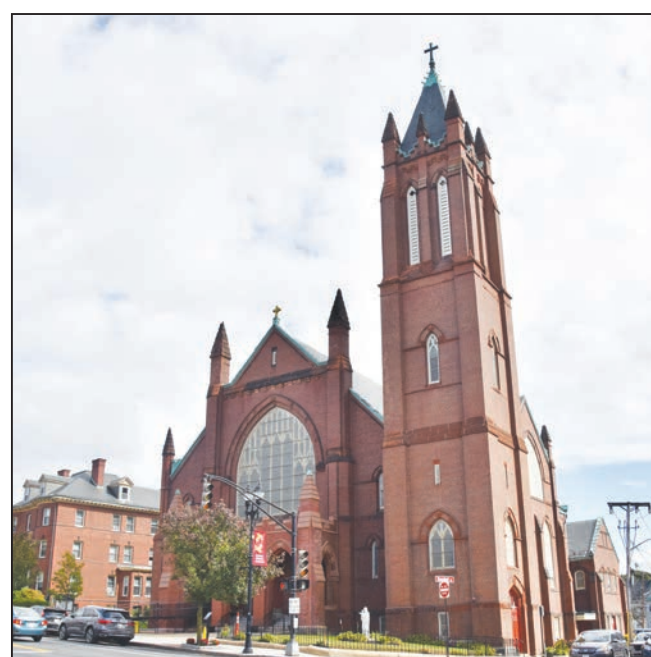
to a person, historic event or location of a building that is considered part of the more than 150 years of Everett's history.

All are welcome to attend the ceremonies. Light refreshments will be provided in the church hall, which abuts the chapel and is downstairs from the main church of Immaculate Conception Church, immediately following the second dedication ceremony.

## Cultural Council grant cycle is open to Everett artists

The Everett Cultural Council [ECC] invites Everett artists and culture creators to apply for Massachusetts Cultural Council grants. Last year the Everett Council awarded over \$30,000 to 31 Everett projects.

The grant cycle is open to Massachusetts based individuals, artists, non-profit community

town and Everett in the Senate, has been the undisputed champion of the proposal to build a 25,000-seat, state-of-the-art soccer stadium on the site of a closed power plant across from the Encore Boston Harbor resort/casino. The Kraft family, owner of the New England Patriots and the New England Revolution professional soccer team, would move their MLS franchise to Everett, where the Revolution would play their home games.

Cunha said the CNC will react accordingly when the proposal reaches the next stage, so the recruitment of members for the CNC soccer committee could commence at the CNC's regular monthly meeting in November.

"Once the legislation is

passed, we're going to fine tune the committee and likely create four subcommittees: mitigation, transportation, environment, and quality of life," said Cunha.

One key aspect of the stadium discussion at the CNC meeting focused on parking for fans who would be traveling from throughout New England to attend the games. Cunha's idea to have satellite parking lots in other cities seemed to draw the support of the group. Fans would park their vehicles in Somerville and Woburn, for example, and board buses to arrive at the entrance to the stadium.

### Rep. Ryan speaks about plans for soccer stadium

In an interview Rep. Dan Ryan of Charlestown

said he supports "the language that is in the state economic development bill which would remove the land for the soccer stadium out of the designated port area."

"Right now the land is prohibited from being used for a soccer stadium, so this is very early on in the discussions," said Ryan. "The real discussion happens when it becomes a viable use, and I do support the idea of taking the land out of the designated port area, so then we can have a larger discussion. I do support the idea of a soccer stadium because that is what's on the table right now. There are a bunch of other things that I could support, too, that would open up that waterfront for the first time in 100 years to

Ryan said he admires what the Kraft family has done in building Gillette Stadium and developing the surrounding area in Foxboro.

"I love what they've done with Patriot Place [a shopping, dining, and entertainment complex adjacent to Gillette Stadium]," said Ryan. "I think the Krafts are great people on and off the football field. In terms of a business venture such as a major stadium, I haven't worked with them in the past. I like what they did in Foxboro, which is a year-round venue that's not just related to sports. But Foxboro is a lot different place than Boston or Everett."

### 10/7, ONE YEAR LATER

The barbaric attack a year ago this week by the Iranian-backed Hamas terrorist group shocked and horrified the world. The brutal slaughter, rape, and torture of 1250 men, women, children, and elderly Israeli citizens, plus another 300 who were taken captive, by Hamas invaders who poured across the northern Gaza-Israeli border, affirmed that Iran and its terrorist proxies, Hamas, Hezbollah, and the Houthis, know no bounds in their hatred for Jews and their stated aim of wiping Israel off the face of the map.

The attack and its aftermath accomplished a number of goals of the Iranian-backed terrorists. Not only did 10/7 deal a blow to Israelis' sense of security, but it also destabilized Israel politically and economically. More than 100,000 Israeli citizens have been displaced both along the Gazan border and in northern Israel, where Hezbollah has been shelling northern Israeli communities. Israeli citizen-soldiers have been fighting for a full year, with no end in sight.

The attack of 10/7 predictably unleashed a devastating military response by Israel on the Gaza Strip, a narrow piece of land that is about 140 square miles and home to two million people, of whom half are children, in its effort to kill every Hamas fighter. (By comparison, Boston and Suffolk County consist of about 120 square miles with 750,000 people, of whom 20 percent are children). After a year of ceaseless Israeli bombardment, the Gaza Strip has been laid to waste, with more than 40,000 Gazans killed, tens of thousands more maimed for life, and the entire population facing mass starvation. The Israeli government now seems bent on replicating the same devastation in Lebanon from where Hezbollah has been shooting its rockets onto Israeli communities.

The Israeli government, which itself is controlled by religious extremists, fell into the trap set by Iran and its proxies by waging its brutal assault on Gaza. When images of the Middle East are shown on our TV screens each night, it is the horrors being endured by Gazan children that we see. It is their plight (as well as those of Palestinians who are being attacked by Israeli settlers on the West Bank), not that of the Israeli victims, that is garnering the world's attention and sympathies.

Finally, the bloody attack of 10/7 and the military response by Israel achieved another of Iran's major goals by creating political fissures both in the Western democracies and in Israel itself, as well as upending plans for a treaty among Israel, the U.S., and Saudi Arabia.

Just as 9/11 changed our world, so too has 10/7. A year later, with a wider war all but certain, it is clear that peace in the Middle East is more elusive than ever with an outcome that will reverberate across the globe today and for generations to come.

### THE MOST PATHETIC GAME IN NFL HISTORY?

We don't mean to keep harping on our poor Patriots, but their contest this past Sunday with the Miami Dolphins has to rate as the most pathetic excuse for a professional football game we've ever seen in our lives -- and we've been Pats' fans since the 1960s, so we've witnessed quite a few sorry performances.

The Pats entered the game as the #31 offensive team in the NFL, exceeded in futility only by the Dolphins at #32 -- and the game lived up to the low expectations of both teams, featuring a variety of miscues that normally you might see once in an NFL game, not multiple times.

In the first half alone, the Dolphins missed a mid-range field goal that bounced off the goal post, dribbled a snap back to the holder on another field goal attempt, snapped a ball over their quarterback's head, and had a punt blocked.

The Patriots missed a short field goal, shanked a punt, allowed hapless veteran quarterback Jacoby Brissette to be hit countless times, and committed 12 penalties for 105 yards.

It was a performance by both teams not worthy of even a JV high school game -- and fans paid hundreds of dollars for a ticket for that sorry demonstration. From the perspective of long-time Pats' fans, we'd like to chalk it up to just a tough week, but it is clear that this will be a season that is only going to get worse.

state's transportation infrastructure and extends the tunnel's useful life by at least 75 years.

"The Sumner Tunnel Restoration Project was a hugely important effort that ensures this vital piece of infrastructure is in the best possible condition going forward," said MassDOT Secretary and CEO Monica Tibbits-Nutt. "We know this project created inconveniences for the public and particularly for the people of East Boston. We thank them for their patience and cooperation."

"We are thrilled that we have been able to deliver this project ahead of schedule" said State Highway Administrator Jonathan Gulliver. "I want to thank our contractor, JF White, who worked tirelessly with our team at MassDOT to find ways to accelerate this important work. I also want to thank the travelling public and residents for their patience and support during this important project."

During the extensive

rehabilitation of the entire tunnel the pre-existing suspended ceiling was removed and over 700 precast concrete arches installed, new fireproof wallboard was installed throughout the length of the tunnel making a dramatic improvement in its fire safety. Over 500 new light fixtures were installed, and new conduit and cables were put in place. The existing asphalt was removed from the length of the roadway and the concrete below was rehabilitated. Granite curbing and drain inlet were replaced. The entire length of the roadway was repaved and relined. This weekend's closure was the 59th one dating back to 2022.

The Sumner Tunnel Restoration Project offered a variety of mitigation options for individuals coming from all travel points. Mitigation options included free trips on the MBTA Blue Line; free and reduced cost water ferry options; reduced Com-

muter Rail fares for riders; reduced parking costs at MBTA and Commuter Rail parking lots and garages; discounted tolls for residents; and additional options for travelers to and from Logan Airport.

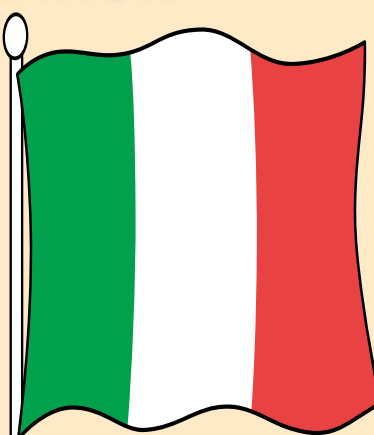

#### LEVEL WEEK FOR EHS BOYS SOCCER

The Everett High boys soccer team enjoyed a level week, going 1-1-1 against three opponents.

Last Tuesday, the Crimson Tide hosted Greater Boston League (GBL) rival Medford at 7-Acre Park and earned a 2-0 victory. Everett had a strong first half of possessing the ball and creating multiple chances, but did not dent the Mustangs' net until the second half. Captain Gabriel Garcia (assisted by sophomore Efrain Ramos) and senior Henrique Pinto (assisted by senior Jefferson Carballo) reached the back of the Medford net to provide the offense, while goalkeeper Douglas Landaverde made six saves to post the clean sheet.

Two days later the Tide entertained GBL foe Malden.

"It was a very rough start for us trying to create chances and hold onto the ball," said EHS head coach Rodney Landaverde. "It was not a successful first half."

The second half also saw the Tide initially prove unable to establish momentum and the Golden Tornadoes broke the deadlock with a goal with about 25 minutes left in the game. However, the deficit seemed to spur the Crimson Tide to pick up their intensity, as they began to push the ball forward.

Everett's efforts paid off with about seven minutes remaining when Luvens Hector reached the back of the Malden net, assisted by senior defender Antony Henriquez (his first assist of the year) for the 1-1 tie.

This past Saturday the Tide made the long trek to non-league opponent Lowell, the second-ranked team in the state with a perfect 10-0 record. "We were missing some key players defensively and had to make some adjustments and rotate players," said Landaverde. "We conceded early on and were down 1-0 at halftime. In the second half we were able to hold the ball and generate chances, but we were short

of finishing."

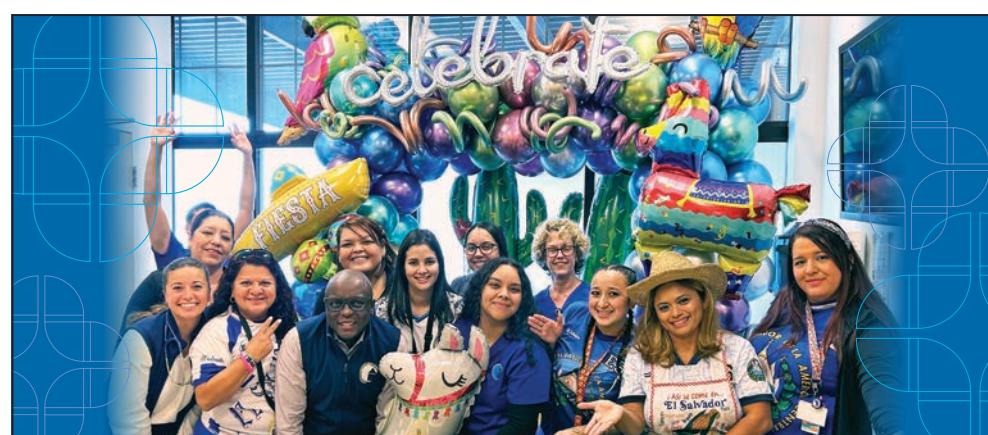
Lowell was awarded a free kick and converted for the 2-0 finale.

### GIRLS VOLLEYBALL EARNS BIG WIN OVER CHELSEA

The Everett High girls volleyball team earned an important victory last week, defeating Greater Boston League (GBL) rival Chelsea 25-13, 21-25, 13-25, 25-19, 15-12.

"It is definitely satisfying to win a game like that, especially against an opponent that has had our number the past few years," said EHS head coach Michael Fineran of his team's first five-set triumph of the season. "They were the only team to beat us 3-0 in the first half of the season, so we had something to prove."

The victory improved the Lady Crimson Tide to 4-7 on the year and marked their fourth win in five matches. Fineran and his crew need to go 6-3 the rest of the way in order to earn a spot in the post-season state tournament.

"That's been our goal all year. We dug ourselves a hole starting 0-6, but we have given ourselves a real shot to make it," Fineran said.

"Another reason this win was satisfying is that it started out like most of our matches this year -- we dominated the first set, as we have done in nine of our 11 matches, including the three matches against the first and second place teams in the league," said Fineran. "And as with many of those matches though, we could not sustain it. However, we re-

covered in the fourth set and then fought hard to earn the win in the final frame.

"It's a cliché to say that it took a total team effort, but for us that was 100% true," Fineran continued. "We played 14 people during the match and each one contributed something invaluable to the team."

"We were led as always by our two senior captains, Victoria Rodrigues and Sonia Constanza Flores," said the coach. "Victoria gave one of the best all-around performances I have ever seen in my 20 years of coaching. She was phenomenal as a back row passer and as a setter in the front row. She hit 17 serves in, aced four of them, notched six kills, and had a stuff block."

"Sonia matched her serving, also tallying four aces in 17 serves in. She also notched a kill, despite playing from the back row as the team's designated libero," said Fineran.

Senior Murielle Campo was the third Tide player to hit 17 serves in and score four aces. Senior Clarice Alexis had three aces and five kills. Senior Tanessa Duvilaire had a team-high eight kills. Senior Ashley Seward served 13 in, with one ace, four kills, and three blocks.

The junior class members of the team also made a strong contribution. Nicole Damaceno was 14/15 serving with two kills and a block as the second setter. Lindsey Cherichel-Paul and Juliette Romboli split time at the outside hitter position and combined for four kills. Sophomore Cassandra Tanyag made an immediate impact on serve-serve, where Chelsea had dominated in the second and third sets, to regain Everett's edge in the match.

"Once we were able to secure better passes, we could be more aggressive on offense," Fineran noted. "Earlier in the season, we were playing it safe. We're starting to

gain more confidence, and we're going to need it as we play six of the last nine games on the road."

Fineran and his crew took on Lynn Classical (the top team in the GBL) this past Monday and will entertain Lynn English today (Wednesday). They will travel to Somerville next Tuesday and to Medford next Wednesday.

# City of Everett honors World War II Veteran Bernard LaVita at Square Dedication

The City of Everett recently joined together with family members of Bernard LaVita on Friday, Sept. 27 for a square dedication to honor the United States Army veteran.

Emceed by Director of Veterans' Affairs Antoine Coleman, the ceremony took place adjacent to the new sign located at the corner of Cedar Street and Central Avenue. In addition to Coleman, Mayor Carlo DeMaria spoke about LaVita's legacy and the importance of honoring the veteran in the City of Everett.

LaVita, who enlisted in the Army immediately af-



ter graduating from Everett High School in 1944, served in World War II and took part in operations such as the Ardennes and Rhineland campaigns. He was awarded multiple accolades for his service, including the Purple Heart for wounds he received from shrapnel,

which he would carry for the rest of his life.

Following LaVita's time in the Army, he would return home and begin a career with the Massachusetts Department of Public Works (known today as the Massachusetts High-

way Department). He served in roles that included administrative assistant to the chief engineer and director of labor relations for the union representing members in the Department of Public Works. Along with his wife, Dorothy, they raised three boys and they became grandparents many times over.

"Barely a man, Bernard LaVita walked into the hell of war with courage and hope in his heart, with a fierce commitment to his brothers-in-arms, and with the grit we have come to expect from all those who volunteer to wear the uniform," said Mayor Carlo

DeMaria. "He came home and built his life in Everett as a beacon of service, of dignity, and of character for us all to emulate. The
