Some School Committee members regret lucrative contract with Foresteire

School Committee Chair Tom Abruzzese said he was embarrassed and frustrated by the employment contract that allowed former Supt. Fred Foresteire to accumulate hundreds of unused vacation days over his career, time that is now worth more than \$450,000.

"With my background, and even though this isn't my specialty in law, it's embarrassing for me and I take full responsibility for this having occurred under my watch," he said. "This contract is something that should have never happened. It's in the budget, yes, but it doesn't make it any better to deal with...This is a contract from 30 years ago. The former Superintendent had a rolling contract. Technically, none of us were there 30 years ago, but clearly some of us here never went through this document with a finetooth comb since we've been on the Committee...I was completely unaware of this in Mr. Foresteire's contract."

The matter in question came up at Monday's School Committee meeting as the embattled body continued to sort through the lingering matters regarding former Supt. Fred Foresteire - who has been charged with seven counts of indecent assault and battery as well for alleged sexual misconduct over a period of years.

Encore Boston Harbor said to have handled two harassments well

During the Massachusetts Gaming Commission (MGC) hearing into Wynn's suitability on Tuesday morning, it was revealed that two sexual harassment complaints had been leveled against an executive at the Everett office in 2017 and 2018.

Attorney Denise Murphy, a Boston attorney hired by the MGC to investigate Encore, reported to the Commissioners during the hearing that she was brought on to look at two complaints made at Encore since its inception and how they were handled.

Public's assistance sought in Bradford Terrace homicide

Police release sketch of alleged attacker

Everett Police and District Attorney Marian Ryan have released a sketch of the alleged suspect in a fatal stabbing on Bradford Terrace last week, and are calling for help from the public in identifying the man.

DA Marian Ryan and Police Chief Steven Mazzie are seeking the public's assistance in connection with the March 26 fatal stabbing that occurred at 9 p.m. on Bradford Terrace. The victim has been identified Michael Starr, 54, Everett, who worked as a plumber and mechanic. The preliminary investigation suggests that the victim, who lived in the area, was walking home from a store on Ferry Street when he was assaulted on the sidewalk. He was transported to CHA Everett where he was later pronounced dead.

No one has been charged in connection with this homi-

Based on preliminary information it appears this may have been a random incident and robbery does not appear to be a motive. Investigators believe that the suspect may be a male in his late 20s, average height, with a tan complexion. He is believed to have been wearing glasses, a black hooded sweatshirt, a black knit hat, and black gloves and was described as having a narrow nose and a

thin build. This is the second stabbing that has occurred on Bradford Terrace in the past 10 days. On March 16, at approximately 9 p.m. a male in his 20s was stabbed while walking home. That victim was taken to an area hospital with serious injuries and survived. As part of the investigation into the death of Michael Starr authorities are working to determine if the two incidents are connected.

For this reason the District Attorney's Office and Police are also asking the public to think broadly and report any suspicious activity they may have seen over the past several weeks including people acting strangely in the areas of Ferry Street, Cedar Street or Bradford Terrace.

While Everett Police will

have an increased presence in this area, members of the public are still urged to use caution when traveling in the nighttime hours and always be aware of their surround-

Long-anticipated

Investigators found a culture of secrecy, failure to follow policies for Steve Wynn complaints

The Massachusetts Gaming Commission (MGC) unveiled its long-anticipated investigation of Wynn Resorts and Encore Boston Harbor and reported they found a company culture that did not follow policies when allegations were made against former CEO Steve Wynn, and also used extreme secrecy to hide allegations and settlements involving him in several cases.

That, however, was tempered also by a laundry list of changes that the company has

made in the last 14 months, including ousting Steve Wynn and implementing a robust corporate governance struc-

"However," said Karen Wells, MGC Investigations and Enforcement Bureau (IEB) director, "the past cannot be erased by these chang-

That set the tone for the unveiling of what had been found over the last year by the IEB using thousands of pages of information, conducting

Restaurant owner will fight for 'sign'

When Wilton Rangel looked at the front of his Broadway steakhouse, he determined it needed a bull.

So he had an six-foot white bull imported from Brazil at a cost of \$5,000 and spent another \$2,000 installing it on the platform in front of his restaurant, long-time favorite Oliveira's Brazilian Steakhouse on Broadway.

It was a hit right from the start, he said, when he installed it about two months

"You should see, I have about a thousand people on Facebook that like it," he said. "Everybody likes it. My customers love it. People stop across the street and see the

hundreds of witness interviews, and traveling to six states to produce the report. That report had been held up with a lawsuit from Steve Wynn last November asserting attorney-client privilege, but that suit was recently settled and that allowed the unveiling to go forward Tuesday morning.

"In evaluating the IEB investigation, it showed a pattern of certain employees, including the Legal Division, disregarding policies when it came to allegations against Mr. Wynn," she said. "It showed they made great efforts at secrecy so that it made it difficult if not impossible for gaming regulators to uncover these incidents."

Earlier, she also said, "The investigation actually vealed a culture in the company where employees hesitated to report sexual misconduct allegations against Mr. Wynn. We found the company failed to safeguard the well-being and safety of its employees."

At the outset of the investigation unveiling, Loretta Lillios, of the IEB, said what happened at the company mattered. She bookended the impending report with the idea that a gaming license is a privilege and not a right – noting that companies have to always keep proper policies and conduct in place or risk losing the license.

It was a warning that all things were on the table, including the loss of Encore's license.

"The IEB's investigation revealed the company's adherence to these criteria has been called into question," she said. "What happened at the company matters. It matters to the women who have been directly affected by the allegations of sexual misconduct. It matters to the workforce and employees here. It matters to the Commission. It matters to the people of Massachusetts... After all the evidence and testimony is presented, you will have ample information to apply the law and make a sound determination."

Wells detailed for most of her presentation the allegations against Steve Wynn, using a timeline to go through the allegations and the response to them. She started in 2005 with the settlement paid to a manicurist at Wynn Las Vegas who claimed she had been raped by Steve Wynn and was now pregnant as a result of two such encounters. That allegation was detailed in the original Wall Street Journal article in January 2018 that opened the entire sexual misconduct situation.

A main issue, Wells said, was to not decide whether the allegations were true, but whether the company responded correctly and whether it should have divulged information to the MGC in 2013.

"The Commission is not evaluating whether the allegations are true or false, but

it is evaluating the company's response to the allegations," she said. "A key question for the Commission to consider is whether the company's failure to divulge derogatory information may have a role in suitability or the suitability of a qualifier...We now know in 2013 at least three Massachusetts qualifiers had knowledge of these allegations. They were Steve Wynn, Elaine Wynn and Kim Sinatra...A key question for the Commission is whether this relevant information should have been divulged on the front end rather than us having to investigate this now."

The IEB also indicated that they tried to interview Steve Wynn several times, and he declined. However, he did release a statement that was read by Wells to the Commission.

"I had multiple sexual relationships during my tenure at Wynn Resorts and made no attempt to document them," the statement read. "I do not believe any of the specific details of these relationships are material to the issues I understand are being reviewed by the special committee. I recognize some of the names obtained in the witness questions, but have no memory of ever meeting or having relationships with the women whose names are in your questions. I deny having any relationship that was not consensual. During the time I was employed by Wynn I was aware of a code of conduct and other policies. I was not however familiar with the details of those policies.'

Many of the key questions in the investigation included information garnered during discovery in the case of Elaine Wynn vs. Steve Wynn, as well as in a case known as the Okada case. Much of what was brought out in regard to the allegations and the response to them came from that case.

For Sinatra, who left the company in July 2018 with multi-million dollar severance package, it became clear she knew of the allegations against Wynn during the 2013 suitability hearings. Yet, she did not divulge them, and the investigation seemed to suggest she wasn't clear as to what she remembered know-

One such exchange involved an e-mail chain where a letter detailing a hostile working environment was described. That letter in that e-mail was up for dispute as to whether Sinatra read it, read all of it, or if she even really knew about it.

Much of her responses, according to the report, were that she didn't recall a lot of information.

"I don't recall if I knew in `14," she had responded when asked if she knew the original 2005 case included a rape allegation of the manicurist.

Also in question was how the company responded after the Wall Street Journal article, including putting out an immediate statement of support letter for Steve Wynn to employees. That statement also included a reference to the article as being the latest strategy in Elaine Wynn's legal case

against the company.

Wells said that was put out before any investigation into the matter and without consideration to employees that may have been affected by Steve Wynn's alleged behavior.

Wynn Communications Director Michael Weaver said he would not do that again if he were to do it over.

"Mr. Weaver stated to investigators that if he was to do it over again, he would do it differently," Wells testified.

Maddox also told investigators that he simply believed Steve Wynn.

"As ridiculous as it looks now, we believed it," Wells summarized. "We believed it. I know it's tone deaf.'

The letter to employees went out with the input of Steve Wynn and others in the organization, but was under the signature of Wynn Las Vegas President Maurice Wooden - who indicated he was uncomfortable with the letter in his name but felt he had no choice in the matter.

That letter was followed up by what turned out to be an ill-advised Town Hall style employee meeting tour by Steve Wynn and other company officials. It had been reported in media accounts that employees at the Town Halls were asked to raise their hands if Steve Wynn had assaulted or abused them. That had not been confirmed before, but the IEB investigation revealed that Wynn Attorney Stacy Michaels told investigators that she was present and that did happen.

The remainder of the first day of hearings focused on the new Board members and the new members of the corporate hierarchy.

The MGC listened to detailed presentations about each new Board member and each new employee. Each told the story of how they had been recruited – some by Matt Maddox – to serve on the Board in the aftermath of the crisis at the company.

All of them were being reviewed by the MGC for suitability, and if they were qualified to serve on the Board or work in their positions.

The testimony by Wynn attorneys was to begin on Wednesday, where they would present their case and ask questions regarding the IEB

The MGC did remind everyone that there would be no vote at the end of the proceedings, nor would there be any sort of discussion of the report or testimony.

Instead, when all of the information had been gathered, the MGC would deliberate in private - with the option of asking for more or additional information.

At some point in the near future, they would issue their findings and their remedies - including the possibility of stripping the license – in a written report.

Shrewsbury man indicted in a complex motor vehicle fraud scheme

A Shrewsbury man who owns two automotive repair businesses – including one on Lower Broadway - has been indicted in connection with a complex motor vehicle fraud scheme in which he damaged vehicles and stole \$170,000, Attorney General Maura

Healey announced last week. Adam Haddad, 42, was indicted on March 26 by a Statewide Grand Jury on the charges of Motor Vehicle Insurance Fraud (18 counts), Larceny by False Pretenses Over \$1,200 (15 counts), At- Fraud Bureau. These charges tempted Larceny (3 counts), and Malicious Destruction of Property (6 counts).

ADH Collison of Boston Inc., owned by Haddad and located in Everett, was indicted on charges of Motor Vehicle Insurance Fraud (10 counts) and Larceny by False Pretenses Over \$1,200 (8 counts).

ADH has recently sued Wynn Resorts for allegedly forcing them out of their Low-

er Broadway location using pressure from the City. Those claims are currently filed in Federal Court.

Accurate Collision Inc., owned by Haddad and located in Worcester, was indicted on the charges of Motor Vehicle Insurance Fraud (8 counts) and Larceny by False Pretenses Over \$1,200 (7 counts). The defendants will be arraigned in Middlesex County and Worcester County at later

The AG's Office began its investigation in 2017, after a referral from the Insurance are the result of a joint investigation by the Insurance Fraud Bureau of Massachusetts, the Massachusetts State Police assigned to the AG's Office and the Everett Police Department.

The investigation revealed that over the past four years, Haddad regularly enhanced damage, and caused new damage, to customer's vehicles in order to falsely inflate


Surveillance footage from one of Haddad's business locations shows him using mallets, sledge hammers, and pieces of wood to intentionally cause damage to five customers' vehicles.

In total, the AG's Office alleges that he stole more than \$170,000 from 11 different

bull and come over and take pictures of it. City officials tell me they love it. Most people thought it was great. Only a few didn't like it.'

Those few turned out to be some City officials, who determined that the Broadway bull was against City regula-

Others weren't too happy that the bull was fully anatomically correct, and found it embarrassing to look at.

It was a surprise to Rangel. "In Brazil, you see these things a lot, especially at a steakhouse or a farm," he said. "You have a lot of them here too. They have one in Manhattan on Wall Street and people come from all over the world to take a picture with the bull. There was a big bull on Rt. 1 at the Hilltop Steakhouse. They have a big orange dinosaur on Rt. 1 too. In 10 years, they probably won't want to take this bull down. It will be part of history here too.'

But first, the bull has run into some horns.

On March 18, Inspectional Services Director Jim Soper sent a let to Rangel take down the bull or apply for a sign/ billboard permit. They argued that it constituted an illegal business accessory sign, and he needed a permit.

"The Building Commissioner has determined that the replica of a bull mounted in front of the business establishment constitutes an advertisement of goods, products and serviced provided; therefore, the model meets the definition of a sign (in the City of Everett Signs and Billboard Ordinance)...The applicant must seek relief in the form of an appeal to the Zoning Board of Appeals to annul the action of the Building Commissioner within 30 days of this decision."



Oliveira's Brazilian Steakhouse owner Wilton Rangel has riled up some in the community by putting up a realistic, six-foot bull in front of his popular Broadway restaurant. Now, the City says he has to get a permit from the Zoning Board, or take down the bull. Rangel said he plans to fight for the bull.

Therefore, Rangel needed a date at the ZBA, a place he has been many times and found it to be difficult over the years as he has built his business.

Rangel has also had many run-ins with the License Board too, and Commissioners there have had epic battles with his expansions and activities over the years.

City officials said the ZBA would consider the application for the bull like any other before the board. On Monday, Rangel said his daughter – an architect and general contractor – put in an application for a hearing at the ZBA.

One City official already outraged by the bull is Councilor Michael McLaughlin.

"I was surprised to see such an object placed on Broadway," he said. "I have supported this business publicly during their building project most recently. However, I strongly am against this bull. Wilton is a business owner who has given back to our community and doesn't say 'no' when asked to volunteer. He has helped us grow our community. This all being said, I don't support this bull and I would like to see it removed as soon as possible from its current location."

One of the problems for McLaughlin and some others against the bull is the fact that it is anatomically correct, meaning its private parts are visible as would be on a real

To solve that problem, Rangel said he plans to saw off any offensive parts if and when he gets the license. He said he just wants the bull to draw attention to his steakhouse, not offend his potential customers and the community due to its realistic display.

More than anything, though, he said he is ready to fight for the bull.

"At first, I wasn't going to fight it; I was just going to take it down," he said. "Then I thought about it. I spent a lot of money on it. Most everybody loves it and my customers love it. So, I'm going to fight it.'

Everett, Wynn respond to unveiling of the MGC report

Everett residents and Wynn company officials responded Tuesday afternoon to the unveiling of the MGC investigation, with most Everett residents saying they weren't shocked and they hoped that the Encore project would move forward.

A couple dozen Everett residents attended the hearing on Tuesday, including Councilors John Hanlon and Michael McLaughlin. Most took it all in, and during the lunch break Tuesday afternoon, said they weren't entirely shocked by the nature of the report.

"It's all in the hand of the Gaming Commission," said Louanne Zawordny. "With everything going on, it's a different time. We've been involved in this for so long. We just want the decision made and to go forward. It's been a long journey for us. Since day one for us, it's been the jobs and opportunities. Why should Everett have to pay for one man's bad deeds?"

Mayor Carlo DeMaria said he believes the company has made great changes since the allegations came forward, and he also thanked the MGC for conducting the investigation so thoroughly.

"I chose to do business with this company because they are regarded internationally as the best in the industry for the product they deliver,' he said. "It should go without saying that everyone has the right to feel safe at work and anywhere else; anything less is unacceptable. The company has made appropriate changes over the past 14 months, including appointing new members to the board, changing leadership, and extensively reviewing and revising their internal policies and procedures. I want to thank the Gaming Commission for conducting a transparent and comprehensive process. My hope is that they can continue to move as efficiently as possible to ensure the resort opens on time as one of the larger employers in the region. We all look forward to moving ahead."

Charles DiPerri, of Everett United, said he was ready for a very negative morning, but it wasn't as bad as he expect-

"So far, so good," he said. "It sounded like thumbs up for us in Everett. The setup for the public could have been better though. We were told we would hear a lot of negative things. I haven't heard a lot of negativity yet. I think the Commission has made up

their minds already.' Councilor Hanlon said he believes the investigation showed that the company successfully addressed the problem, particularly with the removal of Steve Wynn completely.

"He never said he was guilty and there was no charge against him," he said. "Even if he said he was guilty, he's been dealt with and completely out of the picture. Even though it was very unfortunate what he allegedly did, he's completely divorced from them. He has nothing to do with Everett."

After the morning session, Wynn Resorts issued a statement stressing the changes they had made to the company – something they pushed heavily all morning in their statements and speeches.

"The presentation by the IEB provided a detailed and thorough review of the findings of its report to the Massachusetts Gaming Commission," read the statement. "The findings are consistent with the investigation conducted by our own Special Committee of Independent Directors as well as that of the Nevada Gaming Control Board. former contract that was in question on Monday night, and in particular a clause that allowed him to accumulate sick and vacation days year days, but Foresteire's contract specified that he was allowed to keep those days and cash them in upon retirement.

It was estimated in 2017 that the School Department owed Foresteire - who annually took one week of vacation and saved the rest of his time – some \$450,000.

Already, the School Department has paid out around \$200,000 to Foresteire for that sick and vacation time, but there is still a large chunk looming in the budget to be paid.

However, School Committeeman Bernie D'Onofrio asked that the matter be sent to the Legal Committee for examination by School Committee attorneys. He said he wanted to pursue it and see if it has to be paid out.

"We all signed the contract; it was very clear," protested School Committeeman Lester MacLaughlin.

Said D'Onofrio, "It isn't very clear. That's why I brought it up. That's why I'm pursuing it. I've seen the

contracts and they don't look like contracts. Whatever Mr. (Spencer) Tobin and Mr. Foresteire did, I don't know. I'm going to pursue this and find over year. In most workplac- out if there are any stipulaes, one cannot carry over such tions. If it's right, it's right, but I'm going to look at it."

Committeeman School Frank Parker said he signed the contract too, but he said he felt like there wasn't much that could be done. He said the schools have budgeted for the payout, and should just get it over with this budget year.

"My name was on the top of that contract too," he said. "I take full responsibility. We have to take care of that one way or another. That not fair to take this liability and go over to next year's budget... It's not going to impact staffing or any programming. We knew it was there. We knew it was coming and we budgeted appropriately."

Abruzzese, who spoke freely and resolutely during that portion of the meeting, said one year ago the School Committee was hit "with a Mike Tyson right cross down the hallway" in executive session. That hit was the night that Foresteire informed them, he said, that he was owed significant amounts of vacation time and he wanted to cash it in.

"At that time, it was the first time we were told that amount was close to \$450,000," he said. "I've worked for the Commonwealth for 30 years and we are not allowed to accrue vacation time. I don't know anywhere where anyone is allowed to accumulate vacation time like that because of what it would do in a situation like this. This is not GM or GE. This is not some type of severance package we are giving our CEO so he can run off into the sunset."


School Committeewoman Millie Cardello and School Committeeman Marcony Almeida-Barros both clarified that they were not on the Committee at the time that the contract was last approved.

Both said they supported having the Committee's attorneys look at the matter and get back to them.

Another part of the puzzle they will examine is if Foresteire would get paid in current dollars for time that was accrued as far back as 1990 when he made far less and, thus, his vacation days were worth far less.

The matter was referred to Committee for examination on a vote of 8-1, with MacLaughlin voting against.



DIDOMENICO HONORED BY AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY **CANCER ACTION NETWORK**



Last week, the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network honored Sen. Sal DiDomenico and other members of the House and the Senate for their joint effort last session to pass a comprehensive youth tobacco prevention law. Sen. DiDomenico's bill, which banned the sale of tobacco products in pharmacies, was included as a key component of the omnibus bill that raised the legal age of tobacco use from 18 to 21. The omnibus was a collaborative effort by a number of legislators to reduce youth tobacco use in the Commonwealth. "Thank you to the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network for honoring me and my fellow Senate and House colleagues for our work on Massachusetts's new comprehensive youth tobacco prevention law. It is an honor to receive this Advocacy Award, and I would like to thank the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network for their tireless advocacy on this critical issue for our youth and residents throughout the Commonwealth. We couldn't have passed this legislation without the assistance of so many passionate advocates making sure that this issue was addressed in a meaningful way." Tobacco use and nicotine addiction remains the leading cause of preventable illness and premature death in Massachusetts, responsible for more than \$4 billion in annual health care costs to the Commonwealth. Youth are particularly susceptible to nicotine addiction, with 9 in 10 cigarette smokers begin using before age 18. While youth smoking has declined considerably in the last two decades, youth use of other addictive tobacco products like e-cigarettes is increasing sharply. The comprehensive legislation passed last session was cited as a major public health achievement to reduce youth access to tobacco and nicotine products.

"I think actually the company did everything right in the context of their limited resources then located in Boston," said Murphy to the MGC. "The attorney handling the matter reached out appropriately and did everything she could to assure the victim they were in the right..."

The first complaint against the executive - who was brought in as a specialist to help open the casino – came when a female worker was disturbed when the executive massaged her from behind on the shoulders and acted awkwardly as she made airplane reservations for him on a computer.

She never reported it to anyone, but was visually disturbed in front of a male co-worker. That co-worker learned what happened and reported it to Attorney Jacqui Krum, who was the on-site attorney at the time. Krum informed executives in Las Vegas and local attorneys as

After looking into the executive's background, they found no previous incidents and determined it was a "he said, she said" situation.

"They did multiple interviews," she said. "They

identified by the complainant. They found the person was incredibly socially awkward, isolated, nerdy and unique. This was a special knowledge person there because he had special knowledge of how to get the job done at casinos. He had done so at multiple locations. Matt Maddox suggested him because this person had the skill set to get Encore Boston Harbor off and running. They had had a disaster before at an opening and they wanted the best possible opening for

Encore Boston Harbor." second complaint The came in July 2018 against the same executive and another female co-worker.

In this case, just prior to the July 4th holiday, the executive and the complainant went to Starbucks for coffee. When the woman tried to pay for the coffee, the executive overrode her, putting his hand over her mouth and presenting his own credit card to pay.

The complainant was very distressed and reported the incident that same day on a supervisory call with her Las Vegas superiors. Those Las Vegas superiors then informed Attorney Krum, who with a human resources professional from Las Vegas, put their holiday plans on hold to investigate the matter immediately.

They spoke to every person and every witness identified. They spoke to the female complainant and to the executive.

The executive had been in multiple trainings for sexual harassment and workplace behavior, as well as an enhanced training.

"It became quite clear this person had no idea how bad his behavior was no matter how many times he was told," said Murphy. "He just had no boundaries...It was a significant factor I was told in him no longer being with the company.'

Murphy said she also reviewed Encore's policies and procedures around sexual harassment.

There were several policies and procedures that she said were not very good practices, including a policy early on that required the complainant to have to meet with the alleged harasser.

"No victim of harassment should be required to confront their employer," she said. "That requirement is no longer there in the policy."

She said Encore has also changed several other policies that are contrary to best practice, or against the law.



Members of Everett United were on hand Tuesday to watch the proceedings and support Encore. Most said they didn't hear anything they didn't expect.

City, Zoning Board looking to revamp order of project approval process

A new set of development design standards will help building projects adhere to a more uniform vision for the city, and help take some pressure off the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) from being the "bad guys" during the design permitting and approval

Representatives from consultant Stantec Engineers presented a draft of those design standards to the ZBA Monday

"We are trying to refine the design review process so that it is predictable throughout for everyone," said Tamara Roy of Stantec.

The design standards promote Mayor Carlo DeMaria's vision of a more walkable, transit-friendly Everett with a mix of office, retail, and residential uses for larger proj-

Roy said more uniform design and site plan standards would also help developers when it comes to knowing what to expect when presenting a project to the city. The new standards would also streamline the approval process for building projects, she

The current plan is to adopt the guidelines as a pilot project for the Planning Board before being officially adopted by the Planning Board and possibly being adopted as a city ordinance for greater enforcement, according to Stantec officials.

Of major interest to ZBA members was the proposed change in the approval process, putting ZBA approval of special permits and variances later in the process.

ZBA Chair Joseph DeSisto asked if the guidelines addressed two of the major issues facing the ZBA and other city boards - parking and traf-

Roy said the guidelines address issues related to parking and traffic such as the design of parking areas and entrances and exits from properties, they do not address the city ordinances that require two parking spaces per residential unit.

However, James Soper, the city's Inspectional Services Director, said a transportation plan that addresses parking and parking ratios is in the

"Two of the major issues in the city are parking, like every other city, and traffic," DeSisto said to Roy. "You should be aware of that. A lot of your plan may be magnificent, but if you ignore those two issues

While the parking issues remain on the table, DeSisto and several other ZBA members were receptive to a proposed change in the approval process that puts applicants before the Planning Board before coming to the ZBA for any necessary special permits or variances.

Currently, applicants come before the ZBA seeking relief before heading to the Planning Board for overall site

plan approval. DeSisto said this can often leave the ZBA in the dark about Planning Board input on projects. He said the ZBA is bound by city ordinances and determining hardship when it comes to letting projects move forward.

"We end up being the bad guys," said DeSisto. "We have to comply with all the laws passed down the hall (by the City Council).'

Soper said the revised process would take a lot of pressure off the ZBA. In addition to building proposals going to the Planning Board before the ZBA, developers and applicants would also meet with Planning Department and City officials during the early schematic stages.

"You're really the last stamp on this on whether (a project) is a go or no go," said Soper. "A lot of work will be done before it gets to you or the Planning Board."

Soper also noted that the ZBA would maintain its ability to put conditions on any projects that appear before it.

"We are getting a lot of developers interested in our community, and I think this is a good way to get not a good project, but a great project," said Soper.

•In other business, the ZBA accepted a continuance for the 108 Ferry St. project (Ferry Street Grille) calling for 20 residential units and just under 1,500 sq. ft. of commer-

The developers will bring the project back before the ZBA at its May 20 meeting, when the board is expected to have all its members in attendance. ZBA member Richard Zullo could not attend Tuesday night's meeting, meaning the Ferry Street developer would have needed a unanimous vote to move the project forward.

Wynn CEO says they will lead on human resources, treatment of employees

Wynn Resorts CEO Matt Maddox told the Massachusetts Gaming Commission (MGC) in the company's opening words on Tuesday morning that they have transformed completely since allegations surfaced in the Wall Street Journal 14 months ago, and he pledged that the company will lead in the area of human resources.

After opening statements by the Commission and investigators – as well as a round of introductions - Maddox was invited to make a statement for the company.

In resolute terms that hearkened to the May 2018 MGC meeting where he was questioned by Commissioners on Steve Wynn, Maddox took on a tone of sorrow for what had happened and pledged to never let anything like that happen again.

"As...investigations began, the denial changed, and I began to realize that there were many victims - and those victims felt powerless," he said. "For that I am deeply remorseful. They felt that they didn't have a voice. That if they were to speak up they could be retaliated against. Or if they did, it would not be investigated. For that I am truly sorry. I am sorry that our company did not live up to its values. And when I started

very personally. And decided that no matter who the CEO is of Wynn Resorts, or who the Chairman is, that would never happen again.

We were going transform ourselves from a founder-led company that was about a man into a progressive company that's about the 25,000 people. We weren't just going to get to best practices – we were going to lead."

Maddox detailed that after the article in January 2018, the company was shaken to its core, primarily because it was a company that was centered around its founder, Steve Wynn. With their founder on the ropes, he said that investors began appearing that wanted to break up the company, and activist investors were swirling."

He said when he took over, he knew the truth had to come

"We had 75,000 people worried about what their future was going to be," he said. "I knew when I took over on February 7, 2018 that we had to be strong, be fast and get to the truth. Only the truth was going to let this company survive and thrive. We had to be transparent, cooperative and progressive."

Maddox then launched into a statement on what the company has done in the last 14 months, particularly the fact that they have brought

to realize that truth, I took it on a new, much more diverse Board of Directors. He also stressed that they have separated the job of CEO of the Chairman of the Board. Steve Wynn had served as the CEO and Chair of the Board.

That, he said, is no longer possible under their new corporate policies.

"We were going to have fully independent compliance committees, a totally refreshed Board of Directors, a new management team, and indirect and direct reporting, so there would never be another opportunity for someone to feel like they did not have a voice," he said. "That was my commitment to this Company. And that is the journey we have been on for the last 14 months – this transformation from a company that was about a man into a company that has values; that what we stand for is the 25,000 people of Wynn Resorts."

He said the changes have also made their company has also transformed into one that concentrates on giving to the community rather than focusing on its bottom line.

"Because the days of a company focused on its bottom line to measure success are yesterday," he said. "A company needs to be viewed as a net giver in the communities in which it operates, not a net taker.'

Second defendant found guilty of murder in 2016 shooting

Middlesex District Attorney Marian Ryan and Everett Chief of Police Steven Mazzie have announced that Jose Vasquez Ardon, 20, of lance footage. Everett, was found guilty by a Middlesex Superior Court Jury on March 26 of first-degree murder in connection with the January 3, 2016 fatal shooting of 19-year-old Omar Wilfredo Reyes, of Everett.

The jury deliberated for approximately three and a half hours before reaching a ver-

At approximately 12:20 a.m. on January 3, 2016, Everett Police responded to a report of an injured man under the Tileston Street Bridge behind Carter Street. Upon arrival, they located Reyes, who had sustained a single gunshot wound to the head. He was found directly beneath MS-13 graffiti and it appeared that the victim had been wearing headphones when he was shot as his music was still playing when he was located by a passerby. Reyes was then transported to Massachusetts General Hospital where he died from his injuries on Jan-

uary 4. Massachusetts State Police assigned to the Middlesex District Attorney's Office and Everett Police immediately began an investigation.

Through their investigation, authorities learned that on January 2, 2016, the victim received several messages from Jose Vasquez Ardon asking him to meet up. Reyes was met by the defendant, Cristian Nunez and allegedly Rigoberto Landaverde-Lemus, 25, of Everett, who walked to the underpass of the Tileston Street Bridge where the fatal shooting occurred. Authorities also observed that when the victim was discovered he had a 14inch slash in his jacket.

Investigators obtained surveillance footage from where Reyes was supposed to meet the defendants. In one clip, the surveillance shows three

males and the victim. About seven and a half minutes later, the three defendants can be seen emerging from the tunnel without the victim. Ardon's face is visible in the surveil-

learn that Jose Vasquez Ardon had sent a series of ruse Facebook messages to the victim immediately following the shooting asking why he had not arrived for their meeting. When the victim's girlfriend responded to the messages, Ardon told her that the victim had never shown up.

In the days that followed the murder Ardon bragged to acquaintances about the shooting in an effort to improve his standing in the MS-13 hierarchy.

A search warrant was executed on the home of Jose Vasquez Ardon which resulted in authorities locating clothing hidden in the basement ceiling rafters. That clothing was tested for DNA and gunshot residue. Results indicated that DNA on a sweatshirt the defendant was seen wearing on video surveillance was a match to the clothing located in the rafters. Authorities also found the defendant's fingerprints present on the bag containing his clothing.

Ardon was arrested in Revere and Nunez was arrested in Malden on January 30, 2016. Landaverde-Lemus was arrested by Chelsea Police for possession of a loaded firearm Authorities would later on June 26, 2016. He was subsequently charged with murder in connection to this case on September 21, 2016 after authorities allegedly matched his DNA to the DNA found on the clothing recovered in the ceiling rafters.

This charge is an allegation and the defendant is presumed innocent until proven guilty.

Cristian Nunez was found guilty of second-degree murder by a Middlesex Superior Court Jury on June 15, 2018.

This case was investigated by the Middlesex District Attorney's Office, the Everett Police Department, Massachusetts State Police assigned to the Middlesex District Attorney's Office and the State Police Crime Lab DNA Unit.

The prosecutors assigned to this case were Assistant District Attorneys Elizabeth Dunigan, Carrie Spiros and Lindsay Russell. The Victim Witness Advocate was Dora Quiroz.

Everett's Music Education program receives national recognition

The Everett Public Schools has been honored with the Best Communities for Music Education designation from The NAMM Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education.

Now in its 20th year, the Best Communities for Music Education designation is awarded to districts that demonstrate outstanding achievement in efforts to provide music access and education to all students. To qualify for the Best Communities designation, Everett answered detailed questions about funding, graduation requirements, music class participation, instruction time, facilities, support for the music programs, Responses were verified with school officials and reviewed by The Music Research Institute at the University of Kan-

"We have a long and proud tradition of providing exceptional musical opportunities for our students, both in the classroom and through extracurricular pursuits," said Interim Superintendent Janice Gauthier. "This award is a reflection of the hard work and dedication that our students and teachers demonstrate each and every school year."

This award recognizes that Everett is leading the way with learning opportunities as outlined in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). The legislation guides implementation in the states and replaces the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) which was often criticized for an overemphasis on testing-while leaving behind subjects such as music. ESSA recommends music and the arts as important elements of a well-rounded education for all children.

Research into music education continues to demonstrate educational/cognitive and social skill benefits for children who make music. After two years of music education, research found that participants showed more substantial improvements in how the brain

processes speech and reading scores that their less-involved peers and that students who are involved in music are not only more likely to graduate high school, but also to attend college as well. Everyday listening skills are stronger in musically-trained children that in those without music training. Significantly, listening skills are closely tied to the ability to: perceive speech in a noisy background, pay attention, and keep sounds in memory. Later in life, individuals who took music lessons as children show stronger neural processing of sound; young adults and even older adults who have not played an instrument for up to 50 years show enhanced neural processing compared to their peers. Not to mention, social benefits include conflict resolution, teamwork skills, and how to give and receive constructive criticism.

A 2015 study supported by The NAMM Foundation, "Striking A Chord," also outlines the overwhelming desire by teachers and parents for music education opportunities for all children as part of the school curriculum.

The EPS Music Department is in the midst of its busiest time of the year, as several performances and trips are scheduled for the coming weeks and months. The "Percussion Pageantry" is set for Sunday, April 7 at 1 p.m. in the EHS Gymnasium. String Night will be held on Thursday, April 11, the May Day Concert will be on Wednesday, May 1, and the Memorial Day Concert is scheduled for Wednesday, May 22 (all beginning at 6 p.m. inside the EHS Auditorium.)

The EHS Percussion Ensemble is competing in the 2019 Winter Guard International Percussion and Winds World Championships on April 10-14 in Dayton, Ohio. Everett High band members and musicians will also be traveling to Washington, D.C. in May to march in the National Memorial Day Parade and represent Massachusetts for a full weekend of festiv-

Mayor DeMaria has made quality of life for Everett residents a cornerstone for his administration by renovating or reconstructing a majority of parks in the city and expanding green spaces, such as the harborwalk, Rivergreen Park, and the Malden River Walk.

At Sacramone Park the city's Facilities Department replaced the old, rundown stand with state of the art amenities, storage space for youth organizations, tiled bathrooms, and a kitchen that

other cities and towns should be jealous of.

Mayor DeMaria stated, "I want to commend the city's Facilities, Wire, and Planning Departments. This project was done below budget and Village neighborhood park implement this type of work rather than using outside vendors in order to save our taxpayers money. I want to thank all the departments involved for their creative design for

the use of this space." The concession stand renovation project has received the support and praise of other local officials and youth organizations. The DeMaria administration has been able to fund robust renovation projects through cost management strategies. If contracted out, the project would have cost the city nearly \$100,000 more.

Once the budget had been established, the Mayor and the Facilities Maintenance Department continually analyzed the function of materials, systems, processes, and building equipment for the purpose of achieving required functions at the lowest total cost.

As part of a long-term budgetary strategy, the Mayor restructured the Facilities Maintenance Department in 2016, which has saved the City thousands of dollars by completing projects in-house. The city has completed the renovation of the Recreation Center, the temporary Hancock Fire Station, the Connolly Center, and the gazebo at Glenwood Cemetery as well as other projects throughout the city.

The Mayor has lowered expenses by approaching cost savings as a core element at the project's start and effectively implementing it into his administration's culture.

DiDomenico's bill to lift the cap on kids passed

Last week, the Massachusetts Senate reaffirmed its commitment to ending the state's family cap policy by overwhelmingly voting to pass Senator Sal DiDomenico's legislation to lift the Cap on Kids.

The Cap on Kids – also called the "family cap" -- denies benefits to children conceived while, or soon after, a family began receiving benefits. As a result of the Cap on Kids, Massachusetts does not provide benefits for nearly 9,000 children living in poverty. Their parents struggle to provide even the most basic essentials for their children, causing everyone in the family to suffer.

"I am proud that the Senate has once again taken action to put an end to our Commonwealth's ineffective and unjust family cap policy," said Assistant Majority Leader tional benefits, which is why Sal DiDomenico. "Lifting

the 'Cap on Kids' is simply the right thing to do to ensure that families are not denied basic benefits simply because of when their children were born. This is a critical policy change that will help thousands of children across the Commonwealth, and I would like to especially thank Senate President Spilka for continuing to make this a Senate priority and addressing this issue at the very beginning of our session."

Massachusetts' 'Cap on Kids' policy was established in 1995 and has been detrimental to families across the state. In his statement on the Senate floor, Senator DiDomenico passionately disputed certain erroneous assumptions: "To be clear, there was and continues to be no evidence that people have children to receive addiso many states have already

taken action to repeal their family cap policies. For over two decades, the Cap on Kids has done nothing but harm children and make it harder for low income families to meet their basic needs, such as food, housing, and warm clothes.

The new policy passed by the Legislature would start September 1, 2019, and makes the repeal of the family cap retroactive to January 1, 2019. Upon implementation, children who are, or would be, excluded from grant calculations will now be included. The fiscal year 2019 budget already provides funding for this change, which was included in the House and Senate conference committee

This legislation now moves to the Governor's desk for his approval.

Retired Revere Board of Health chief agent, dedicated to Revere civic activities, politics and community involvement

Vincent's funeral will be conducted from the funeral home, on Thursday, April 4 at 9 a.m., followed by a Funeral Mass in St. Mary of the Assumption Church, 670 Washington Ave., Revere at 10 a.m. followed by interment in Puritan Lawn Memorial Park, Peabody.

Born and raised briefly in South Boston, the family migrated to Toscano Avenue, Revere. Little did Vincent realize that he was home for more Knights of Columbus #179 than 70 years of the rest of his for over 40 years. His family long and full life within the emerging City of Revere.

He graduated from Revere High School in 1942 and, in February of 1944, joined the U.S. Navy during World War II. He served with honor and dignity (The hallmark of his life) on board the U.S.S. The late Anna Flynn, Secretary to the Board, of happy remembrance, would often tell of the perfect patience that Vincent would execute in the resolution of the daily drama and problems. His time as a senior code enforcement inspector for the Revere Board of Health spanned over

His life was dedicated to civic activities, politics and community involvement. He served as a member of the Revere Park Commission and was on the fund-raising committee for the former Revere Hospital. His life included a



term as a Revere School Committeeman from 1960 to 1963. He served a 15-year term with the Revere Conservation Committee, retiring two years ago at the age of 93. Vincent gave to the city of Revere, a 45-year span of service and unparalleled dedication in the field of political and community service.

He was also a very active member of St. Mary's Holy Name Society. He maintained a membership as the senior member of the Revere were among the founders and builders of the first St. Mary's, which was then called St. Lucy's Church. Through the expertise and comradery, with his cousin, Vincent "Sonny" Cammarata, they were able to establish a committee to create and organize the new St. Lucy's Chapel.

Again, the Cammarata family was instrumental in the establishment of the Pietrapezzia Lodge OSIA, Lodge 491. Pietrapezzia is a village located off the coast of Italy on the island of Sicily from where the Cammarata family immigrated to America.

School Committee will use search firm for superintendent

The Everett School Committee voted 9-0 on Monday night to procure the services of the Massachusetts Association of School Committees (MASC) to conduct a full superintendent search for them this year.

The Committee held a meeting last Monday, March 25, to discuss the idea of what to do about the superintendent search, which has been slow to get going. MASC gave a presentation on March 25 and answered questions, including that they could give technical assistance, partially run the process or fully run the pro-

Committeeman Frank Parker said on Monday his subcommittee recommended the MASC conduct a full search.

"My recommendation is we need them to lead a full superintendent search," he said.

Assistant Supt. Charlie Obremski was tasked with reaching out to the MASC and the procurement to get a price and prepare a purchase order for the services.

School Committeeman David Ela said it has been suggested that a search isn't necessary and the Committee isn't doing what's best for the City

He said that couldn't be further from the case.

"The School Committee will be giving up nothing, but we want to make the best decision for our students, staff and community," he said. "No matter what happens in November, we will have the school system in a better place. Whatever happens down the road, we will be sure to do the right thing for this district. I have full confidence in all of the members of this Committee."
