Man arrested in connection with fatal shooting in Everett

A New Hampshire man has been arrested and charged with the murder of a 42-year-old Everett man who was coming out of the Karma Lounge on Ferry Street early Saturday morn-

The Middlesex District Attorney's Office and Everett Police confirmed Sunday that an arrest has been made in connection with the fatal shooting.

Police arrested Charles Demos, 29 of Rochester, New Hampshire, in Seabrook, New Hampshire in connection with fatally shooting Jarrod Harris, 42, of Everett, shortly after 1 a.m. outside Karma Lounge.

License Board Chair Phil Antonelli said the Board plans to meet on Monday, Sept. 30, and will have a public hearing regarding Karma. The Lounge has come before the Board numerous times before and since opening last October. They have been cited for promoting DJ parties, having table bottle service, fights on premise, and police activity in front of the premises.

Wonderful Walk: After loss, friends and community heal, help with Walk For Ersilia

If everyone had their way, there would be no Walk For Ersilia this coming Saturday, Sept. 28.

In fact, in a perfect world, Ersilia Cataldo Matarazzo would be side by side with her friends from Everett and the Kiwanis Club raising money, serving others and celebrating a great fall Homecoming weekend.

But life is often not perfect, and in the wake of her murder earlier this year in what was a domestic violence incident, her fellow Kiwanians and legions of friends are doing what they believe Ersilia would have wanted – to help others less fortunate and serve the children of the community.

Marlene Zizza, treasurer of the Everett Kiwanis, said the walk was something that came organically out of the tragedy and loss that all were feeling after losing Ersilia so suddenly. Having been the vice president at the time, Ersilia was the most devoted member of the club – mostly due to the fact that its mission was to help children and lift them

Civil Rights group encourages City to de-construct citywide voting

A group of Civil Rights lawyers are encouraging the City and the Council, on behalf of local Everett groups, to eliminate citywide voting for district Council and School Committee seats. Lawyers for Civil Rights

Boston (LCR) sent a letter to the City on Sept. 24 encouraging it to take action on a recent proposal by the Council to get rid of the practice, which was instituted a few years back under the new City Charter. At the Sept. 16 Council meeting, several councilors signed on to the proposed change, and LCR said they hope the City acts voluntarily because they said it is a well-documented Voting Rights violation in that it dilutes the vote of commu-

nities of color.

"Obviously, it behooves the Cities to move voluntarily before they are involved in a federal Voting Rights lawsuit," said Oren Sellstrom, litigation director for LCR. "It is something where we always encourage public entities to act voluntarily...However, if this is something the City will delay or not want to change, that's what federal courts exist for."

Any changes would not have any impact on the upcoming City Election on Nov. 5, but would be in place after a lengthy City Charter change process.

LCR has just recently concluded a long and protracted case with the City of Lowell about their voting system, which was much

T-Mobile seeks permission to install cell antennas in Everett

At the City Council meeting on Monday, Sept. 23, Rosana Ferrante from ExteNet Systems responded to questions about the company's petition to install small-cell antennas on 10 utility poles along five city streets with the goal of expanding T-Mobile network connectivity.

The exact locations of the proposed sites are 431, 573 and 642 Broadway; 141 Chelsea St.; 45, 180, 275 and 493 Ferry St.; 301 Main St. and 132 Union St.. The initial 10 sites are part of a larger vision that would include 41 sites throughout the city. The installations would only benefit customers of the T-Mobile cellular network.

Headquartered in Illinois, ExteNet provides communications infrastructure to major cell providers in order to help them meet the increasing wireless connectivity needs of their

customers. Small cells consist of radio equipment and antennas that are attached to utility poles and streetlights and are used to transmit data to and from wireless devices. Unlike the cell towers found on rooftops and along highways, small cells are installed every few

"Instead of going bigger, it's getting smaller and closer to the customer," said Ferrante.

According to the Cellular Telecommunications Industry Association, small cell technology is expected to explode in coming years, from 13,000 units in 2017 to 800,000 by 2026. This year alone saw a 550 percent increase in small cell installations, which are regulated by the Federal Communications Commission

(FCC). With a copy of the petition in hand, Councilors expressed concern on a

the same as Everett's in that it was a city-wide vote. After many years of costly legal fighting, Lowell was compelled by the courts to change their system in May 2019.

That case, Sellstrom said, drew the attention of activists in Everett – who noted that the same thing was in place here. After looking at it, LCR decided to make their intentions known this week – compelling the City to act voluntarily before any Voting Rights lawsuit is considered.

The basis of such cases revolves around the notion that a citywide vote dilutes the vote of communities of color - not allowing residents of a district more heavily populated by people of color to be elected. This, they said, can lead to issues in communities of color to be ignored or misunderstood. LCR said they believe there is strong evidence this is happening in

"There is strong evidence this is what is occurring in Everett," read the letter. "The City is extremely diverse – and becoming more so with each successive year. Recent Census figures show that communities of color account for over 40 percent of the population...By contrast, the City's elected bodies do not remotely reflect this diversity. Of the hundreds of officials elected to the City Council and School Committee, only a miniscule number have been persons of color."

The letter stated that Census figures show 23 percent of the population is Latino, and 19 percent is black. In the Everett Public Schools, approximately 75 percent are of color - with 54 percent Latino. The letter stated that of 650 elected officials in the City's history, only four have been people of color.

LCR alleged that voting patterns in Everett show that were candidates of color allowed to run in wards or districts as opposed to citywide, such candidates would win election in Ev-

"This in turn would enhance diversity on Everett's elected bodies and help ensure an accountability and responsiveness to Everett's communities of color that is currently lacking," the letter stated.

Sellstrom said that citywide voting allows candidates in a district to win the vote of their neighbors, but lose due to a larger voting block outside the neighborhood.

"It has the potential to dilute communities of color," he said. "If there is a majority voting block outside the district that can overwhelm the vote of those in the district, they can win 100 percent of the seats in 100 percent of the elections.'

LCR said the letter was to encourage the City to move forward with the recent proposal to dismantle the citywide voting, but they are prepared to act if need be.

"A true, ward-based system would eliminate the vote dilution problem inherent in Everett's current electoral system," read the letter. "Over time, a more fair and equitable system would be expected to increase the diversity of Everett's elected bodies and the responsiveness of these bodies to the City's communities of color, thereby strengthening the City as a

number of fronts, including appearance, potential health risks, precedent, and benefit to Everett residents.

Councilors Fred Capone and Wayne Matewsky requested to see one of the cells in person before vot-

"There are things the size of refrigerators on top of poles on Elm Street and Abbott Avenue," said Councilor Matewsky. "I wouldn't want this in front of my house."

He also mentioned he was concerned about potential radiation coming from the small cells.

"I want to know what the health hazards are," he said. "I don't need [radiation] affecting my health." Ferrante explained that

ExteNet complies with the emissions regulations set by the FCC. "It's important that the

public know that this is a low radiation threat," she said. But Councilor Rosa Di-

Florio was still wary.

"How much radiation is really coming out?" she

asked. "Because I think that a little bit here and there adds up to a lot."

The councilwoman also worried that saying yes to T-Mobile would set a precedent for other wireless behemoths like AT&T, Sprint and Verizon to descend on the city asking for installa-

"They're all going to be coming in," she said.

The city of Palo Alto, California, is all too familiar with this scenario. It was recently forced to overhaul its cell antenna rules after being flooded with applications from wireless companies seeking to install cell antennas throughout the

Councilor DiFlorio argued that this was not a decision to be taken lightly and that she wanted Council to have the chance to research how other cities have approached the issue before taking action.

"We don't want slow phones," she said. "But we have to do a study and see what other cities are do-

Councilor Peter Napolitano requested that ExteNet provide data on the number of T-Mobile customers in

"It's important to know how many of our residents would actually benefit from this," he said.

ExteNet originally applied for approval for the small cell installations in Everett on August 29. FCC guidelines stipulate that the project must be approved within 60 days from application. Ferrante said the company is willing to cooperate with the City in order to reach the deadline.

Council ultimately decided that the petition warranted closer examination before bringing the matter to a vote. The petition was moved to the next meeting of the Committee of the Whole where the Council will thoroughly review all 41 proposed sites. Representatives from ExteNet as well as the City's Legal Department will also be invited to that meeting.






Matewsky tops the ticket in at-large, Lavecchio eliminated

Wayne Councilor Matewsky retained his ticket-topping ways in Tuesday's (Sept. 17) Preliminary Election, taking the top spot by more than 30 votes, while candidate James Lavecchio was the lone candidate eliminated from the 11-person field.

Ten candidates in the atlarge race now move on to the November City Election where they will compete for five seats.

Matewsky was very active on the campaign trail all day on Tuesday, appearing in several prominent areas and giving away trinkets as he visited with each and every voter coming by in Everett Square Tuesday morning.

It paid off as he collected 1,013 votes in the Preliminary, just ahead of Councilor John Hanlon, who scored 977 votes.

"It was a good night and I did well in every neighborhood in Everett," said Matewsky this week. "Voters came out to support me on Preliminary Day and I hope they come out again on Nov. 5. I'm going to continue to run a positive campaign. There is a reason people vote for me. I actually return phone calls and do business at City Hall for the neighborhoods. I work hard to earn the vote of all of our residents year-round, and not just on Election

Day." In essence, the incumbents ran the show in the field on Sept. 17, except for Councilor Peter Napolitano, who finished outside of the top five due to a surge by Candidate Gerly Adrien, who came in fifth.

In early results, Adrien

was faring very well and was at the top of the pack at one point, but after the full results were in, Adrien took fifth place overall.

The hookah lounge is licensed for tobacco sales and also has a full liquor license.

The preliminary investigation suggests that Jarrod Harris was leaving Karma Lounge with a female that is known to him shortly after 1 a.m. when a physical altercation occurred involving the couple, Charles Demos and several other individuals. During the altercation, Demos allegedly went to a vehicle that was parked nearby and obtained a firearm. Demos allegedly pursued Harris, firing the gun multiple times and striking Harris twice. Good Samaritans on scene attempted to intervene before the shooting and also to render first aid.

The victim was subsequently transported to Massachusetts General Hospital where he was pronounced

Demos allegedly fled the scene in a vehicle later identified by police as a Volkswagen Passat registered to an individual in New Hampshire known to Demos. Police subsequently identified Demos as the alleged shooter and obtained a warrant for his

arrest on the charges of murder and unlawful possession of a firearm.

On Sunday afternoon, Demos was located at a Seabrook, New Hampshire, home and arrested on a fugitive from justice charge by the Massachusetts State Police Violent Fugitive Apprehension Section with the assistance of the United States Marshal's Service and Seabrook Police, Police also arrested the resident of the home, Joshua Demos, 35, on a federal probation violation unrelated to this

Charles Demos will be arraigned at a later date, not yet scheduled, in Malden District Court on the outstanding charges related to the Massachusetts warrant. Joshua Demos was expected to be arraigned this week in Federal Court in Con-

cord, New Hampshire.

This is an ongoing investigation being conducted by the Middlesex District Attorney's Office, Massachusetts State Police and Everett Police. The prosecutors assigned to this case are Elizabeth Dunigan and Graham Van Epps.

Brockton comes to Everett for the annual Homecoming game on Saturday. Brockton, which is the largest high school in Massachusetts with close to 4,300 students, can best be described as the "Everett of the 1970s." The Boxers were the No. 1 football program in Massachusetts for a few years before Everett soared to the top, a perch it has now held for more than

three decades.

With victories Xaverian and St. John's, Everett is ranked No. 5 in the Herald's Sweet 16 and No. 7 in the Boston Globe's Top 20. Catholic Memorial, led

by former Everett coach John DiBiaso, is No. 1 in the polls. By the way, congratulations to Coach DiBiaso for the 316th victory of his career, tying former Brockton Coach Armond Colombo's mark. Mr. Colombo's son, Peter, is the current Brockton head coach.

Senior Abraham Betancourth had two PATs in the win over St. John's and is making excellent progress as the Tide's placekicker.

LET'S KEEP IN MIND THE **FACTS ABOUT HEALTH CARE COSTS IN** THIS COUNTRY

The issue of national health care is now front and center in the debate among the presidential candidates of both parties, with each offering their vision of what should be done about this important issue.

Some favor a repeal of Obamacare, some wish to improve upon it, and still others want to implement a "Medicare for all" system.

However, regardless of where one stands on the issue, it is important to keep in mind some basic facts about the costs of the present health care system in this country.

The United States presently spends far more on health care than any other nation in the world. Our health care costs amount to a whopping 17 percent of our gross national product, compared to 10 percent for countries in Europe and elsewhere that offer national health insurance. Ironically however, despite our huge expenditures, we rate near the bottom among developed nations in every category of measures of national health.

Moreover, gaps in our present health insurance system either leave many uncovered or underinsured. As a result, millions of Americans go bankrupt or become impoverished every year when faced with a catastrophic illness because they lack adequate health insurance.

Job mobility, which is a significant factor in the ability of employees to improve their financial circumstances, is hindered because of the lack of a uniform national health insurance system. The fear of losing their existing health insurance prevents millions of Americans from either taking a new job or starting their own business. Study after study has shown that our economy is being weighed down by the burden of a health insurance system that is inefficient and inflexible.

The costs of a Medicare-for-all system frequently are cited by those opposed to a national health insurance plan, but that is only one side of the equation.

The profits of the health insurance industry, about \$20 billion annually, are cited by proponents of Medicare-forall, but think about this figure: The gross revenues of the health insurance industry are about \$500 billion. In other words, a half a trillion dollars is being spent annually in our health care system for a product that contributes nothing to anybody's health or well-being, other than increasing the wealth of the shareholders of the health insurance industry.

In short, Medicare-for-all in nations throughout the world is both more cost-efficient and produces better overall health outcomes for the citizens of those countries compared to the U.S.

When the various candidates discuss their solutions to the health-care crisis in our country, every voter should keep those two facts uppermost in mind.







Musician Sarah Ikerd was just looking for a secluded place to make some noise, but what she found was the outstretched arms of the Everett community.

Ikerd has quickly become the newest hope in the city to create a vibrant and cool arts forum in what many believe may one day become a Cultural District in the city – that being the Norman Street and Air Force Road corridor.

After only a few weeks in the space – which is next to Revolution Axe Throwing – she has already been encouraged to have one open mic event last weekend and to plan for more community events in the



Shangri-La Studios on Norman Street has taken shape quickly as a potential place for the arts to come together in Everett. Sarah Ikerd originally took the space for a music studio, but soon realized how much the local arts community wanted to coalesce around her efforts.

"Initially when I came here, I was looking for a place to make noise and set up a music studio...write music and have people come in now and then," she said. "It's definitely now turning into something ful-

filling and a venue for the arts I love so I'm not just in a bubble, but part of a larger arts community.'

Ikerd is a rock musician with a background in Classical music, and she had been searching the Boston area for studio space. Interestingly, she came across the Everett industrial/commercial space on Craig's

When she first visited it, she looked around at the raw industrial area flanked by a large Peanut Butter plant, a noxious galvanizing plant, several container storage yards and a large electrical substation.

It wasn't so inspiring, but then she also saw the breweries, SkyZone, Revolution Axe, a couple of restaurants and several other exciting amenities. Then she heard of VillageFest and the City's desire for the future of the area to be an arts district.

"It's all very fresh, but as soon as I started getting out there on the Everett scene,

I realized how much of a desire there is for a place to put something together that did have a combination of music, art and activities. It can be a cool community arts venue, albeit a small one... I didn't fully realize until I started talking to people how much people want to have the arts gain more and more of a presence in the city.'

Ikerd said, in actuality, it is what she wanted her space to be, but she didn't realize it could come to bear in Everett - particularly in Everett's industrial area.

"It's kind of what I really wanted to get the space for, so what I intended originally is kind of morphing into something more quickly," she said. "The area is still pretty rough in an industrial area, but it's coming along. I can think of a couple different areas, and this place is precisely how those arts districts started. There is a lot of potential here."

Ikerd said she has been working closely with the City's Maria Josefson, as well as the Cultural Council and its chair, Karyn Alzayer. There are already ideas for a pop-up art show highlighting local and regional artists in the space.

One thing that is certain is the name - Shangri-La Studios.

"It is worth noting the studio name comes from the book Lost Horizon by James Hilman - Shangri-La being like a personal timeless paradise and a state of mind," she said.

Gold Star Pavilion to be unveiled at Glenwood, with families honored

Sunday is looking to be a day to celebrate and remember those families who lost loved ones while serving the country in the midst of combat - otherwise known as Gold Star Families.

The occasion will be marked by the unveiling of the colossal rehabilitation of the Gold Star Pavilion at Glenwood Cemetery.

Veterans Commissioner Jeanne Cristiano noted that the Pavilion had fallen into disrepair, and the City's

Facilities Maintenance Department went to work on restoring the treasured and sacred Pavilion.

And that work will be celebrated with honors on

"The Pavilion needed to be reconstructed and rededicated," she said. "We reconstructed it and we thought there was no better time to celebrate this than on Gold Star Mothers and Families Day, Sept. 29... They have reconstructed it and restored it to what it originally looked like. They treated it like an historical

monument. The beauty of this is we didn't contract this out. We had our Facilities team do the work. It's very special." Cristiano said as part of

the celebration, they will award the Medal of Liberty to three Everett families who lost loved ones in Korea and Vietnam. "We've been blessed,"

she said. "We haven't had any casualties in combat since Vietnam."

However, those from that era are to be recognized on Sunday, she said. They include:

•Sgt. David Kuhns was a graduate of Everett High that was killed in action during Vietnam.

 Marine Lance Corporal James Taurisano will also be honored. Interestingly, his step-brother Richard Stratton went to Vietnam with him under the Buddy System program. While Taurisano was killed in action, Stratton returned home to Everett. Accepting the Medal of Liberty will be Richard Stratton.

 Sgt. Joe Riley was originally from Charlestown, but his brother George Ri-

ley has lived in Everett for 60 years. Sgt. Riley went Missing in Action during the Korean Conflict, and eventually was declared Killed In Action.

On hand to present the Medals of Liberty will be Ret. Brigadier General Paul Landry and Lt. Col. Dana Sanders-Udo from the Massachusetts National Guard.

Cristiano said she hopes that by starting this tradition, they might be able to find other veterans and their families who are eligible for the Medal of Liberty - which has very strict criteria.

"What we want to start doing is if we can draw attention to this event, we hope we can find more Everett families that qualify and this can be something we do every Memorial Day," she said. "It's hard to find them and it's a very strict criteria, but we're going to try."

Following the ceremony at 1 p.m. in Glenwood Cemetery, there will be a collation at the Crimson Tide Café in the High School.

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Down the Road owner passes away, leaves popular brewery in the lurch

The Everett License Commission met on Monday night, Sept. 16, for a lively agenda that included sorting out the details after the unfortunate and untimely passing of Down the Road Brewery Founder Donovan Bailey.

Bailey, 46, passed away on July 31 of a heart attack very suddenly, leaving everyone at the popular and growing brewery on Bow Street in shock. Since early August, the brewery and tap room have been closed down, and the remaining owners are trying to figure out what to do.

Chair Phil Antonelli said the brewery is trying to straighten out its financial

situation, and is trying to find other brewers to come in and help them out. Bailey was their founder and brewmaster, and with him suddenly gone, the company is having trouble producing new product. In particular, they have reached out to Lord Hobo and Night Shift, but have nothing in place as of yet.

The brewery had invested about one year ago in a substantial expansion of their production capacity and their beer has become widely distributed in stores and even at the Encore casino craft beer pub.

The company is believed to be carrying a substantial amount of debt from their expansion.

to re-opening for the brewery during the meeting, and the Board agreed to hold their license until they can get things ironed out.

Bailey hailed from Newton, and had moved to Malden in the last few years to be closer to the brewery.

He told the Independent in 2016 when he had first come to Everett that he considered himself "lucky" to have found a space in an area that was up-and-coming in the world of brewing and distilling. Over the last three years, the brewery had certainly come into its own with a new tap room, wide distribution and a major expansion in production

•In an unusual move for There was no clear path Everett, the Everett Package Store in Glendale Square is looking to go out of business, and they are hoping to sell their liquor license to Regina Food Store on Main Street. Regina would then, in turn, sell their beer and wine license to Sammy's Variety on Main Street.

Such things are rather common in Boston, but in Everett, selling licenses hasn't been standard operating procedure.

The City and the Board are looking at it carefully, but there has been some skepticism about starting the practice. That said, no decisions have yet been made and the matter will be before the Board at a future meeting.



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

the last few minutes of the game. With about five minutes left, Everett scored to take the lead. Then a penalty kick in the last seconds by A-B resulted in a goal as well.



NEW INCENTIVE FOR PASSENGERS WHO TAKE WATER TRANSPORTATION TO LOGAN **AIRPORT**

Passengers who take water transportation to Boston Logan International Airport will now get priority access at the airport security line. This new incentive is part of Massport's commitment to encourage more passengers to use High Occupancy Vehicles (HOVs) to the airport and reduce congestion.

Under the plan announced during the Massport Board of Directors' monthly meeting, passengers who take the MBTA ferry or water taxi service to the Logan Airport Boat Dock will be given a "Ticket to Skip" pass when they board a free Logan Airport shuttle to the terminals. The orange ticket must be presented to the security checkpoint staff in order to get preferred lane access and move ahead of the line. The MBTA ferry and the water taxis run year round and serve the Boston waterfront as well as Hingham and Hull.

This new incentive program builds on the success of the Back Bay Logan Express (LEX), which was the first HOV service to provide the airport security priority access to passengers. Since the passenger perk began on May 1st, total ridership of Back

Bay LEX has more than doubled to nearly 98,000, from over 45,000 during the same 4-month period last year. The fee was also reduced and a ride from Back Bay to Logan is now \$3, and FREE from Logan to Back Bay.

Logan Express offers four suburban locations in Framingham, Braintree, Woburn, and Peabody. By next year, LEX service will also be available for commuters at North Station with connections to the MBTA's Green and Orange lines, and the Commuter Rail. Other LEX locations are also being considered. Massport's goal is to double HOV ridership to 4 million annually.

Treasurer Goldberg announces 'Operation Safe Campus' program Last weekend, the Althrough false identification In 2018, ABCC pro-

coholic Beverage Control Commission (ABCC), under the direction of state Treasurer Deb Goldberg, will implement Operation Safe Campus. The program objective is to proactively prevent tragedies by keeping alcoholic beverages out of the hands of underage students on and around college campuses throughout Massachusetts. "Stepped-up monitoring

and enforcement can save lives and prevent tragedies before they happen,' said Massachusetts State Treasurer and Receiver General Deborah B. Goldberg, who oversees the ABCC. "Operation Safe Campus takes immediate and effective steps that result in the direct prevention of underage drinking and acts as a long-term deterrent to bar and package store owners serving and selling to minors."

The initiative primarily consists of enforcement in the parking lots and surrounding streets of specific liquor stores and in bars that have historically had a serious problem with underage individuals purchasing alcoholic beverages or through adults procuring alcoholic beverages for

The program focuses on front-line prevention, with investigators often calling a teen's parents when violations occur. ABCC officials say that most parents are unaware that their children are involved in the use of alcohol, and that the intervention is a powerful tool toward family involvement in addressing the problem of underage drinking.

"We want to draw attention and make people aware that underage drinking can have devastating consequences on them and the individuals they love," said Goldberg. "By increasing awareness, we are educating college students and their families as well as proactively targeting specific events and time periods throughout the year in order to prevent these situations."

The bars and liquor stores that are charged will be summoned for a hearing before the ABCC; if found to have violated the law, the bar's liquor license could be subject to suspension, modification or revocation.

In front of a standing room only crowd at the East Boston Social Centers, U.S. Congressman Joseph P. Kennedy III announce his candidacy for the U.S. Senate taking on incumbent U.S. Senator Ed Markey.

After touching on the Kennedy Family's roots in East Boston--his greatgreat-grandfather Patrick Kennedy immigrated from Ireland to Eastie in the mid-1800s--Kennedy laid out his vision for his U.S. Senate run.

"I know that, like my family, there are millions of others that are here, that believe in that chance," said Kennedy. "That strive for that moment to provide for their families, and build a better future for the place that they call home. And I know that through fate, but often times through choices made by this country, by our government, that those barriers have been erected, not taken down. That far too many dreams have been blocked or deferred, rather than realized."

Kennedy said he runs to tear down a system that has marginalized millions of people in the U.S.

"I know that for the first time in modern American history, we have a President that is actively trying to make that harder. We have a Senate that instead of trying to harness the opportunity and potential of every person in this country, they're trying to pull us back," he said. "And I'm running for








Congressman Joseph P. Kennedy III greets supporters as he announces his Senate candidacy last Saturday.
