Final Council meeting of 2019 sees three members leave office

On Monday, Dec. 23, the Everett City Council held its final meeting of the year, where it said goodbye to three councilors and re-enrolled the short-term rental zoning ordinance, among other decisions.

Citations

This was the last meeting with Council President Richard J. Dell Isola, Jr., and Councilors John Leo McKinnon and Stephen Simonelli. The councilmen were honored by Sen. Sal DiDomenico, Mayor Carlo DeMaria and fellow council members for their individu-

Former Encore president lands job overseeing **New York** casinos

Former Encore Boston Harbor President Bob De-Salvio has landed on his feet in New York, being appointed last week as the president of casinos in New York City and the Catskills.

Genting Group nounced this month they had hired DeSalvio to oversee the existing Resort World New York City and Resort World Catskills resort casinos. Resort World New York City is the only casino in New York City, and is the highest grossing slot casino in the world.

"It's an honor to join Genting, which has proven, with the success of Resorts World Casino New York City, that gaming in New York is full of untapped potential, and I am excited to be on the frontlines of the action," DeSalvio said in a press release from Genting.

Councilors, Mayor clash over Pope John High site purchase

At the last Council meeting of 2019, Mayor Carlo DeMaria asked Council to vote on the purchase of the former Pope John Paul XXII High School property.

When councilors pushed back, the mayor dug in his The result has been a

furthering rift between the two bodies, in particular the mayor and three councilors.

Council was asked on Dec. 23 to vote on two measures regarding the property purchase: approve the City's request to borrow \$10.5 million for the property, and approve its request to acquire it through a friendly eminent domain taking from the Archdiocese of Boston.

Mayor DeMaria had appeared before council in October to lay out his plan to transform the 2.5-acre site at 888 Broadway into an affordable housing development for seniors and veterans, with 75 percent of units dedicated to Everett

residents. Councilors expressed strong support for the mayor's vision at the

However, Councilor Fred Capone asked that the vote be postponed until the first meeting of the new year, saying that he wanted more time to explore potentially using the site as a new school.

"We have a serious need for schools," he said. "Our school system is busting at the seams."

Councilor Michael Marchese agreed, citing overcrowding at the Webster School.

"We should have more time on this," he stated.

Councilor Capone also expressed that the new council should be involved in a purchase of such magnitude, especially as the site is located in the ward of incoming Councilor-elect Jimmy Tri Le.

"This is going to commit this community for a very long time," he said. "Those



"Bob DeSalvio has a proven track record creating and implementing successful marketing and growth strategies in the gaming and hospitality industries," said Tan Sri KT Lim, CEO of Genting. "Bob's operational expertise combined with his unique ability to recognize industry trends and adapt to fast-evolving consumer demands will help accelerate growth at Resorts World Catskills and Resorts World Casino New York City."

In a sudden move last fall, after years of guiding the Encore casino project from licensing to permitting to opening, DeSalvio was suddenly replaced by long-time Wynn employee Brian Guilbrants.

DeSalvio had been the face of the project in Massachusetts, and had built a great deal of community capital for the project in the surrounding neighborhoods over the years. Many locally were surprised and disappointed by the move, but DeSalvio moved on agreeably, and has now landed atop another growing gaming company.


Resort World NYC is developing a 400-room hotel next to its casino that will open in the summer of 2020. Aside from that, the company is developing a \$4.3 billion casino project in Las Vegas that is to open in 2021. It is the largest development money-wise in the history of Las Vegas.



Resorts World Casino New York City offers over 6,000 slots and electronic table games to 10 million guests annually. The property features three unique levels of gaming, Times Square Casino, Fifth Avenue Casino and Central Park Casino, along with several high-limit rooms tor Platinum and Black Card members. Since opening in 2011, RWNY has paid \$2.88 billion in taxes to support New York State public schools.

Resort World Casinos was acquired in November by Genting and Kien Huat, the family trust controlled by Genting Group Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Tan Sri KT Lim.

Northeast Metro Tech recognizes Adams Scholarship recipients

Superintendent David DiBarri and Principal/Deputy-Director Carla Scuzzarella are pleased to announce that 82 seniors at Northeast Metro Tech High School are among seniors statewide to receive a John and Abigail Adams Scholarship.

This scholarship is available to students whose MCAS performance puts them in the top 25 percent

of their district. To be eligible, students must either score Advanced on the English, Math and Science exams, or Advanced on one exam and High Proficient on the other two.

"We continue to have a high number of our students qualify for the Adams Scholarship, and the Class of 2020 is no exception," Principal/Deputy-Director Scuzzarella said. "We are extremely proud of our seniors and the example they have set for our younger students."

Recipients of the Adams Scholarship are granted four years of free tuition at Massachusetts state colleges and universities. Students who receive the Adams scholarship must complete their college program in four years or less and maintain a cumulative 3.0 grade point average.

new [council] members who have been elected by the people should have an opportunity to weigh in on it."

Councilor Michael Mc-Laughlin added that he wanted written proof that the acquisition was actually a friendly eminent domain taking as the mayor claimed. Friendly eminent domain applies to situations where the property owners are ready to sell at a negotiated price and can expedite the negotiation of the sale terms.

"I will not be bullied [into a vote]," said the councilor. "I'm not afraid to take a hard line."

Mayor DeMaria at-

tempted to address the councilors' concerns, saying that some schools actually have surplus space for expansion and adding more classrooms.

"We are spending plenty of money educating children," he said. "It's time we spend tax dollars on the people who built this community - our veterans and our seniors."

Regarding the friendly acquisition, Mayor De-Maria said that there was no written agreement and that negotiations had taken place in person between himself and the head of real estate for the archdiocese.

The mayor engaged in a brief, heated argument with

Councilor McLaughlin at that point.

"What do we lose by holding this over for another two weeks?" the councilor asked.

"Progress," the mayor responded. "Two weeks, four weeks, six weeks; it's the same thing you did to my administration over the Food Policy Council."

Mayor DeMaria added that if the Council moved to postpone the vote, he would not bring the matter before them again.

"If you want to push this down the road to the next council, all you're doing is wasting people's time," he said. "I want the vote tonight."

Ultimately, the mayor compelled Council to vote on the measures, both of which passed by 8 to 3, with Councilors Capone, Marchese and McLaughlin voting in opposition.

Following the meeting, Mayor DeMaria wrote a Facebook post where he celebrated his victory, adding that Councilors Capone, Marchese and McLaughlin had "turned their backs on veterans" by voting against the acquisition.

The new council will convene in 2020 when incoming councilors stand to inherit what observers believe will be a contentious and controversial community landmark.

al contributions to the city.

McKinnon announced his retirement earlier this year and Dell Isola, Jr. and Simonelli were narrowly defeated by political newcomers in the November election. Taking their place in 2020 will be the newly elected Gerly Adrien, Stephanie Martins and Jimmy Tri Le.

•Short-term rental zoning ordinance

Council voted to re-enroll the changes to the short-term rental zoning ordinance. It remains to be seen if it will be ordained in the new year with the new council, or if it will need to be scrapped entirely and built from scratch per Council rules. In the latter case, short-term rental legislation will essentially be unenforceable in the

city for a minimum of two months.

In a shocking turn of events at the previous Council meeting on Dec. 9, Councilor John Hanlon's single "no" vote on amending the Zoning Ordinance quashed the yearlong progress made on short-term rental legislation in Everett. The councilor never returned a request for comment from The Independent regarding his decision.

•Encore tax revenue

Council failed to override the mayor's veto of a measure proposed by Councilor Michael Marchese that would direct the City to put 75 percent of all Encore Boston Harbor revenue into tax reduction for Everett residents.

•Small cell antennas

ExteNet made another appearance before Council where it received permission to install small cell technology along publicly owned streets for the benefit of T-Mobile customers. In 2020, Verizon will be making a petition of its own to install small cell antennas to benefit its own customers. The City continues to refine its small cell antenna ordinance, a revised version of which was ordained at Monday's meeting.

•Appointments

Council approved the appointment of several individuals to the Library Board of Trustees, including Janet Colameta, Victoria Scaramuzzo, Marlene Zizza, Mark Correia and James LaVecchio. It also appointed Anthony Me-

Malden Catholic High School invests in newly expanded arts program

Over the years, Malden Catholic has been known for academic rigor and scholarly pursuits, but with the addition of the Girls Division in 2018, the school now boasts of a newly expanded, multi-faceted arts program.



The New Year's Noise Diet: Why you should cut the empty 'brain calories' in 2020

If you're like most of us, you overindulged a bit too much in 2019. No, not on calories (well, maybe those too!), but on "noise." That's the name for the dizzying onslaught of information from work emails, app notifications, the 24/7 news cycle, social media updates, and other forms of screen time that leaves us unable to focus, listen, or do deep work.

A smidgen of noise now and again is okay. (We all have our guilty pleasures!) But consuming it mindlessly, all day long, is as bad as keeping a bag of chips, a monster-size soda, and a can of frosting at our desk and reaching for them every few minutes.

Too many empty brain calories won't make you fat but they will make you mentally anemic. Noise keeps you in a constant state of distraction. And like actual junk food, a high-noise digital diet is addictive, yet it never satis-

fies or nourishes you. The real problem with giving into noise temptation isn't what you're doing; it's what you're not doing. You're tuning out what really matters. You're skimming the surface. tion. A few suggestions: Try going a week without social media. (We promise, you'll survive.) A short detox from social

media is a pretty painless way to unplug and reclaim a lot of lost time. When the week is over, you can see if you even want to go back to occasional scrolling.

Reduce temptation by "hiding" distracting devices from yourself. Okay, you probably can't hide your computer but you can shut the office door. As for cell phones and tablets, treat them like what they are: gateways to digital distraction (and it is a very slippery slope). 





Thousands were hired between February and May, with most reporting for their first day of work in early June. The excitement continued to build as the Encore Runner shuttles started to appear on the streets of Everett, followed by Encore buses coming and going from the Malden Center and Wellington T stops. With the once-industrial wasteland now the well-landscaped front of the resort, the transformation of Lower Broadway forever began to set in during the early parts of June.

On June 23, with Encore luxury vachts bringing visitors to the front door by water, and shuttles bringing visitors to the resort from public transportation – dignitaries from the City, state and Wynn Resorts were on hand to welcome everyone inside. As an honor, the first members of the general public coming in were the dedicated supporters from Everett United. The doors opened as unique day-light fireworks exploded overhead in the cobalt blue sky, and 'Nothing But the Best' by Frank Sinatra played over the outdoor loudspeak-

Encore Post-Opening - If the build-up and opening of the casino was the biggest story of the year, a close second was the casino after its opening. While many - for years - predicted monstrous traffic jams daily at all hours caused by the casino, that just never appeared. After hundreds of hours of preparing for the worst, the worst never came. Still, traffic is very light at the resort in most hours - aside from a few busy periods. It was the surprise of all surprises for most. That surprise was followed up by the soft performance of the resort's restaurants, hotel and retail offerings - which were expected to set a new standard for performance and quality in Greater Boston. While the casino portion of the resort has performed ahead of many other casinos around the United States, the hotel and restaurants – in particular – still seem to struggle to attract guests consistently. A new, surprise change in the leadership team last fall came without great notice, putting out long-time President Bob DeSalvio.

That change is still unfolding, and it's clear the resort is still testing the waters on how to brand and become Boston's resort of choice. On the plus side, though, Encore quickly became a destination for boxing events, unique celebrity concerts and worldclass nightclub DJs - such as Shaquille O'Neal, who highlighted the opening of the Memoire Nightclub on the property. A final positive were the two quarterly payments of \$6.8 million made to the City of Everett per its host community agreement - money that will change the City Budget forever.

•Wynn Resorts Trial -Though it seems like an eternity ago, great doubt as to the opening of Encore Boston Harbor prevailed at the outset of last year and into the spring months. The Massachusetts Gaming Commission (MGC) was reviewing the company to find whether it was "suitable" to retain its license and open the nearly-completed resort casino in Everett. Everything remained in the balance until a whirlwind week of hearings in April at the South Boston Convention Center where all eyes were on Wynn Resort executives and the MGC Commissioners. In the end, the Commission found the company to be at great fault in a number of ways, but not enough to cause them to lose their license. The company was fined \$35 million for their negligence, and Wynn Resorts CEO Matt Maddox was fined \$500,000 and ordered to undergo executive training classes. The company paid up quickly and did not appeal the decision.

•Crimson Tide Controversy - Head Football Coach Theluxon Pierre takes the rare stance of criticizing the referees following an overtime playoff loss to the Central Catholic Raiders in November. His criticism was well-received considering the referees gave Central Catholic an extra fifth down late in the game, and also called Quarterback Duke Doherty short of the goal line on the last play of the game in overtime. Many, including Pierre, contended that Doherty scored on the play and the official botched yet another call.

•Development Continues - The Pioneer luxury apartment complex opens in May on the Parkway while numerous other developments continue to come into the City. Last fall, Lennar Companies proposed a major development for Norman Street, while the Market Forge property on the Parkway brought in a major California developer looking to transform that vacant site. In November, Boston's The Davis Companies reveals that it has bought the Boston Market Terminal to develop into a major distribution center of some kind, and The 600 apartment complex got initial approvals from the City in its quest to make the Broadway hill into a new living community. Development is expected to continue throughout 2020 with more projects coming into Everett to supply the growing residential population.

•Blue Bikes to Everett the popular Blue Bike docked bike rental service expands to Everett on June 17 prior to the opening of the Encore Casino. The Blue Bike service is immediately a popular choice as the stations expand across the City's neighborhoods. City officials report that from June 17 to Sept. 1, there were more than 4,000 Blue Bike rides taken in

Transportation RevoMaria uses the opening of Encore and other major events in the latter part of 2019 to champion the idea of Gold Standard Bus Rapid Transit (BRT). While Everett had been a leader in bus lanes and other BRT innovations, the mayor pledged to make the best BRT system available in Everett, and even stretching into Boston. In the fall, he lauds a major victory as Boston Mayor Martin Walsh agrees to get on board the Gold Standard BRT innovation by including it in major rehabilitation plans for Rutherford Avenue and Sullivan Square in Charlestown.

Malden Riv-•The er is Clean - In March, long-awaited sediment samples from the Malden River were found to be mostly clean, and that the River was safe for recreational boating. That was a major revelation for a Riverway that most had been ordered to stay away from for generations. In July, the Mystic River was given an 'A' rating for water quality by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) – further cementing the movement in Everett to make its waterways an amenity, and not a deficiency – for residents.

•Pope John High School Closes – On May 23, Pope John awarded 92 seniors the last diplomas ever for the high school. With a \$1.3 million shortfall, a last minute effort to close the gap and keep the school open falls short. In May, the school announces it will no longer operate. On June 5, students walk out the Catholic high school's doors for the last time. The property is now being considered by the City for demolition and development into affordable housing.

•Everett Square Redevelopment - after years of planning and discussions, the first steps towards re-making Everett Square came in the form of an approved Urban Renewal Plan (URP). That was followed up by an RFP for properties in the area, which brought

in five proposals in September. The movement in Everett Square will likely be one of the major stories coming forward in 2020.


•Carol's Café Closes -After 17 years, one of the City's breakfast hot-spots closes down in May. Tim and Kim Ferrante had operated the café for many years, and had been the favorite of locals and visitors to Everett during that time. The Main Street café stays open, but under new own-

 Blue Ribbon Task Force Report - In September, after 18 months of work, the School Finance Blue Ribbon Task Force issues its report and recommendations on finances for the School Department and the City. Among the findings were an exoneration of the City and Mayor Carlo De-Maria in their skepticism of the need for more money at the School Department. In the wake of the report, the School Department returns \$3.2 million in surplus funds to the City.

•Arts Walk - The first-ever Arts Walk takes place through October in Everett, with several local artists and business partaking in the event. Congresswoman Ayanna Pressley is on hand to initiate the walk at City Hall, and Cultural Commission Chair Karen Alzayer creates momentum for the arts in Everett with the event all month long.





PLASTIC BAG ORDINANCE TO BE ENFORCED

CHELSEA - The ban on plastic bags officially went into place on Dec. 17, but City officials will use the holiday season to inform shop owners and supermarkets of the new ordinance – with a major effort to enforce the ordinance starting on Jan. 6.

The ordinance has been highly-anticipated for almost a year, and there have been loads of preparations conducted by the City and the business community.

However, many felt that beginning the enforcement in the heart of the holiday shopping season might not have been such a wise move. The City agreed and has come up with an alternate plan.

"In early December we were approached by a few businesses that felt starting enforcement on Dec. 17 would be tricky because it would be the peak sales time for the holidays," said Fidel Maltez, of the DPW. 'We worked internally with City Manager Tom Ambrosino and decided to do a soft enforcement in December. This past week we've been going around informing everyone and answering questions. It's more of an informational roll out and actual enforcement will start on Jan. 6 when everything slows down."

Maltez said on Jan. 6, inspectors from DPW and Inspectional Services will go out to the stores and begin enforcing the ordinance. If any business is found in non-compliance, they will have 14 days to correct the problem.

He said the biggest supplier of the plastic bags in question is Market Basket. The store, he said, believes it can make the change by then.

"We had a meeting with Market Basket's leadership and shared the approach and they are confident they will be ready to fully roll out the ban by Jan. 6," he

The bag ban was passed earlier in 2019, but was delayed until Dec. 17 for implementation. The ban was

passed as a measure to help the environment with reducing the use of single-use plastics, and also to control litter in Chelsea.

"Single-use plastic is not good and is controllable and can't be recycled or repurposed," he said. "By eliminating single-use plastic bags, we're hoping to lead the change from an environmental standpoint. It can also reduce litter. You travel Broadway and there are always the white and black plastic bags all over the sidewalk. Maybe with the implementation of this, we can reduce that and you won't see these bags anymore."

There are some exceptions to the rule.

The plastic bags used for produce and other loose articles are exempt, as are newspaper bags. A thicker, reusable plastic bag will be for sale at most all stores under the ordinance, but there is no specified price for them.

COUNCIL LOOKS AT TIF CONTRACT

CHELSEA - Several Chelsea City Councillors had asked for a pause in the Tax Incremental Financing (TIF) agreement this month in order to completely review the details of a state-reviewed contract between the Housing Authority, a private developer and the City.

The TIF would allow the Corcoran Companies and the Chelsea Housing Authority to re-develop the Innes Apartments into a mixed-income community with new public housing units and new market rate units – along with parking and some retail portions. The TIF has been said for some time to be the most critical piece left to getting the deal complete.

The terms of the 15-year TIF include an 80 percent reduction in new value the first five years, 6 percent the second five years and 50 percent for the final five years.

The TIF agreement has been public for many months, with the most important financial details becoming public last summer.

However, when brought before the Council earlier this month, there were unexpected questions from many in the Council.

Instead of moving it to a vote, it was moved to Committee.

Some objected, but at that Committee of the Whole meeting on Dec. 16, councillors said they wanted a pause to review the contract terms that had just been delivered to them.

"Since March, we've

been negotiating the TIF and plan with the state Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD)," said City Manager Tom Ambrosino. "The terms were disclosed during the Smart Growth District presentation. The detailed documents weren't presented until recently because it took awhile to negotiate and it had to go to DHCD before it could come to the Council. That just took a long time."

Those negotiations included many minor details that fulfilled legal obligations, he said, such as how the agreement would be administered and how the apartments would be done.

"The financial terms are the most significant thing, but they are only one paragraph in the document," he said. "DHCD has much greater concerns about how it will be administrated. Those details took time."

Council President Damali Vidot said the Council shouldn't have been handed the contract in short order before being expected to take such a major vote.

"It's clear that the Council wants this project to happen and no one has a problem with that," she said. "The problem I have is you drop a 100-page document at a Council meeting and expect a vote...No one is talking to us about what this other stuff is and we're expected to vote on it. The Council deserves a little bit more respect and ore information up front. It starts at the top."

Some of the details in the contract that were not previously known include the City's dedication of about \$5 million in state MassWorks grants to help with infrastructure like new drainage, new sewers and new roadways. Such a precedent exists already with the work done on Everett Avenue and around the One North developments. Some of those state grants, however, have not yet been received and there is hope they would come this summer.

The City Council was expected to vote on the TIF agreement Monday night at its last regular meeting of 2019, which came beyond Record deadlines.

\$1M GRANT EARMARKED FOR OCEAN AVENUE REVERE - On December

ber 18, at the State Police Barracks on Revere Beach Mayor Brian Arrigo joined Economic Development Secretary Mike Kennealy, House Speaker Robert A. DeLeo and Revere's elected officials to accept a \$1 million MassWorks Infrastructure Program grant. The grant will be used for the Ocean Avenue Gateway project, which calls for infrastructure improvements ahead of the construction of two hotels planned for Revere Beach.

The \$1 million grant will relocate overhead utilities and make intersection improvements on Ocean Avenue, clearing the way for the two planned hotels.


According to Mayor Arrigo the project will also include the resurfacing of approximately 2,000 feet of roadway, and the reconfiguration and resignalization of the intersection at Revere Beach Parkway. Collectively, the two permitted hotel sites will generate over 300 rooms and an 80-seat restaurant, with the larger of the two developments valued at \$40 million.

"The infrastructure improvements will help advance the long-term goal of a well-conceived Revere Beach Transit-Oriented Development District," said Mayor Arrigo. "Thanks to the support of Gov. Baker, Speaker DeLeo, Sen. Boncore, and Rep. Vincent, this will fuel the momentum happening in Revere, benefiting residents, visitors, and businesses along Ocean Avenue."

Arrigo added that these grant monies will support the growth of Revere's local economy by creating walkable space between the mixed-use community, centered between two T-stops. "Infrastructure improvements that advance transit-oriented development is key to a vibrant, sustainable, and attractive community that encourages residents and visitors alike to utilize public transit," he said at the event

Secretary Mike Kennealy said these Mass-Works improvements in Revere will also support increased multi-modal safety and connectivity between


