Sainristil joined with the Crimson Tide Pop Warner organization in hosting a youth football clinic. Despite 90-degree temperatures, close to 100 athletes attended the clinic, a testament to Mike’s popularity and the tradition of football excellence

Sainristil was happy to be back in the city where he became one of program’s greatest players in school history.

“It’s always a great feeling to come back home – I love it,” said Sainristil.

Sainristil was grateful

for the warm reception from Everett families and pleased with the large turnout at the football clinic.

“I’m very appreciative of everyone that signed up,” said Sainristil. “It’s hot and it’s definitely more difficult on the younger

players to be outside in the heat playing football. But they came out here, they’re having fun, and they got ice cream, snacks, and drinks. It’s just a great time.”

Sainristil said he will likely move from receiver to defensive back for the Wolverines this season. He played defensive back in Michigan’s Maize and Blue Spring Game.

“I have big plans for this season,” said Sainristil. “Hopefully it’s a great year. The spring game went really well. It felt good playing defense again. I felt comfortable. There are definitely techniques that I have to work on. I’ve been playing receiver since I got to college, so I have to get some

DiPierro resigns as Ward 3 councilor

Deveney steps down as communications director

Ward 3 Councilor Anthony DiPierro and Everett Communications Director Deanna Deveney have resigned from their respective positions in city government.

DiPierro and Deveney had come under criticism for their insensitive remarks during a Zoom conversation among city officials.

Mayor Carlo DeMaria issued “A Statement on ‘Community Healing’” Monday in which he noted the dual resignations of DiPierro and Deveney.

“Recently we have been faced with inexcusable conduct of elected officials and City employees that violates the public trust,” said DeMaria. “These actions have caused deep pain in our community. I have spoken to and heard from residents, and we all believe that significant, visible action must be taken in order for true healing to begin.”

In a letter of resignation that DiPierro shared with the Everett Independent Monday, DiPierro wrote, “After taking time to reflect, I have decided to step down from my position as an Everett City Councilor, effective immediately. “My actions have clearly hurt a city that I love and am proud to call home. My resignation as Ward 3 Councilor will allow our community to continue its path of growth, without distraction.

“I take full responsibility for my actions, and encourage others who participated in this hurtful,

self to the diversity and inclusion of all people, so that I will truly learn and grow from this sad experience.”

The resignations came as public demonstrations by Everett students and residents were held Monday in front of Everett City Hall protesting racism.

The City Council did not discuss the resignations at its meeting Monday. Councilor-at-Large Michael Marchese did comment on the issue before the meeting, stating the comments on the Zoom meeting were insensitive to all residents of the community.

“It’s unfortunate because Deanna was a pretty good quality worker and Anthony was a good councilor,” said Marchese. “I think he probably should have stepped down when this first happened, and it would have alleviated a lot of problems that we have in the city now. There’s a lot of reflection that must go on here. The Council must step up, stop arguing, and start acting like a Council. Hopefully, we as a community will start to come together a little bit.”

Sheriff Koutoujian meets with AG Garland, and federal law enforcement leaders

Middlesex Sheriff Peter J. Koutoujian was recently in Washington, D.C., where he participated in meetings with top federal officials regarding critical issues facing law enforcement across the country.

Sheriff Koutoujian – who is Immediate Past President of the Major County Sheriffs of America (MCSA) – joined a select group of national law enforcement leaders for meetings with Attorney General Merrick Garland, FBI Director Christopher Wray, DEA Administra-

tor Anne Milgram and the heads of the ATF and U.S. Marshals Service. Local and county law enforcement leaders were invited to speak with federal officials about a range of issues including police and corrections reform; officer health and wellness; recruitment and retention; and gun violence.

“I was honored to be among this small group of law enforcement executives invited to meet with Attorney General Garland and our federal partners. It was a tremendous opportunity to share what we are seeing and doing here in Middlesex County,” said Sheriff Koutoujian. “These conversations and relationships are crucial to identifying best practices, formulating policy, directing resources and enhancing public safety in communities across the United States. I look forward to continuing our close collaboration with our federal partners both in Washington and right here in Massachusetts.”

First ‘Bike to the Sea Day’ ride since the pandemic set for June 5

The 30th annual “Bike to the Sea Day” ride will start in Everett at 8 a.m. on Sunday June 5th. It is the first in-person “Bike to the Sea Day” group ride since 2019, the year before the pandemic shutdowns.

Much work has been done on the Northern Strand Community Trail since then and so most of the 20-mile ride to Nahant and back will be on the paved off-road rail trail. There is also a shorter 14-mile ride along the Northern Strand at the same time.

The ride starts at the Madeline English School, 105 Woodville Street, in Everett and travels

through Malden, Revere, Saugus, and Lynn before stopping at the beach in Nahant. The return trip ends at the new House of Smoke BBQ restaurant, at 229 Centre St. in Malden, the former location of the Dockside Restaurant just outside of Malden Square on Route 60. The ride is expected to end before 1 p.m.

The registration fee includes lunch there, as well as a 2022 Bike to the Sea Day T-shirt. If you register before May 29, the cost is \$25 per person or \$35 per family. After May 29, the registration fee is \$35 per person or \$50 per family. If interested, register here.

The minimum age for riders is 8-years-old, unless on a tag-along or bike seat. Bicycle helmets are required for all participants. The ride usually includes police escorts at road crossings.

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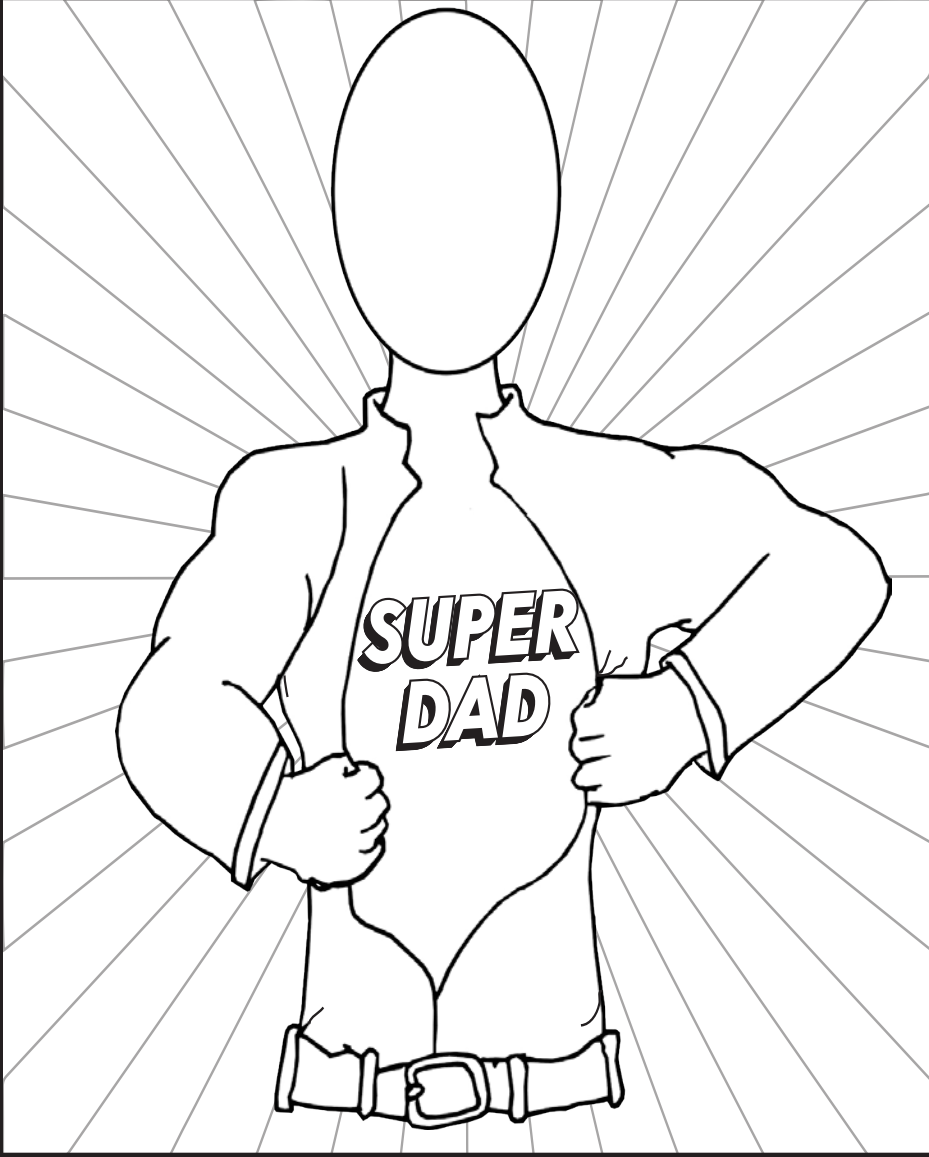

A MEMORIAL DAY TRUISM: FREEDOM ISN'T FREE

For the first time in 20 years -- that's an entire generation -- America's military men and women are not fighting a war on foreign soil.

The withdrawal of our remaining troops from Afghanistan last August brought to an end a conflict that had long-outlasted its purpose, which initially was meant to destroy the al-Quaeda terrorist organization that was responsible for the 9/11 attacks, but which somehow morphed into a long-term, nation-building undertaking.

Although we technically are at peace, the world stage feels anything but peaceful. Totalitarian adversaries either are wreaking havoc (Russia in Ukraine) or threatening to do so (No. Korea and China).

If the lessons of the past and present teach us anything, it is that we cannot take our freedom for granted.

The same troops who are delivering baby formula today could be called upon to engage in a far different and more dangerous mission at any moment.

This realization made us think back to the roots of Memorial Day, originally known as Decoration Day, with the proclamation by Gen. Logan on May 5, 1868, in which he declared:

"The 30th day of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet churchyard in the land. In this observance no form or ceremony is prescribed, but posts and comrades will in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may permit. Let us, then, at the time appointed, gather around their sacred remains and garland the passionless mounds above them with choicest flowers of springtime; let us raise above them the dear old flag they saved from dishonor; let us in this solemn presence renew our pledges to aid and assist those whom they have left among us as sacred charges upon the Nation's gratitude, the soldier's and sailor's widow and orphan."

That in turn got us to thinking of what rates as the greatest testament to the memory of those brave Americans who made the Supreme Sacrifice, the Gettysburg Address by President Abraham Lincoln, in order to preserve our democratic way of life:

"Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

"Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation, so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure.

"We are met on a great battle-field of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field, as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

"But, in a larger sense, we can not dedicate, we can not consecrate, we can not hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

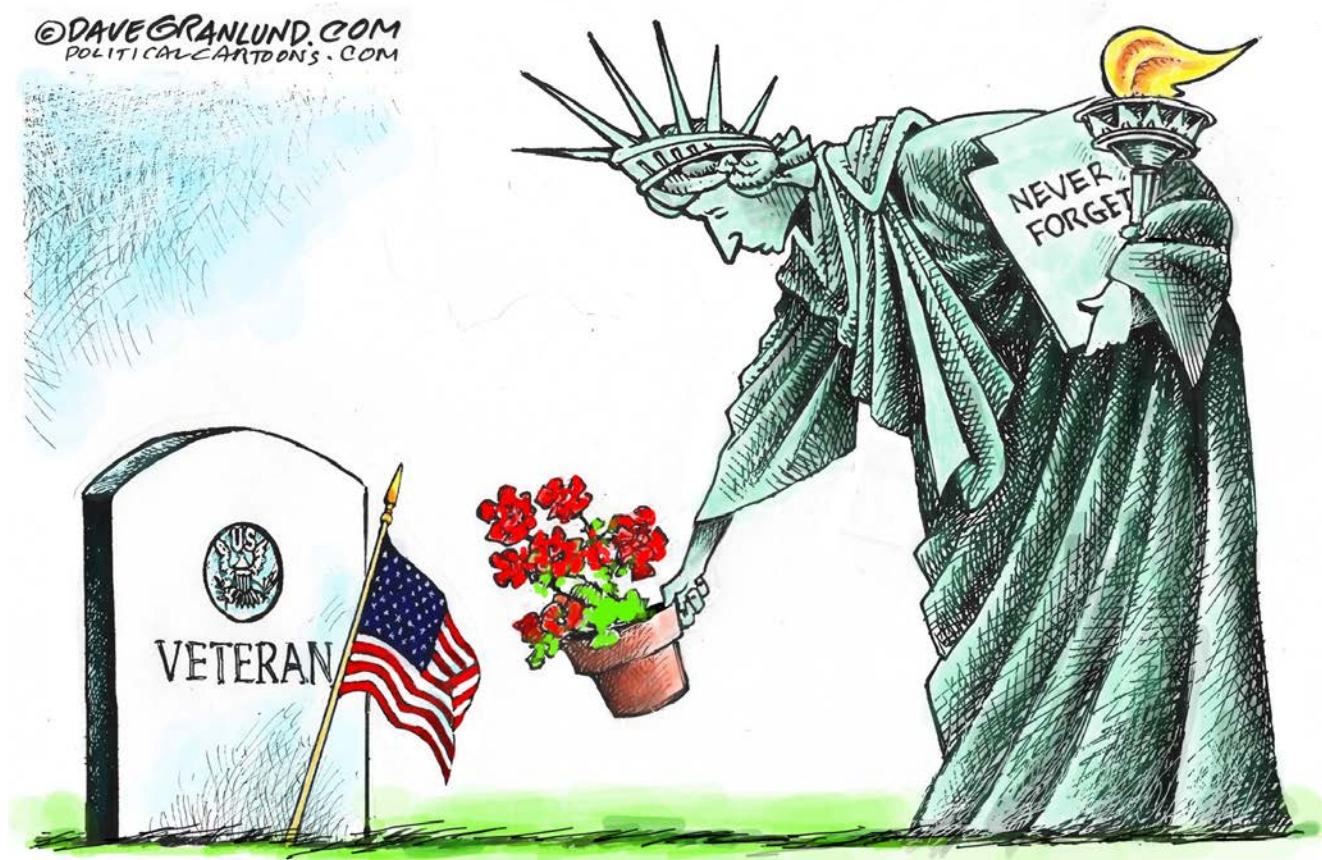
We hope our readers appreciate the eternal truths of Lincoln's sentiments, which are as relevant today as they have been since the founding of our nation.

They are scattered out between Kentucky, Ohio, West Virginia and other states.

When Memorial Day comes, I try my best to make the six-hour trip to decorate my deceased wife's grave. Carole, who I married 17 years ago has deceased parents who are buried three hours away from where we live. It's never easy. There are flowers to buy. The drive is not easy and we have those who are alive we want to visit. It's makes us feel bad that we don't have hours to go and spend at the cemetery and respect those we loved.

Sadly, there are so many forgotten graves of loved ones and American soldiers. The older we get the number of deceased people we know can become more than the living we know.

Do the best you can. This is all any human being can ever do. There are graves you know you must attend to and others you will have to trust to other family members or friends.

While we are trying to celebrate Memorial Day the right way, please continue to celebrate the living people in your life. There is a story in the Bible where a friend of Jesus anointed him with expensive ointment while they were having dinner. It was her way of celebrating him and what he meant to her. Try to find ways to anoint people in your life who are meaningful to you. Buy them flowers now if you can afford them. I hate to say it but it's true -- dead noses smell no roses.

I've always tried to buy flowers for those I love while they can enjoy them. It may not be flowers but maybe it could be a nice smile. A word of thanks or praise for a person in your life would be meaningful. One way you might make Memorial Day meaningful is celebrating those people you have in your life today because, as we know, it won't last long.

Back in February, my brother-in-law Harold was very sick and I knew his time was limited. My wife and I agreed we needed to go and visit with him. We had a good visit and a good talk. When I left him that day and we said goodbye to each other, I felt that it was truly goodbye at least for this life. He died just a couple of weeks later.

Memorial Day has changed for most of us. However, try to make a good memory or two with those people who are still alive in your life. What you remember about those who have gone on is what you enjoyed while they were living.

This Memorial Day weekend, be very safe and take time to enjoy the living.

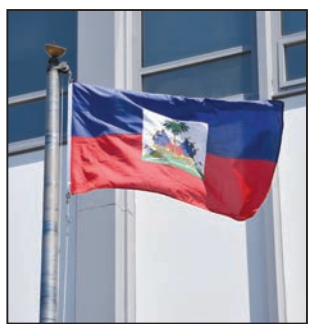

EHS SOFTBALL EDGES MEDFORD WITH DRAMATIC WALK-OFF WIN, 6-5; THEN TOPPLES LYNN CLASSICAL

The Everett High softball team knocked off its two chief Greater Boston League (GBL) rivals, Medford and Lynn Classical, this past week to place themselves into prime position for a share of the GBL championship.

The twin wins moved the Lady Crimson Tide into a tie for first place with Classical. Both teams have two losses in the GBL and Everett will conclude its season tomorrow (Thursday) at Somerville, a team that the Lady Crimson Tide handily defeated in their first meeting this season by a score of 22-1.

Last Wednesday, Everett scored two runs in the bottom of the seventh

inning to earn a dramatic 6-5 victory over Medford, which entered the fray just one game behind Everett in the GBL.

The Lady Mustangs held a 5-4 lead entering the top of the seventh and threatened to add to their margin when, with two outs, a two-out single and steal placed a Medford runner into scoring position.

However, an attempted steal of third proved to be a base too far, as EHS catcher Kayley Rossi gunned down the Lady Mustang at third to end the inning and maintain the margin at one run.

Everett wasted no time in achieving the winning tallies. Emma Longmore led off the decisive seventh with a triple and a bunt by Jayla Davila resulted in an overthrow by the Medford catcher to

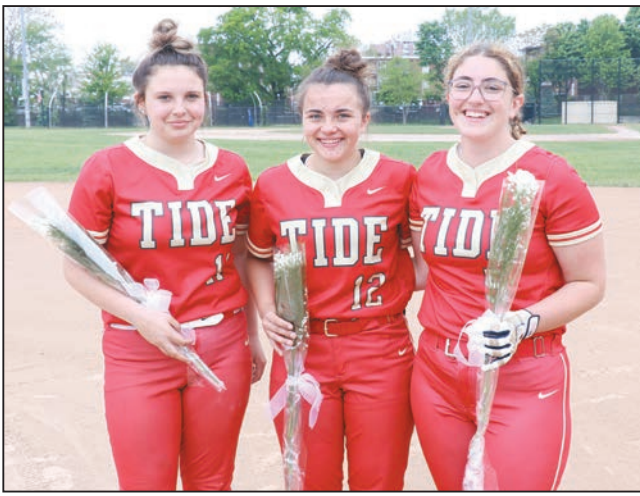

third in an attempt to get Longmore.

Emma scored on the error and the speedy Davila made it all the way to third. After Rossi drew a one-out walk, Emila Maria Babock laid down a bunt along the first base line on which Davila raced home with the winning tally.

“This was such a great game,” said EHS head coach Stacy Schiavo. “The last time we faced them we hit so well off their pitcher and beat them 18-6. But that was not the case in this game.

“This win was about heart,” Schiavo continued. “We told the girls in the last inning we were NOT losing by one run. They needed to show heart and get up to the plate and put all their mechanics they know to use. When Longmore tripled, we knew we had to play small ball. Davila can get the bunt down and with her speed we could get runners on. We had hitters coming up in the line-up, so I knew we would at least tie.

“Normally, we have Emilia hit, but knew with her speed she could beat it out as well,” Schiavo added. “She put an amazing bunt down and with Jayla’s speed, it all just worked out.”

EHS star hurler Celeste Fuccillo turned in a strong effort in the pitcher’s circle, tossing all seven innings in which Celeste struck out nine opponents and yielded only four base hits, though six walks helped Medford score its five runs.

Medford scored all five of its runs in the third thanks to a combination of walks, errors, a single, and a double and moved out to a 5-1 advantage at that point.

Everett cut the lead in half with a pair of runs in the fifth. Gianna Masucci singled into the outfield with one out and came home on a triple by Alexa Uga tripled to right. After Bryanna Mason put down a bunt and reached first safely, Davila beat out a bunt, allowing Uga to score.

The Everett defense

kept Medford off the board in the sixth. With the bases-loaded and one out, Uga fielded a ground-er at third and threw home for the force. Alexa then grabbed another grounder her way and stepped on the bag for the final out of the inning.

The Lady Crimson Tide narrowed the gap to 5-4 in the bottom of the sixth when Rossi walked, moved to second on a sacrifice bunt by Babcock, and scored on a double by Masucci.

This past Monday, the Lady Crimson Tide knocked off first-place Classical, 8-2, avenging an 8-1 defeat from earlier in the season.

Fuccillo was immense, tossing all seven innings and limiting the hard-hitting Lady Rams to just one earned run, while striking out eight and walking only one.

The contest was a scoreless duel through the first three frames until Everett broke through for two runs in the top of the fourth.

Kristi Skane almost led off with a homer, but the Lady Ram center fielder caught the long drive at the fence.

However, the Lady Crimson Tide were undeterred. Kayley Rossi singled into left and moved to second on a sacrifice bunt by Emilia Maria-Babcock. A base hit by Gianna Masucci placed runners at the corners, bringing up Fuccillo, who helped her own cause with a double that brought in both teammates for a 2-0 Everett advantage.

Classical brought the contest back to level, reaching Fuccillo for two runs in the bottom of the fifth, but the Lady Crimson Tide regained the lead with a solo marker in the sixth.

After Rossi started the inning with a single into the outfield, Emilia Maria-Babcock bunted, reaching safely thanks to an error at first base allowing Emilia to move to second, with Rossi coming all the way around to score.

However, the Lady

Crimson Tide were not satisfied with their one-run advantage and broke open the contest with a huge, two-out rally in the top of the seventh.

Jayla Davila drew a walk and Skane’s ground-er to short was muffed, allowing Skane to get on base and the speedy Davila to move all the way to third.

Rossi then singled into the outfield, knocking in Davila. Emilia Maria-Babcock followed with another base hit, bringing in Skane.

Gianna Masucci doubled, delivering Rossi, and after Fuccillo drew a base-on-balls, Alexa Uga doubled in Babcock and Masucci to cap the five-run outburst that left matters at 8-2.

Fuccillo ended the game with a flourish, striking out the final two Lady Ram batters.

The Everett defense shone brightly at many points in the contest.

In the opening inning, Classical’s second batter tried to reach on a bunt, but was thrown out at first by catcher Rossi.

In the third, Rossi gunned down a Lady Ram, who had reached base on a walk, at second on an attempted steal. For the final out, a dropped third strike and overthrow to first was adeptly backed up by right fielder Skane, who threw out the Lady Ram when she tried to advance to second.

In the sixth, after the Classical leadoff batter doubled, Davila made a superb catch deep in centerfield and then doubled-up the Classical runner at second as she tried to get back to the base, making the throw to second baseman Emma Longmore, who in turn made the relay throw to shortstop Masucci at second.

“This was such a huge win,” said Schiavo. “We both have two losses in the league so we need to beat Somerville Thursday to share the league title.

The Lady Crimson Tide put the contest away from the outset, scoring eight runs in the first, one in the second, and six in the third.

Uga stroked a two-run double and Bryanna Mason belted a two-RBI triple to key the opening-inning outburst.

In the six-run third, the key hits came from a bevy of Lady Crimson Tide, including Jules Curran, Ashley Seward (who had two hits), Kaylin Seward, and Arabella Cvitkusic.

“Stoneham was positive from the beginning of the game and played as well as they could against us,” noted Schiavo. “They are a young team and the coach is rebuilding their program. We made switches in the second inning. Our defense still held them off the bases. Kristi pitched a great game and struck out 11 batters. On offense, the girls had to adjust to the slower pitching that they have not seen as much this season.”

After Schiavo and her crew wrap up their regular season with Somerville tomorrow, they will await word of their seeding and opening-round opponent in the post-season state tournament.

volleyball team celebrated Senior Day in appropriate fashion with a 3-2 victory over Medford in the final game of the season last week.

The Crimson Tide honored the five members of the Class of 2022 before the game for their contributions in the inaugural season of the boys volleyball program at Everett High.

Seniors Habtemariam Yirdaw and David Gutierrez Ospina joined Maricilio Melo and co-captains Brandon Ho and Caio Santos in the starting lineup, and five players recorded kills in the opening frame, which Everett took 25-16.

Melo, who tweaked an ankle before the game, had three kills. Ho had two kills and a string of services that pushed a 5-4 lead to a 15-5 advantage.

Santos added two aces, and freshman Henrique Franca had three service points and a kill.

"The team was inspired by Marcilio's gutsy performance and we came out firing," said EHS head coach Mike Fineran. "We lost the first set the first two times we played Medford, so we knew we had to do something differently."

In the second set, the Tide hit five serves out and couldn't muster much of an attack, with only two players recording kills in a 25-20 loss. Santos, the team's savvy setter, noticed that Medford was loading up on the block, so he smartly dropped three balls over himself for easy points. Ho had two aces in a string of serves that turned a 5-3 deficit to a 6-5 lead.

Junior Shinay Aristhene was a double-winner in the contest with Somerville. Shinay won the 400 hurdles with a clocking of 1:03.3 and took top spot in the 100 high hurdles in a time of 18.5 seconds.

Senior Donovan Gaskins also won two events vs. Somerville. Donovan won the shot-out with a

throw of 41'-7", which was a personal record (PR). He also captured the discus with a spin of 108'-7", which was another PR.

Junior Fludjy Moise captured first place in the 400 dash with a time of 57.8 and senior Lilian Pochot won the long jump with a PR flight of 20'-1".

Mystic Valley Elder Services urges, do not lose sleep worrying about insomnia

There’s nothing quite as frustrating as not being able to get to sleep and stay asleep. Insomnia happens to most people at one time or another in their life but is more common in older adults.

Insomnia is the most prevalent type of sleeping problem in elders. With insomnia, people have trouble falling asleep and staying asleep. Some issues that lead to insomnia include worrying about certain things that makes your mind rave or taking any new medication (over the counter or prescription) that may be causing side effects. Sleep apnea is another issue. When an individual suffers from sleep apnea, he or she stops breathing momentarily while sleeping and subsequently wakes up after each cessation. Movement disorders, such as Restless Leg Syndrome and Periodic Limb Movement Disorder, are other causes of sleeplessness. Such conditions cause uncomfortable feelings in the legs that can lead to unsettled sleep.

The National Sleep Foundation states elderly people may also experience insomnia because of a change to their circadian rhythm. Our body has internal clock that gives us signals when it is time to go to bed. As we age, these circadian signals become less efficient which result in elderly people going to bed earlier and waking up earlier.

According to a publication by the National Institute on Aging, “A Good Night’s Sleep,” older adults should get 7-9 hours of sleep per night. Unfortunately, many elders don’t get enough sleep for many reasons. People function better with the appropriate amount of sleep but when they go without sleep, they may be irritable, forgetful, depressed, and be more likely to have falls.

There are some steps older adults can take to help sleep better. Follow a regular schedule, going to bed at the same time each evening and waking at the same time each morning.

Create a bedtime routine and follow it each night 30 minutes prior to going to bed. By doing a routine regularly, your body will begin to know when it’s time to sleep. Also, make sure the pillows and mattress are comfortable, exercise frequently, but avoid exercise three hours before bedtime, and be aware of when you eat. Eating a large meal close to bedtime can prevent you from sleeping well.

Most importantly, talk with a primary care physician to rule out any physical problems that may be causing the restless sleep patterns. Only a physician can diagnose some of the more serious causes of sleep disorders.

With a little work on your part and help from your doctor, you should be able to get a good night’s sleep without counting sheep.

The first line of defense when it comes to how to treat insomnia in elderly adults is behavioral changes. This includes things such as:

- Limiting fluids up to 3 hours before bed
- Avoiding caffeine and/or tobacco
- Not having a large meal before bedtime
- Keeping your bedroom as dark as possible
- Only use your bed to sleep instead of laying on it to watch tv
- Doing what you can to reduce noise

- Being as active as possible during the day
