Exxon to abandon operations at tank farm

datıon (CLF) lawsuıt, ExxonMobil has ceased operations at its Everett tank farm and is selling the site to a developer. CLF filed a lawsuit in 2016 arguing Exxon's site has been polluting surrounding waters for years. It is also woefully unprepared for climate risks and threatens to spill oil into nearby communities and the Mystic River in the event of severe

The Everett site contains contaminated soil and groundwater and it will continue to be a serious threat to the community and the environment until Exxon or the purchaser takes responsibility to fortify it, according to CLF. Redevelopment would only be appropriate if it is fully and properly prepared to withstand climate impacts and severe weather and a massive cleanup is undertaken to fix these serious issues.

Mayor Carlo DeMaria offered the following statement about the news developments concerning

"Everett residents fiopment opportunities they deserve with the redevelopment of the ExxonMobil, 95-acre parcel and the Constellation Energy generating sites. I have always known the potential that Everett has to evolve from its industrial age commercial uses because we have the acreage that is no longer found in surrounding communities. What our residents deserve is for our federal and state leaders to use the generational federal funding dollars available to the Commonwealth to capitalize on these opportunities for smart, transit-oriented development opportunities supported by the expansion of the Silver Line,

an infill station along the commuter rail line, expansion of bus rapid transit lanes, and the electrification of the commuter rail that will support Everett and the entire North Shore corridor. It's about time that everyone else sees Everett for the endless possibilities that we are able to offer to create higher-paying, cleaner, 21st century high-tech job opportunities with the right public infrastructure investments and private development vision."

CLF said it will continue to hold ExxonMobil accountable in court for its unlawful conduct and will be involved in the redevelopment process to make sure that community voices are heard.

School bus company withdraws fuel charge request

The controversy over whether to approve the changes for an added fuel surcharge to the contract of the Malden Transportation Co. (MT) came to an end at Monday's night School Committee meeting when the MT owners withdrew their request to seek a contract change due to added fuel costs.

In March, the School Committee received a request from the owners of MT seeking to amend the

contract to receive a 4.5% fuel increase because of higher gasoline prices. The added fuel surcharges that would have started in March and end in June when the contract expires would have cost Everett taxpayers an additional \$60,000.

At Monday's night meeting, two members of the public spoke during the public comment period with one saying, "Malden

Transportation's request

to change the contract was

outrageous and an insult to

Everett taxpayers."

The first part of the request from MT to alter the existing contract resulted in the request from the administration to deny any amendments to existing contracts that result in increased costs of contracted services.

Robert Moreschi, the Chief Procurement Agent for Everett, appeared before the committee to answer questions that might arise from this matter. He noted "that every contract

is different and that a fuel

surcharge is applicable for many vendors." He added, "Every contract should be taken on a case-by-case basis."

School Committeeman Marcony Barrios questioned approving the request from MT saying, "The price of food is high. We could open a potential request from other vendors. There is a budget that we must keep in mind."

U.S. Attorney looking into allegations of discriminatory conduct here

The office of U.S. Attorney Rachael Rollins reportedly is launching an investigation into allegations of potential civil rights violations by the City of Everett.

Everett Mayor Carlo DeMaria this week confirmed that his office has received a letter from Rollins notifying him of the looming investiga-

The Independent requested a copy of the letter, which was quoted in a story in the Boston Globe last week, from the U.S. Attorney's office.

EXASPERATED BY HIGH ENERGY COSTS? WAIT UNTIL THIS WINTER

Barely a day goes by without a news story about the high cost of gasoline and energy prices in general.

Economists and energy market experts point to a host of reasons as to why the market prices for oil and natural gas have skyrocketed in the past three months. The war in Ukraine only exacerbated what in any event would have been a world-wide energy crisis thanks to the decision by the OPEC+ nations and U.S. oil companies to limit output -- in order to reap huge profits for their shareholders -- despite increased world-wide demand in the aftermath of the pandemic.

However, whatever the reasons may be, they are of little consolation to Americans who must drive a car every day and who face record-high prices of more than \$5.00 per gallon for regular gasoline.

It often is said by economists that higher energy prices effectively are a tax on consumers. But higher energy costs are even worse than a tax. We're paying higher gasoline prices for the exact same product, but with higher taxes, at least in theory we'd be getting more services for our tax dollars.

The only ones directly benefiting from higher energy prices are the shareholders of the major oil companies and the dictators in places like Saudi Arabia and Russia.

But as painful as higher energy costs are right now, the real crunch will come this winter, when Americans in the northern half of the country will face costs for heating oil and natural gas that never have been seen. We paid \$3.00 for a gallon of heating oil this past winter -- but the price right now from our heating oil dealer is nearly \$6.00. At that price, a delivery of heating oil of 175 gallons -- about 2/3 of a tank -- will be more than \$1000, a figure that truly will be a hardship for many

So let's start praying now for a mild winter -- and get used to the idea of taking shorter hot showers, dropping the thermostats in our homes, wearing sweaters during the day, using extra blankets at night, and sealing up the drafts through our doors and windows.

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

The least our leaders can do is raise the age to 21 to own any kind of labeled assault weapon. Personally, I would push for 25 but honestly there is no golden number. Old people can go crazy with assault style weapons as easy as eighteen-yearolds. We've seen more school shootings from those under 21 which

makes it a reasonable place to start. Establishing a six-month waiting period to buy an assault style weapon will not hurt anyone. Background checks are vital but again will not be a cure-all because often the shooters have unblemished backgrounds.

All schools must pay for a couple of armed guards to patrol and protect their students. Even then a surprise attack by two or three people with assault style weapons and body armor could easily overpower guards carrying semi-automatic weapons. Yet, the presence of armed security is better than leaving our children defenseless.

One local county I know fairly well has several schools spread out over the county. They have one sheriff and he has two underpaid deputies. By the time he and the deputies could ever possibly even show up, dozens if not a multitude of children would be dead. This sheriff's department is very underfunded and would have to wait for state police to arrive. The local state police post is one hour away. It is unimaginable how many children could be killed. Such school systems have no choice but to come up with armed security guards to protect the chil-

Who ever dreamed you would read something like this in your local paper? I never dreamed of a country where it would need to be written.

gan questioned the validity of changing contracts saying, "Contracts should not be in front of us."

The committee voted in favor of the superintendent's position to deny the request by a 7-2 vote.

After the vote was taken, an email from MT's owners was read to the committee saying, "We withdraw the fuel surcharge request. We feel that we are caught in the political crossfire. "

Ward 6 Committeeman Michael McLaughlin then spoke briefly on his original motion to amend the

existing contract to allow a 4.5% fuel surcharge retroactive back to March 1 with an end date of June 30. "I have been under attack for weeks," Mc-Laughlin said. "We should give vendors the opportunity to be heard."

He then offered to send

his motion "back to sponsor" and that ended the The committee debate. voted unanimously to approve McLaughlin's request, which essentially put the matter to rest.

EQUALITY To the Editor,

Members of the Haitian, Black communities, and Latino communities are writing to demand that the city of Everett immediate action against its executive employees involved in the racist and discriminatory comments directed at Haitians, Blacks, and other Communities of Color in Everett, after careful review of media reports that surfaced over the past few days, but that can be documented back to 2018. The partners signing and supporting this letter are calling on the city to request the termination of all parties involved in such appalling and dehumanizing behavior in an era where the entire nation is trying to reconcile its fracture social fabric and the City of Everett, home to hard-working immigrants is reeling from previous racist incidents.

Until a complete investigation determines the full extent of the city employees involved in this behavior who are still currently in their position, in violation of all ethical standards, and discriminatory practices based on race, skin color, gender and / or national origins. Further, we demand that the city refrain from any implicit or explicit, direct or indirect acts of retaliation towards individuals and or groups who have openly spoke up against these discriminatory be-

haviors. "Everett's strength lies in the diversity of its population. Over two-thirds of Everett's population are people of color, and as such our leaders have a moral and legal responsibility to lead by example in promoting equality, equity, and overall respect toward all citizens. and vocally reject and denounce any racist discourse or behavior. The community expects more than mere expressions of regret but also a commitment to accountability." Says the Rev. Myrlande DesRosiers, director of the Everett Haitian Community Center.

"The racism expressed by Everett officials is reprehensible," says Brian Concannon, Executive Director - The Institute for Justice and Democracy

We unequivocally call for action to ensure that symbols of hate in any form have no home in Everett. Our hope is that this incident serves as a catalyst for meaningful change and a wake-up call to eradicate racially insensitive language and behavior both in public and private conversations. We concur with other allies in our community that: "the resignation of those who think casual racism is a joke and ignore that their power and influence lead to the systemic and exclusionary policies and budgets prevalent in our little city. For too long, excuses have been made, and opportunities for action given. No more. "

The partners involved are currently involved in a consultative process to determine all necessary venues to address this issue and meet with the officials of the City with the goal of putting Everett as a City and its communities on the path to trust and reconciliation.

Dear Editor Portal To Hope (PTH), the award-winning nonprofit organization serving domestic violence crime victims in Everett, Lynn, Medford, Malden, Winthrop and neighboring Massachusetts communities, is facing a 27% budget cut effective July 1. Already operating as a small-funded nonprofit, PTH relies on \$179,900 in federal funding from the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) to serve an average of 900 people each year.

Drastic cuts to VOCA will leave PTH to operate on \$131,490 in fiscal year 2023 - a severe re-

PTH spends less than 5% on administrative costs where its management team already volunteers time to carry-out administrative functions in order to dedicate funds for direct care service programs, the 27% budget cut will strap the organization and eliminate its Emergency Shelter program. "In talking with the public, they are as perplexed as we are as to why government keeps cutting funding to agencies serving some of our most vulnerable community members - especially when they realize all the helpful services that we provide," said Linda Morris, a survivor who has been sharing her time as a Victim Advocate at PTH for seventeen years. "As a survivor whose own life was impacted by a family member killed by her abuser, I struggle to understand why PTH and simi-

cuts to VOCA funds. "A state investment is critically needed to sustain and stabilize victim services across the Commonwealth to continue supporting victims and survivors,' announced MOVA.

PTH's Founder, Deborah Fallon, a survivor of violent crime, is appreciative of the work that MOVA and the Victim and Witness Assistance Board (VWAB), which is chaired by Attorney General Maura Healey, are doing in partnership with the Massachusetts Legislature to bridge the funding gap via the "VOCA Bridge Act". "MOVA and VWAB have been outstanding partners in our work serving people impacted by violent crime," said Fallon. "Every person has the right to live free from abuse, and while PTH and like programs are already inundated and focused-in on providing direct care services to people, we look to MOVA, VWAB and our legislators as our advocates in helping us to

remain fully funded." MOVA announced that the Massachusetts Legislature named a Conference Committee to "reconcile differences between the House and Senate final budgets". Conference Committee members are: Representatives Michlewitz, Ferrante, and Smola and Senators Rodrigues, Friedman, and O'Connor. MOVA continues to advocate for a fully-funded VOCA Bridge to sustain services for victims and survivors and is "requesting that the Conference Committee maintain the \$20M investment included in the House budget to bridge one-year of impending cuts" to VOCA funded programs for fiscal

Some are reserved for special occasions, while others are quick meals that use up leftovers. A few are adaptable to any rice you have on hand. Today we'll share our favorite rice entrées.

Fried Rice

Sam Sifton of the New York Times called fried rice, "... a brilliant and addictive way to use up leftovers that comes together in about 20 minutes. It can accommodate practically any vegetable languishing in your refrigerator, and adding leftover cooked chicken, pork, beef, shrimp, or tofu isn't a bad

idea either." Fried rice is made all over Asia. Today cooks from well-known chefs

to students cooking in college quarters add their twist to this classic fast meal. When we have leftover rice, our approach is to pull out the wok or a skillet and a couple of eggs and clean out the

vegetable bins.

Our best tip is to have everything: rice, protein, aromatics like ginger and garlic, and your favorite sauce mixture ready to go into the pan as needed. Fried rice is a fast stir-fry and will be most successful when the cook keeps moving.

Risotto

Once you master making risotto, you can have dinner on the table in about half an hour. Put your broth on the stove to warm, chop an onion, sauté it, add the rice to toast, give it a dose of wine, and begin adding your broth. Stay nearby and stir every so often. When you're not mixing or adding stock, grate the cheese and prepare your butter for the last step of enriching and adding creaminess to your risotto.

You can add preprepped vegetables, meat, or seafood. Think asparagus in spring and sautéed winter squash in fall. Mushrooms, shellfish, and lemon are other favorite risotto flavors around here.

Yes, you can make it with supermarket arborio rice. However, you can up the dish's quality by finding a carnaroli or vialone nano rice at an Italian market. Carnaroli, our favorite, is starchier rice with grains that hold their shape well and makes it easier to create a successful risotto.

Spanish Paella

Paella is a complex dish

that is easier with more minds and hands to execute the steps. We have made it with friends on their outdoor grill. Cooking it over glowing coals adds a smoky flavor. Paella is a perfect summer gathering project. The non-cooks can bring the

We are fortunate in Boston to have delicious paella on the menu at area restaurants, including Atlantico Boston and Toro, both in the South End, and Taberna de Haro in Brookline.

We often order Chicken

Biryani as Indian takeout and have recently discovered West African Jollof rice with chicken as a new favorite.

One more bonus for rice entrées is that some can accommodate dietary needs and choices from gluten-free to vegan. In the case of dishes like fried rice or risotto, you can serve a base dish with add-ins available for those with specific preferences

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
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
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McGonagle, House pass legislation to address teen sexting and image-based sexual assault

Rep. Joe McGonagle, along with his colleagues in the Massachusetts House of Representatives, passed legislation addressing teen sexting and image-based sexual assault, commonly referred to as "revenge porn."

"I'm proud the House today passed a bill consistent with our intent during criminal justice reform to provide intervention through diversion instead of incarceration for minors," said House Speaker Ronald J. Mariano (D-Quincy). "Additionally, the bill criminalizes image-based sexual assault by adults and affords victims of this crime protections, including the opportunity to get a harassment prevention order against their perpetrator."

"The expansion of cellphones, computers and social media have been pivotal for our society but can also be dangerous," said McGonagle. "I'm really grateful to Speaker Mariano and Chair Day for championing this bill and helping it get through the house. Victims will have more resources than ever and we can work towards mitigating this kind of crime."

"This bill prioritizes survivors of revenge porn by unlocking resources for them while, at the same time, closing a loophole in our criminal harassment statute that will serve to deter and punish those who engage in these horrific acts," said State Representative and Judiciary Chair Michael S. Day (D-Stoneham). "From providing access to victim witness advocates and direct input on criminal dispositions to enabling survivors to pursue civil remedies against their perpetrators, this approach will empower survivors to reclaim their lives in addition to providing clearly enforceable punitive measures for these crimes."

Currently, minors who possess or share explicit

photos of themselves or other minors are charged with violating Massachusetts child pornography laws and are required to register with the Sex Offender Registry. "An Act relative to transmitting indecent visual depictions by teens and the unlawful distribution of explicit images" (H.4498) allows minors to be diverted to an educational program established in the bill prior to delinquency proceed-

The educational diversion program, to be created by the Attorney General and the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE),

would provide teenagers with information about the legal and nonlegal consequences of sexting, which would be made available to school districts. DESE should also encourage districts to implement media literacy programs in their schools as a prevention measure.

A district attorney, however, is allowed to petition the court to bring criminal charges in extreme cases. The bill creates a new misdemeanor offense specifically for minors who possess or disseminate explicit images.

In addition to teen sexting, the bill addresses the nonconsensual distribution of explicit images by adults by establishing a penalty in the existing criminal harassment statute, including prison time and/or a monetary fine for first and subsequent offenses. Under this bill, a victim may also petition the court for a harassment prevention order against a person who has violated this statute.

"An Act relative to transmitting indecent visual depictions by teens and the unlawful distribution of explicit images" (H.4498) passed the House of Representatives 154-0. It now goes to the Senate for their consideration.

Goldberg urges legislature to include gun divestment in supplemental budget

tary School that killed 19 students and two teachers, State Treasurer Deborah B. Goldberg calls for the Massachusetts Legislature to pass legislation requiring the state's \$101.5 billion pension fund to divest approximately \$2 million from companies that manufacture and distribute guns and ammunition for civilian use.

The proposed legislation would require the Massachusetts Pension Reserves Investment Management (PRIM) Board, which oversees the pension fund, to sell, redeem, divest, or withdraw all publicly traded securities from any ammunition, firearm and firearm accessory manufacturing companies that derive

tion, firearms, or firearm accessories for civilian purposes. The companies impacted would be Ammo Inc, Smith & Wesson, Sturm Ruger, and Vista Outdoors, Inc.

The PRIM Board can only divest as a directive from the Massachusetts Legislature. Similar to the recent bill passed by legislators in support of divesting from Russian companies in the wake of the war with Ukraine, the Legislature has the opportunity to pass the proposed divestment language. This action will send the strong message that Massachusetts will not continue to finance preventable gun violence.

However, since 2018, PRIM independently sold \$4 million in shareholdings from gun and ammunition manufacturers and distributors.

In the past, PRIM has been directed to divest nies doing business with Sudan, Northern Ireland, and Iran due to regional

conflicts.

John Rosenthal, President of Meredith Management Corporation and renowned advocate for gun violence prevention as co-founder of Stop Handgun Violence, currently supporting legislation in alignment with Treasurer Goldberg's gun divestment initiative that prohibits the manufacturing of assault weapons in Massachusetts. The sale and ownership of the same weapons is currently banned in the Commonwealth. However, assault weapons continue to be manufactured in Massachusetts and sold in other states making mass shootings more prevalent across the country.

"I applaud Treasurer Goldberg for her strong and courageous leadership in proposing divestiture from the uniquely unregulated gun industry," said John Rosenthal. "Last year alone over 45,000 Americans died from firearms and today and every



The Everett High softball team dropped a heartbreaking 2-1 decision at Concord-Carlisle in a preliminary round contest of the Division 1 MIAA state softball tournament

The Lady Crimson Tide entered the tourney as the 33rd seed in D-1, while the host Lady Patriots came in as the 32nd seed.

The contest was a scoreless duel through the first three innings until Concord-Carlisle through for two runs in the fourth. Everett responded with a run in the fifth, but that would prove to be as close as the Lady Crimson Tide would get on the day.


here to give this speech today, On behalf of Chris-

Our freshman year, our advisory teacher made us write letters to our future selves. I want to end this speech from the letter that Christina wrote in 2018. "


