Council provided update on **City-owned ambulance service**

Provisional Fire Chief Joseph Hickey provided statistics on the operation of the city-owned ambulance following a request for an update by Councilor-at-Large Michael Marchese.

The chief's update coincided with an appearance by former councilor Al Lattanzi during the public participation session of the meeting requesting the city consider the purchase of a second ambulance.

Hickey told the Council that the city ambulance has responded to more than 1,200 calls since its inception in September, 2023. "Seventy-one percent of those calls have been transports," added Hickey.

Hickey said that billing for the calls has commenced "and we will get a reconciliation report at the end of the month with regard to what has been billed out."

Marchese asked if the city were to consider purchasing a second ambulance whether the revenues would cover the costs for the City of Everett. Marchese added that the safety of Everett residents is the top priority.

"I think with any new venture, we need a little more time to actually get all the metrics together to ascertain whether or not [the venture] is profitable," replied Hickey.

\$11.2 million for the benefit of the newer members of the Council.

Deveney pointed out that an advisory board had met several times in the fall to explore the different programs that might be available to receive funds. The advisory board was composed of childcare providers, religious leaders, residents, and stakeholders, among others.

Deveney pointed out that there were several "buckets" from which organizations and businesses could apply for funds. The following are the different categories that are being proposed:

-- \$4.3M for public health programs;

-- \$3.7M for housing assistance;

-- \$1.4M for education and childcare;

-- \$1.1M for food assistance:

-- \$1M for the Youth Council;

-- \$880,000 for parks and improvements; and -- \$745,000 for small business support Deveney noted that applications (which will be in several languages) are now available on the city's website. On March 5 there will be a live webinar (which will be recorded) to help applicants navigate the application process.

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All applications need to be received by June 7, 2024, and all grants that are awarded must be used by December 31, 2026.

The funds were originally part of the ARPA package that Congress had passed during the COVID pandemic. The City of Everett had originally been earmarked for \$17 million, but Mayor Carlo DeMaria lobbied federal officials and the state's elected representatives to make the case that Everett deserved more, given the disparity in funding that was made to smaller communities that had received larger amounts than Everett.

Thanks to the mayor's efforts, the city's ARPA grants increased by more than \$25 million for a total of almost \$42 million.

The approved projects for the use of the money must meet stringent federal guidelines. If a program does not meet the federal requirements, Everett must return the money even if it has been spent. Some residents had wanted to use the funding to rehab the former Pope John XXIII high school for a new middle school, but that was clearly not permitted under the ARPA guidelines.

City of Everett to dispense all the funds is December 31, 2024. Any funds not dispensed must be returned to the federal government.

TUESDAY IS THE PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY ELECTION

This Tuesday, March 5, is the quadrennial Presidential Primary Election Day when Democrats and Republicans (as well as the members of the Libertarian Party) will have an opportunity to choose their candidates for President.

In addition, although those who are registered as Democrats, Republicans, or Libertarians must vote in their own party's primary, those who are registered as Unenrolled (also known as Independents) may choose to vote in any party primary.

On the Democratic side, the candidates are President Joe Biden, Marianne Wlliamson, and Dean Phillips. For the Republicans, the only remaining announced candidates, Donald Trump and Nikki Haley, will be on the ballot.

We would note that there also is a separate line on the ballot for "No Preference." Although the consensus is that the selections of the major party candidates, Joe Biden for the Democrats and Donald Trump for the Republicans, are a foregone conclusion, voters still have the opportunity to express their overall regard for those candidates by filling in the oval for "No Preference." Nikki Haley recently was on the Republican ballot in Nevada (Trump was not) and she actually lost to the choice for "None of the above" -- truly a harbinger for her candidacy.

Tuesday's primary also serves as the election for the candidates for the State Committees (male and female) and the local city and town committee members for each party. The Presidential Primary serves as the once-ev-ery-four-years opportunity for party voters to choose the future direction of their party with the election of their state and local party committee members.

ACCESSIBLE PUBLIC WALK ALONG THE MALDEN RIVER SHORELINE

To the Editor,

This letter is an edited version of the testimony given on February 12, 2024

I write today to speak on the importance of National Grid building an accessible public walk along the Malden River Shoreline. Malden, Everett, and Medford have been patiently waiting for National Grid to come into Chapter 91 compliance since at least 2018. More recently, community engageas ment with surrounding natural resources has only grown, National Grid has continued to stand in the way of their legally mandated responsibilities to these environmental justice communities. My hope is that the Commissioner's review be completed soon and with full understanding of the impact that this decision will have on Everett and the surrounding communities. As the State Representative for the City of Everett, I understand the critical importance of ensuring access to tidelands and holding all parties accountable under the law. I believe that it is in the best interest of these communities that they be guaranteed safe and continuous access along the Malden River, and that National Grid should be held to all conditions of the permit for which they initially applied. National Grid's decision to file, withdraw, and appeal various aspects of this permitting process has unnecessarily delayed granting public access to the Malden River. While I am appreciative of National Grid's initial investment in funding the design documents for this community walkway, I am disheartened that resources are being focused on litigation instead of sustained community engagement. Malden, Everett, and Medford are prepared to be willing partners in maintenance and enforcement for the community path once it is built. The key is ensuring that National Grid complies with all the state regulations it is subject to, including ones that require investment in our communities. I echo the concerns of the community groups activated around this issue; National Grid should not be allowed to strategically skirt their obligations under the law through parliamentary maneuverings. To allow so would set a dangerous precedent that would not serve to benefit residents as they seek to access our state's many natural resources to which they are legally entitled access. I

EQUIP OUR FIRE DEPARTMENT WITH AN ADEQUATE FLEET

To the Editor, Tragedy struck in Winthrop on January 29, 2024. A mother's worst nightmare became reality when her 2-year old daughter suffered a cardiac arrest which, ultimately, resulted in the toddler's death.

It took a one-and-a-half hours – a full 90-minutes – after the toddler's mother called 911 for an ambulance to arrive to the scene to escort the child to MGH.

Winthrop utilizes the services of Action Ambulance to respond to these types of emergencies. Upon receiving the call for response to the scene, they were unable to dispatch one of their own ambulances due to their fleet responding elsewhere. They contacted their mutual aid network, including Cataldo Ambulance, Armstrong Ambulance, and Boston Emergency Medical Services, but none of the companies had available vehicles to respond.

I want to be clear: none of these companies are to blame for the toddler's death. They simply did not have the adequate resources – be it staff or fleet - to respond to the scene. But, what is important to note is that this tragic situation is not an anomaly. I have heard multiple as: examples from our own first responders here in Everett where urgent situations were not responded to as quickly as possible due to a lack of vehicles available. Statewide, response times have slowed by nearly 15%, with 2022 experiencing the slowest response times in Boston since at least 2014 according to Boston Globe reports. I understand that statistics like these can just seem like numbers, but last week's tragedy in Winthrop provides a greater perspective by humanizing these figures. The implementation of the ambulance fleet into the Everett Fire Department was a showcase that Everett recognizes the need for more-reliable response times and that the City wants to take matters into their own hands. I have publicly supported this initiative since its inception. Now it is time to

equip our Fire Department with an adequate fleet. I call upon this Council to support a Resolution and, if need be, a funding appropriation, to secure an additional ambulance for EFD.

More important than being responsive is exercising precaution. Let's not wait until tragedy hits even closer to home before we act. Support those who support our most vital asset – our residents – by providing them with the proper equipment to carry out their functions.

dents must demonstrate proficiency in life safety, search and rescue, ladder operations, water supply, pump operation, and fire attack. Fire attack operations range from mailbox fires to multiple-floor or multiple-room structural fires. Upon successful completion of the Career Recruit Program, all students have met the national standards of NFPA 1001, Standard for Fire Fighter Professional Qualifications, and are certified to the levels of Firefighter I/II and Hazardous Materials First Responder Operations by the Massachusetts Fire Training Council, which is accredited by the National Board on Fire Professional Service

train for and respond to all types of hazards and emergencies. They are the first ones called to respond to chemical and environmental emergencies, ranging from the suspected presence of carbon monoxide to gas leaks to industrial chemical spills. They may be called to rescue a child who has fallen through the ice, an office worker stuck in an elevator, or a motorist trapped in a crashed vehicle. They test and maintain their equipment, including self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA), hydrants, hoses, power tools,

and apparatus. At the Massachusetts Firefighting Academy, recruits learn all these skills and more, including the latest science of fire behavior and suppression tactics, from certified fire instructors. They also receive training in public fire education, hazardous material incident mitigation, flammable liquids, stress management, and self-rescue techniques. The intensive, 10-week program involves classroom instruction, physical fitness training, firefighter skills training, and live

firefighting practice.

The MFA provides recruit and in-service training for career, call, and volunteer firefighters at every level of experience, from recruit to chief offi-

firefighter skills. They practice first under nonfire conditions and then during controlled fire conditions. To graduate, stuQualifications

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United Way of Massachusetts Bay awards SafetyNet Shelter Grant to La Colaborativa

United Way of Massachusetts Bay last week announced that La Colaborativa has been awarded a Safety Net Shelter grant to establish a day services shelter to provide case management and wraparound services through a compassionate, trauma-informed lens to the families being sheltered at the state-operated Cambridge overflow shelter and members of the Chelsea community. The grant was awarded as part of the SafetyNet Shelter Grant Program announced last fall by the Healey-Driscoll Administration in partnership with the United Way of Massachusetts Bay.

Situated at La Colaborativa's new headquarters at 318 Broadway, the walk-in day services shelter is expected to open on Tuesday, February 20. It will accommodate up to 200 individuals on a daily basis. La Colaborativa will arrange transportation for families being sheltered at the state-operated Cambridge overflow site.

The day services center will operate five days a week, from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. Intentionally designed to offer culturally familiar, inclusive services, the day services center will offer families and individuals a safe, welcoming daytime space, as well as basic essentials such as coordination of food assistance, hygiene items, infant supplies, clothing, and other basic household necessities.

La Colaborativa will coordinate the provision of culturally familiar breakfast, lunch and snacks, with an eye toward nutrition. Notably, La Colaborativa will employ an innovative, trauma-informed model of comprehensive wrap-around services, with the goal of stabilizing families.

Case managers on site will work with clients to provide economic, immigration and housing services, such as preparation of applications for housing programs, immigration support and intensive economic mobility services, including aiding clients in obtaining work authorization filings, providing job readiness programming, and connecting households to employment opportunities. Moreover, through La Colaborativa's comprehensive model, case managers will act as systems navigators, assisting clients accessing public benefits, mental health services, and healthcare systems. "As we're facing an unprecedented state of emergency, it's critical that all residents have access to safe, dignified shelter, especially over the frigid winter months," announced Gladys Vega, CEO of La Colaborativa. "Recognizing the countless lives at risk, we're

grateful to collaborate with the United Way and Healey-Driscoll Administration to deploy our unique, trauma-informed model of providing a culturally familiar, welcoming day center with comprehensive housing, economic, and wraparound services, which are vital to the wellbeing of homeless families."

"This new SafetyNet Shelter partnership with La Colaborativa will provide opportunities to address the multifaceted issues confronting new arrivals and families confronting homelessness," said Bob Giannino, President and Chief Executive Officer at United Way of Massachusetts Bay. "A longstanding lifeline for immigrant populations and residents of Chelsea, these funds will expand and enhance the capacity of La Colaborativa to provide critical day services for families, expediting exits of families from shelter systems and helping to enable them to stabilize and contribute to our economy and communities as quickly as possible."

Founded in 1988, La Colaborativa is a Latina-led organization that has been a steady, trusted, and fearless partner to Latinx immigrants in Greater Boston, with a focus on gateway cities and towns such as Chelsea, East Boston, Everett, Lynn, Revere, and Malden. The organization works in partnership with Latinx immigrants to design and deliver an array of programs, initiatives, and community organizing campaigns that serve, protect, celebrate, and uplift our people.

To date, the United Way SafetyNet Shelter grant program has launched eight overnight and daytime sites. The application for the SafetyNet Shelter grant program that is administered by the United Way. It supports prospective community gathering spaces with restrooms and heat, such as places of worship, community centers, and school buildings, to provide safe space for families to find short-term, congregate shelter, meals and other basic necessities, and linkages to other supportive community resources such as housing programs, public benefits, health services, and mental health supports. Non-congregate models will also be considered. The flexible SafetvNet Shelter program will remain in place through the winter and spring, adapting to conditions, needs, and opportunities that arise. The program aims to flexibly build the capacity of diverse community-based organizations and collaboratives to support families without safe and stable housing, with a particular interest in those with the cultural and lin-




Prismatic Magic Stages a Laser Show at the Whittier
